FINNS HAVE OWN THEATER

Thirty per cent of the 651,000 citizens of Petrozavodsk, a lovely city with wide boulevards (although with few cars) and graceful squares, are Finns. They have their own theater, with a Russian director. The Russian radio gives newscasts in Finnish each day. A Finnish newspaper is published twice a week. Street signs, shop signs and railway station signs in the republic are in both Finnish and Russian.

However, the schools now are all Russian and since 1958 only Finnish language is taught only if a student requests it. We were told no westerners, and few foreigners, have visited Petrozavodsk since before the war. So we drew a smattering of friendly, curious people at the railway station and outside our Northern Hotel. When word got around that our group included a Finnish correspondent from Helsinki, he was the biggest hit of all.

Tillamook Man To Head Crime Division

Salem - (UPI) - Tillamook Police Chief Phillip G. Averill Tuesday was appointed director of the new state crime prevention division by Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton.

Averill has resigned as chief of police. Averill, 42, is a graduate of Washington State College and former police chief of Colville, Wash.

Thornton said Averill will move to Salem with his wife and four children and assume direction of the new division July 1.

The division will assist in developing and carrying out recommendations for crime prevention action now being planned by the attorney general's crime prevention advisory committee. Thornton is former city attorney of Tillamook.

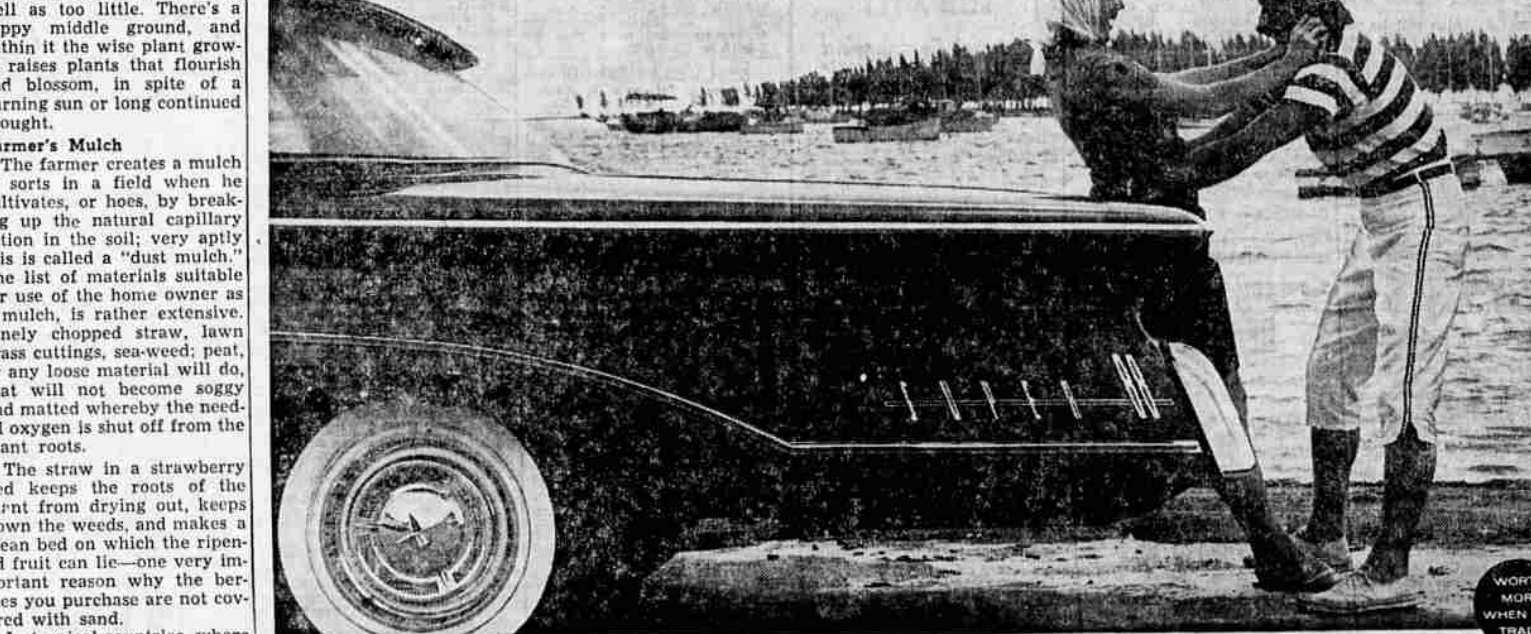
