

Veterans Providing Spark As Braves Put On Big Push

Charlie Dressen's had his say and now the old Braves are having their way.

Dressen told the world last spring how Milwaukee's young pitchers would carry a greater load this year but here are the Braves making their first real push of the season—and it's the tried and true veterans of the staff who are sparking it.

The Braves have won six of their last seven games and Warren Spahn, Lew Burdette and Bob Buhl, the "big three" of the Tribe under Fred Haney, have accounted for five of the victories.

It was Buhl's turn Tuesday night and the hatchet-faced righthander indulged in his favorite form of amusement by gaining credit for a 6-4 win over the Los Angeles Dodgers. Buhl has scored two of his five victories this year over the Dodgers and stands 22-9 for a .710 percentage against them for his career.

Braves 3 1/2 Out

The victory moved the Braves to within 3 1/2 games of the first-place Pittsburgh Pirates, who were routed, 13-2, by the Chicago Cubs. The Cincinnati Reds beat the San Francisco Giants, 5-1, and the Philadelphia Phillies defeated the St. Louis Cardinals, 5-3 in other National League games.

The Cleveland Indians routed the Boston Red Sox, 12-3, and moved to within 1 1/2 games of first place when the Detroit Tigers beat the Baltimore Orioles, 5-2. The New York Yankees topped the Chicago White Sox, 5-2, and the Washington Senators beat the Kansas City As, 7-2, in the American League.

The Braves took advantage of three errors to score five unearned runs in the fifth inning and give Buhl a 6-1 cushion. Buhl weakened in the seventh but Don McMahon sint out the Dodgers for the final 2 1/3 innings.

Banks Get 4 RBIs

Ernie Banks drove in four runs with two doubles and a single to lead the Cubs' 16-hit attack that kayoed Vern Law and tagged him with his second defeat against eight victories.

The Reds kayoed Johnny Antonelli with three runs in the second inning and went on to deal the Giants their sixth defeat in 10 games.

Dick Farrell pitched out of a ninth-inning jam to preserve Robin Roberts' second win of the season for the Phillies. Roberts and Bobby Del Greco

knocked in two runs each and Harry Anderson honored for the Phillies.

Errors Aid Indians

Jim Grant yielded eight hits, including homers, by Bobby Thomson and Marty Keough, to win his fourth decision for the Indians who were aided by six Boston errors.

Don Mossi pitched a six-hitter and Charlie Maxwell and Steve Bilko hit homers for the Tigers, who reached the 500 mark. The Tigers scored all their runs and made seven of their nine hits against Hoyt Wilhelm.

The Yankees celebrated Casey Stengel's return to command by beating the White Sox for the first time in five tries. Jim Coates pitched a nine-hitter for his sixth straight win of this season and his 10th straight over a two-year period.

The Senators replaced the Athletics in sixth place with a 15-hit attack that earned Camilo Pascual his sixth victory.

Rigney tried Dale Long there Tuesday night and the veteran couldn't hit. Neither could Willie Mays, who came up to the plate with the bases loaded in the eighth and lofted an easy fly to center field. Felipe Alou, who went to left field in place of Cepeda, went hitless too. The Giants haven't scored more than two runs in an inning in their last 12 games, and then only twice have they got two.

LA Dodgers Hit, But Muffs Hurt

Los Angeles (UPI)—Big Stan Williams, the Dodger's most successful pitcher with a 3-0 record, tonight attempts to put Los Angeles back into winning stride when he faces the Milwaukee Braves 3-1. Opposing him will be Carl Willey, 3-5, who has not appeared against the Dodgers this year and was 0-2 last year. The Dodgers tried to forget Tuesday night's 6-4 loss to the Braves when they outbit them 12-8, but gave up five unearned runs in the fifth inning and then couldn't catch up. "How can you win when you give up five runs on three errors?" Manager Walt Alton asked after the game. "If we could have stretched the errors out over a couple of innings we might have done it." Alton mused that first it was one trouble and then another. "Now that the team is hitting, the fielding fell apart."

Art Wall is back on the ball. Unable to defend his Masters title earlier this year because of a kidney disorder, the lean Pennsylvanian fired a record-breaking eight-under-par 63 at Oklahoma City Tuesday to lead all qualifiers for the National Open golf championship. Wall wasn't even listed among the top 25 money-winners in the most recent PGA standings but he is almost certain to wind up as one of the top choices when the 129 qualifiers join 21 exempt players for the Open at Denver June 16-18. The veteran shotmaker from Pocono Manor, Pa., turned out at the Twin Hills Country club course at Oklahoma City with most of the

touring pros Tuesday to battle for 34 available berths in that section. Wall showed the way with an impressive 65 in the morning round and then added that record 63 after lunch for a nifty 36-hole total of 128.

Boxer Battling For His Life

New York (UPI)—Tommy Pacheco, young Puerto Rican lightweight boxer, continued to battle for his life today following surgery for removal of a blood clot on his brain. Pacheco was officially listed in critical condition at Roosevelt hospital, where he lay unconscious for more than 24 hours as a result of the injury suffered in a Monday bout at St. Nicholas arena.

Bill Said To Be Duster Pitch

Washington (UPI)—The Senate's pending baseball bill was attacked by Sen. John Marshall Butler today as "a duster pitch aimed at organized baseball." "The new amendment is intended to keep the major leagues off balance long enough to enable their opponents to sneak by the big pitch—that is the principle of baseball by federal regulation," said the Maryland Republican, who is a member of the Senate committee on interstate and foreign commerce. The new bill would call for all players over a limit of 40 on each major league club to be subject to an annual draft. The bill is supported by officials of the Continental League and opposed by officials of the National and American leagues.
