Luebeck, Germany — (UPI) — An American glider pilot who landed in East Germany by mistake was returned by the Communists in record time today in a triumph of sporting spirit over the cold war.

Richard A. Schroeder, 44, Toledo, Ohio, returned to West Germany in an automobile driven by two other American glider pilots.

The Communists had permitted his two colleagues, Andrew Smith, Tecumseh, Mich., and John D. Ryan, Scottsdale, Ariz., to drive across the Iron Curtain border this morning to fetch him.

Second Fast Release

Their trip, which went off without incident, capped a remarkable 24 hours in which the Communists demonstrated for the second time in three weeks an apparent desire to help rather than hinder Americans who crashed in East Germany.

American officials in West Germany stayed out of the incident and let the sportsmen work it out for themselves. Their tactics worked.

Sailed Over Border

Schroeder, a contestant in the world gliding championships now in progress in Cologne, sailed over the Iron Curtain by mistake Wednesday while taking part in a long distance event.

He landed near Grevenmuhlen in East Germany almost exactly on the spot where a U.S. Air Force C47 transport plane with nine persons aboard was forced down by Soviet fighters May 20.

The Communists had returned the crew of the C47 and its passengers in record time — five days.

Janouch Receives  
Last Tax Order

The final tax order for fiscal year 1959-60 has been submitted to County Treasurer Karl Janouch, it was reported today. He, in turn, remits the first tax payments to all the taxing units showing in the collections.

Total tax credited to taxing units by the county treasurer for this fiscal year totals \$8,732,445.68. Janouch said that the current taxes paid amount to \$6,183,002.64 which is 89 per cent of the levy. Of this amount, \$1,624,234.28 was retained to the taxpayers entitled to discounts provided by Oregon laws. Interest paid on delinquent payments of current taxes totaled \$2,900.44, which is mainly on personal property assessments, Janouch said.

The net amount of current tax payments and interest received by Janouch during the fiscal year was \$6,022,978.80.

A total of \$620,337.53 of delinquent taxes were collected with an additional \$55,553.43 for interest for the period they were past due. Total received from these two sums is \$675,890.96.

In addition to property taxes, a sum of \$16,333.72 was received by Janouch in the form of timber yield taxes resulting from timber lands which were harvested and which were under tax exemption during the period the old cutover lands were producing new growth and no harvesting took place.

First Full-Color Ad  
Appears in Newspaper

The first full-color ad in the history of the Mall Tribune appears in today's issue. The three colors, plus black, used in the Pacific Fruit and Produce company ad on page 3E were made possible by the paper's new equipment.

A larger press began operating May 27, and today's is the first attempt at the three color printing. "Spot" single color appears on five other pages.

Pressmen are still having some trouble adjusting fine ink settings on the complicated machine, but operation of the large press is progressing better than was expected, according to Business Manager Gerald L. Latham.

Only two colors plus black have been possible in the past. Some "overlay" of colors now makes possible extra shades along with the three colors.

Today's issue also sets a record for the number of sections, this addition having five. Four has been the maximum in the past.

Bill Bulgar, Pacific Fruit manager who contracted for the first ad, came here recently from Eugene. The company is the largest wholesale fruit and vegetable firm in the world, Bulgar said. It sells fresh fruit and vegetable, as well as Stanby brand canned goods.

## County Planners Recommend Against West Side Zoning

The Jackson county planning commission last night unanimously recommended to the county court that there not be zoning in the West Side area.

Ron James, planning commission president, said the commission's recommendation would be referred to the county court as soon as possible for action.

Smaller areas which are included in the general West Side area can initiate petitions for zoning, he said. The planning commission office can prepare the petition after those wishing zoning tell what area they want zoned, he explained.

James reported that a check of petitions opposed to zoning the West Side showed 199 signatures were of registered voters who resided in the area.

General Public Opinion However, the 314 signatures submitted do indicate the general public opinion of the area. James agreed with Manville Heisel, lawyer representing the citizens opposed to zoning, that those who did not live in the area, but signed the petition, probably owned property in the area or had some interest in the area.

Heisel said the petition's preface stated that the signatures were of citizens who either resided in the area or had an interest in it.

The 199 verified signatures opposing zoning were only 15 more than the signatures on petitions favoring zoning, it was pointed out.

Heisel pointed out, and James agreed, that the statute is not clear as to who can petition against zoning. James reported that a count of hands at the public hearing in the West Side school Wednesday, June 3, showed that 109 persons were opposed to general zoning in the West Side area and 28 favored it. However, of those who favored zoning, two persons favored the proposed interim zoning ordinance as presented.

Commissioner C. W. (Bill) Duggan said he had not attended the hearing, but the minutes of the hearing showed that 12 persons spoke in favor of zoning.

Commissioners voting against recommending interim zoning for the area were Ed Bolt, Jerry Latham, Clifford Lovejoy, Robert Boyer, C. W. Duggan, Victor Birds-eye and Ron James.

## Modernistic Play Equipment To Be Built in Parks

Four items of modernistic play apparatus will soon be erected in Medford's city parks, according to Herb Partridge, a member of the city's parks and recreation commission.

Partridge told the commission last night that the play apparatus will include a turtle five feet high and three feet long, a sand pool, "which is impossible to describe," a set of three horse-like structures, and a fourth item to be decided upon later.

Partridge had been negotiating with Charles H. Forrester of the University of Oregon School of Art to design and construct the items for the city. He said Forrester has offered to design and supervise construction of this apparatus at cost.

Forrester recently moved his family here, Partridge said, and plans to get under way on the work as soon as possible.

No Cost to City Outside of park department labor, the play apparatus will be constructed at no cost to the city. Various service clubs and groups have offered to donate the money for construction of the items.

The groups and the items they want constructed are the Elks Lodge, the turtle, the Kiwanis club, the sand pool, the Moose lodge, the set of horses, and the T. W. Miles estate, the yet unnamed item.

Partridge said the commission is also negotiating with another group for an additional piece of play apparatus.

All of the proposed pieces of play equipment will be of concrete construction, he said. It is suggested that one of the items be placed in Jackson park, one in Maple park and two in Hawthorne park.

In addition to constructing the new modernistic play equipment, Forrester has also offered to renovate the existing playground equipment at Hawthorne park and create a continuity of playground apparatus.

Bids were opened today for construction work at the enlarged Emigrant reservoir, according to bureau of reclamation officials, White City.

Apparent low bidder was M. C. Lininger and Sons, Medford, with \$25,334.70. Work will consist of an access road to storeway, improvement of the park area, and a boat ramp.

Other bidders included Joe M. Ollis, Cave Junction, \$27,675.80; and F. L. Somers, Medford, \$27,797. Engineers estimate was \$35,038.

Duncan to Attend Meetings in North

## Nixon Defends Against Attack By Rockefeller

Washington (UPI) — Vice President Richard M. Nixon today strongly defended his record as a member of the Eisenhower team and said he was proud of the administration's seven-year performance.

Nixon's first reply to Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's attack on him was reported by Ray C. Bliss, Ohio Republican chairman. Bliss presided at a lunch of GOP state chairmen who were addressed by the vice president.

Counter Assault The Nixon news conference was part of a strong counter-assault, launched by President Eisenhower, Nixon and other Republican leaders against Rockefeller's challenge to their policies and programs.

Bliss told newsmen after the GOP lunch that "Dick Nixon said he was on the Eisenhower team and was proud of the record of the administration."

As for Rockefeller's demand that Nixon speak out on issues, Bliss reported that the vice president said he had a years-long public record which clearly showed his position on key issues.

Eisenhower Joins In GOP congressional leaders said after a White House conference that Eisenhower joined them in disputing Rockefeller's contention that the nation's defense planning is inadequate.

GOP National Chairman Thurston B. Morton said he now assumed Rockefeller would be placed in nomination for the GOP presidential candidacy. But Morton said Rockefeller had made "an attack on the record" of the Eisenhower administration and said "Frankly, I do not think Rockefeller can be nominated as the GOP standard bearer."

Morton said Nixon had spoken clearly on national issues during 13 years in congress and had left no one in the dark about where he stands. He said he still believes Nixon will be the GOP presidential nominee.

gressman has seen and fought the Communist challenge for 30 years."

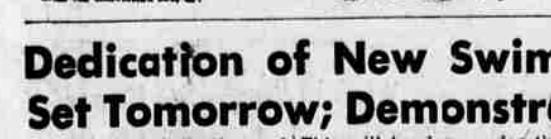
Hatfield will lead Oregon's 18-member delegation to the convention next month.

Russ Said Stalling On Disarmament Geneva — (UPI) — U.S. diplomatic sources said today the Russians appear to be stalling on disarmament until the United Nations General Assembly opens in the fall.

The Russians apparently hope, the sources said, to get more propaganda mileage out of Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's new disarmament plan and perhaps gain support for it from some of the uncommitted nations of the world.

French, British and Canadian delegations at the 10-nation disarmament conference do not go along with this entirely. They tend toward the view that the Soviets may now be ready to begin negotiation of the practical problems of disarmament.

Dedication of New Swimming Pool Is Set Tomorrow; Demonstration Planned

Official dedication and opening ceremonies for the city's new Jackson park swimming pool will take place at the pool tomorrow at 10 a.m.

Park and Recreation Commission Chairman Russ Janouch will act as master of ceremonies and Mayor John Snider will dedicate the swimming pool. Other city dignitaries will be on hand to witness the event. The public is invited.

Opening of the city's second swimming pool will come just 10 years and 6 days after the opening of the city's first pool at Hawthorne park.

Dedication of the wading pool will also take place tomorrow by Lon Skinner, president of the Crater Lions club, which donated it to the city.

Demonstration Scheduled Tomorrow's opening ceremonies will include a demonstration of swimming instruction methods used in the city's summer recreation program.

This will be done under the direction of Ken Lyons, city recreation supervisor.

An exhibition of water ballet by members of the YMCA's synchronized swimming group is also scheduled. The ceremonies are to be concluded about noon. The pool will be open to the public at 1 p.m. and will stay open until 9 p.m. It will remain on the summer swimming schedule thereafter.

The new pool was built at a cost of \$83,000 and is 75 by 42 feet in size with depths ranging from three feet at one end to six feet at the other. It has a capacity of 250,000 gallons of water.

Construction Possible Construction of the pool was made possible through a donation of land and money from the Jackson County Housing authority, which turned the property over to the city after war-time housing facilities were torn down.

Provisions have been made in the construction of the dressing rooms and mechanical facilities for addition to the project of a separate diving tank 30 by 40 feet in size and 12 feet deep, when the city can afford it.

The pool features the latest in water purification equipment which circulates all 90,000 gallons of pool water through the filters four times each day and keeps the water temperature at 80 degrees.

The swimming pool is but one part of the larger Jackson park development project. Parks and Recreation Director Robert Haworth said the rest of the park will be developed in three stages, one being done each year.

Scheduled to be completed under the first stage, which will be done during the coming fiscal year, are various plantings around the pool, construction of play apparatus at a site near the pool and completion of one of three proposed parking lots.

They included first baseman Lowell Dean, shortstop Cal Dean, catcher Ken Jensen and pitcher-outfielder Jerry Anderson.

The county court also awarded a contract to Niernmeyer and Martin company, Portland, for delivery of treated timbers for the McLeod bridge. The Portland company was low bidder at \$12,479.46.
