

# Eisenhower Hopes To Rally Support For American Policies in Far East

Washington—President Eisenhower hopes during his Far East trip to rally more support for American policies in the face of a stepped-up Chinese Communist campaign of infiltration and subversion in Asia.

He knows that he has his work cut out for him. In three of the four countries Eisenhower will visit—Japan, South Korea and the Philippines—the United States is having its troubles.

Only on the Chinese Nationalist stronghold of Formosa will he find serene relations. And even there the

booming of Red artillery across the Formosa Strait is a constant reminder of the military as well as ideological threat to freedom in the Far East.

The Chinese Communists are jubilant in the wake of the summit crash. The Paris debacle brought to an end Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's efforts to woo the West—a campaign which Peiping bitterly resented.

The Chinese Reds are not expected, however, to undertake any open military adventures in the foreseeable

future, despite intensified sabre-rattling. Top American officials say things are going well enough for the Reds anyway.

Chaos, upon which Communism feeds, has hit Japan and Korea in recent months. In the Philippines, ultra-nationalistic sentiment among some congressmen has troubled U.S. relations and defense arrangements.

In Southeast Asia, which Eisenhower will skip on this trip, Communist inroads continue. The Reds are gaining strength daily in tiny but strategic Laos. In South Viet-

nam the pro-American government of President Ngo Dinh Diem still is unable to halt depredations of Communist guerrillas. Indonesia teeters between disorder and totalitarianism.

American officials hope Eisenhower's visit to Japan will strengthen the hand of pro-American Premier Nobusuke Kishi and his conservative government against the rioting Communists, Socialists and left-wing student and labor groups.

Continuing demonstrations against the new Japanese-

American security pact, due to be ratified the day Eisenhower arrives in Japan, have been going on for days. They have taken on an "Ike stay home" character which has caused some officials to wonder whether the President should make the visit.

But Eisenhower and his top aides apparently feel that this is no time to back down in the face of Communist-inspired pressure tactics aimed at the overthrow of a staunchly pro-American government in keystone Japan.

The United States has no intention of letting Kishi and

his government, which commands support of more than 60 per cent of parliament, down at this critical juncture.

In South Korea, Eisenhower may be expected to urge interim President Huh Chung, placed in office after the ouster of Syngman Rhee, to hasten democratic reforms and the holding of new elections.

Despite Rhee's overthrow as a result of public clamor, unrest and dissatisfaction still are rife in South Korea. Some American officials feel that Huh and his associates are moving too slowly and new trouble may erupt.

In the Philippines Eisenhower faces a different situation. The government of President Carlos P. Garcia is stable, if not universally admired.

But many Filipinos are convinced that the United States is to blame for many of their economic ills. They think that they were short-changed on war-damage payments after independence.

Some also believe the arrangement for U.S. military bases in the islands violates their sovereignty. Still others believe the United States is discriminating against their

commerce and development. Eisenhower's task is to confront the Japanese extremists, spur the South Koreans to greater democratic progress and persuade the Filipinos that the United States is not doing them wrong.

The job, in the opinion of some high officials here, is a

formidable if not impossible one. But Eisenhower feels that it must be attempted in the interest of solidifying the free world against continued Communist pressure at all points.

## Family Council

Lucille R.—I don't want Trudy or Mildred to leave.

Mildred K.—I can't stay in the same house with a woman of bad morals.

Lucille R.—I am a widow in my early 70s. I share my home with my younger sister, who has never been married. Our household also includes a young woman who rents an upstairs room.

This woman, Trudy, is about 38 and divorced. She is very eager to marry again and has talked to me a lot about some of the men she dates. I am her confidante and adviser.

Recently she has been going out with a man I don't like at all. One evening she invited him up to her room and they spent some time there. My sister Mildred was furious and said I must ask her to leave immediately. Instead I hinted to Trudy that she was making a big mistake. She was offended and offered to leave. I begged her to remain, but now Mildred says she'll go if Trudy doesn't. I don't want either of them to go.

Mildred K.—I don't see why I should stay in the same house with a woman of bad morals. Of course Trudy will deny everything, but all I know is that decent women don't invite men into their rooms. It's just disgusting.

Lucy calls me an old maid, too strait-laced and all of that, but I don't think she realizes that I'm concerned about her welfare a lot more than I care about this woman's morals. All her friends will turn against her when they see the kind of company she keeps.

I feel that Trudy has taken advantage of Lucy for a long time. When she wants help or favors from her she is very friendly and hangs around our living room chatting by the hour. But sometimes she goes into one of her moods and just locks her door. Lucy gets very upset and worries about her.

The Council: Lucille is apparently a very maternal woman who naturally sets up a mother-child relationship with everyone around her. Individuals who do not want a mother hovering over them may avoid her, but those who enjoy this relationship gravitate toward the comfort of her wings.

We get the impression that she has just such a relationship with her sister. From Mildred's own testimony, her antagonism toward Trudy started before the incident involving the man. She apparently resents her sister's concern for a strange woman and would prefer to have more of that concern directed toward her.

We don't think the situation is desirable for any of the women in this household. If they cannot all break out of this emotional tangle in which each of them is playing a part unsuited to her years, they should make other living arrangements.

Lucille should recognize that her child-rearing years are behind her, but that many interesting activities are within the range of her capabilities. She should interest herself in club or church work and form friendships with women on her own level.

Mildred needs the same kind of activity. She should seek opportunities which bring out her capabilities as a mature woman—she will not think of herself as a child needing mothering.

Trudy's problems are undoubtedly more complex and she can well use help from a kindly, objective person. Unfortunately, Lucille doesn't fill the bill because she is too much the mother. Trudy must learn to manage her own life in a wiser way. Probably she would be better off boarding with a family. There would be less temptation to violate conventional good taste and less opportunity to lean upon another woman.
