**Salmon Angling Picking Up in GP-Galice Stretch Of Rogue With New Run**

Portland —(AP)— Angling on north coast streams is slow, it is only fair in the Lemolo, Toketee and Soda Springs area of Douglas county, and just fair to poor on the Deschutes river in the Maupin area, the state game commission said today.

The commission's weekly report also carried these week end angling tips:

**Southwest:** Trout fishing should be fair in lower Umpqua and Smith river tributaries; Winchester tributary angling slow; striped bass fishing poor in Coos bay and salmon fishing also slow; salmon fishing improving in Grants Pass and Galice sections of the Rogue river with new run arriving.

**Northwest:** A few chinook have been seen in the Nestucca river; Devils lake is fair to good; few chinook are present at the Siuslaw bar, trout angling in lower Willamette district should improve, upper Sandy and tributaries, and upper Clackamas and Timothy lake have been planted; upper Willamette streams also have been

stocked; salmon angling slow in McKenzie.

**Central:** White river is high and muddy; east fork Hood river is very good, however, with eggs best; Clear lake poor; Frog lake still closed by snow; East lake producing well; Paulina best on slow troll with flatfish; South Twin fair using single eggs; Wickiup producing kokanee; Metolius good using nymphs and caddis flies fished deep; Odell lake good with spinner and worms or gold flatfish.

The two squads got a total of 42 baschits — six were homers — and 34 runs between them. However, the Rainiers showed the most talent for

getting the runners across the plate, winning 22-12 in the highest scoring PCL game of the year.

Elsewhere Wednesday night, the scores were most respectable. League leading Sacramento edged Portland, 3-2, in 11 innings, Spokane downed San Diego, 8-3, and Vancouver swept a double feature from Tacoma, 4-1 and 3-1.

**Everyone Helps Win**

It would be hard to pick a hero in the Rainiers romp over Salt Lake. Everybody helped as the Studs got their eighth straight win.

Gordy Coleman hit a grand slam homer and drove in two other runs with a single. Joe Taylor chipped in with two solo circuit clouts and Lou Skizas cleared the fences with one man on.

R. C. Stevens hit a bases full blast for the Bees and Hank Mitchell found the range with one mate on the sacks.

At Sacramento, it was the other way around with pitching dominating.

Clair Hickman and Terry Fox split the stint for the Solons, the latter taking the win when Cuno Barragan hit a solo homer in the 11th. That was only the eighth safety off Portland starter Noel Mickelsen, who struck out 12, but it was the one that gave him his fifth loss in 11 decisions.

Boston —(AP)— Billy Jurges, completely exhausted from trying to cope with the "fruitless task" of managing the last-place Boston Red Sox, was in seclusion today after being ordered by his physician to take a rest.

And the 52-year-old Jurges may have given a hint himself recently that he may never be back as manager. Jurges was quoted as telling two friends, a baseball writer and Red Sox publicist Jack Malaney several weeks ago that "no job is worth it if it's going to ruin your health. My health is more important than the job."

Veteran Del Baker, a Red Sox coach since 1953 and in his 50th year of organized baseball, took over the managerial reins on an "interim" basis.

First full scale workout was yesterday. The club scheduled practices this afternoon and tomorrow afternoon. Coach is Cliff McLean.

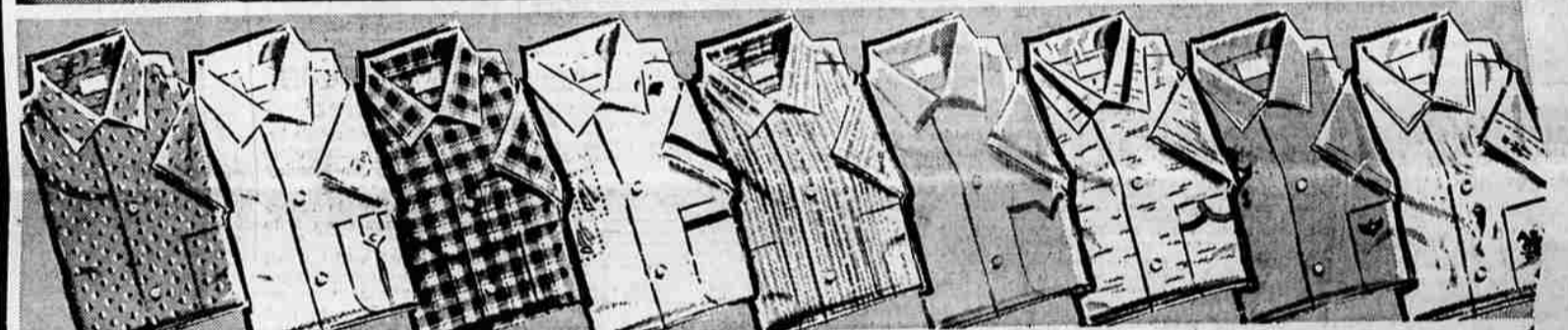

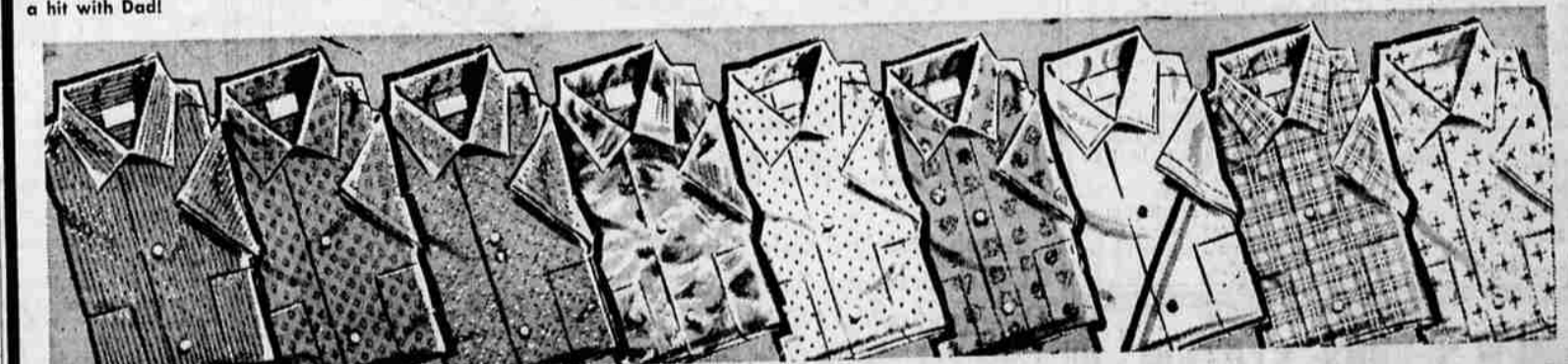
