

Ike's Aid Request Chopped by House

Washington - (UPI) - President Eisenhower's foreign aid request has been chopped by about \$800 million by a House appropriations subcommittee.

The subcommittee Thursday voted \$3.3 billion for U.S. aid to Free World allies and underdeveloped countries in the fiscal year starting July 1. Eisenhower originally had asked for \$4,175,000,000.

The reduction was reported to have been split about evenly between military and economic assistance.

The cut was smaller than had been expected. Advance predictions were that the subcommittee would trim \$1 billion or more from Eisenhower's request.

Back Stairs: Extra Details of Agents

Washington - (UPI) - Back stairs at the White House:

More than two dozen new Secret Service agents have been brought into Washington recently and a number of them assigned to the White House detail. This is partly due to the President's upcoming Far Eastern trip with the necessity of sending a number of experienced White House men out ahead of the chief executive.

Experience Wanted

Another reason for the influx of new men is the election year and the Treasury Department, of which the Secret Service is a part, wants these young agents to have at least a month or two of white house experience before returning to their posts in their American cities.

The Secret Service is up against the possibility of having to operate four major protection details between the November election and the January inauguration: The customarily large unit assigned to President Eisen-

hower, around-the-clock protection of the President's four grandchildren, the detail assigned to Vice President Richard M. Nixon and, of course, the new President who comes under Secret Service protection as soon as the votes indicate his election.

Fifth Squad Possible

Assuming that Nixon is the Republican candidate, the Secret Service still will need a fifth squad of agents ready election night. These men will be waiting not far from wherever the Democratic nominee spends election night.

The White House is a most glamorous assignment for a younger agent, particularly an unmarried man. The travel and the constant stream of world leaders in and out of the White House can be quite inviting, but the more experienced agents learn to know the detail as a real grind.

Wives Are 'Widows'

The "widows" of the agents, and that is how some of them refer to themselves, face the prospect of a home life with the husband gone, as in the case of Eisenhower these past

two years, half the time or more.

If a Secret Service man traveling with the President spends so much as a dime over the allowance voted him by Congress, it must come out of his pocket.

Why do agents put up with the sort of life they must lead? Several answers: The work does have many exciting moments. It is truly a seat up front. These men also have a fine spirit of service. To many, the work is much more interesting than chasing counterfeits.

But the most important reason: These men are, for the most part, pretty dedicated cops. They don't feel sorry for themselves, at all. They know and appreciate the importance of their assignment.

Ike Takes Chopper Home from Links

Washington - (UPI) - President Eisenhower, who denied three years ago that helicopters were being purchased for his trips to the golf course, used one of the whirlybirds Thursday to return home from the links.

Until now, the President had been reluctant to travel by helicopter between the White House and Burning Tree club in Bethesda, Md., about 12 miles away.

Just before Eisenhower started using helicopters in 1957 for trips to his farm in Gettysburg, Pa., and other short journeys, a reporter asked at a news conference if he wouldn't give up such craft in the interest of economy.

Body of Shark Victim Recovered

Santa Barbara, Calif. - (UPI) - The body of a man badly mangled by sharks was pulled from the Pacific Ocean late Thursday night. The Coast Guard said three other bodies were sighted in the water, and all were feared to be from a missing boating party of seven men conducting scientific research.

Secret underwater electronic gear was being tested by the men. Raytheon manufacturing engineer George Edgar declined to discuss the research beyond saying it was for a "classified government project."

He said four of the men aboard the vessel were Raytheon scientists from the company's plant at nearby Goleta.

Cheese Cake Recipe

Dairymen's Delight

We repeat this recipe for unbaked cheese cake because we've never found a cheese cake recipe to surpass it. It is a dairymen's delight because of the multiplicity of dairy products involved in its making. It can be easily made by any member of the family who can read and who finds pleasure in being heaped with compliments.

- 1/2 pint whipping cream.
- 1/2 cup lemon juice
- 1 8-ounce package cream cheese.
- 1 can condensed milk
- 1 envelope plain gelatine
- 1/4 cup water
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- Sour cream for topping, if desired.

Graham cracker crust using 14 double graham crackers, crushed and 1/4 pound (cube) butter, melted.

Combine graham cracker crumbs and butter. Line nine-inch pan with three-quarters of the cracker mixture. Stir lemon juice into whipping cream; let stand 10 minutes. Mash cream cheese with a fork. Gradually work in condensed milk. Mixture should be smooth. Add gelatine to water; let stand five minutes, then dissolve over hot water.

Whip lemon-cream mixture just until it begins to stiffen. Pour in cream cheese mixture and continue beating until well blended. Add gelatine and vanilla. Beat just until blended. Pour into pie crust; top with thin layer of lightly whipped sour cream and/or remaining graham cracker crumbs. Eight servings.

Creamed Food Underpinning

Instead of the usual toast triangles, serve creamed foods on Toasted English muffins, chow mein noodles, pastry shells, baked potatoes, rice, crisp crackers, spaghetti or noodle nests.

Fruit Salad Topping

Try whipped cottage cheese, orange juice and grated orange rind for topping fruit salad. Or combine sour cream and whole jellied cranberries.

Let's Look at Lamb

Seasonings for Roasts

Lamb is a very good buy. Treat the family to its fine flavor more often. Delicious hot or cold but do everything possible to avoid lukewarm lamb. Cuts for roasting are many. There are full leg, short leg, half leg, boned leg, shoulder, shoulder roll, cushion shoulder and crown rib roast.

Do not remove thin paperlike covering. Do not wash roast. Instead, wipe with damp cloth or paper towel. Roast at 325 degrees no matter what your mother did. Keep roast hot. Make gravy. Mint jelly, of course!

Spice Seasoning. Rub the lamb roast thoroughly with a cut clove of garlic. Combine one teaspoon dry mustard, one teaspoon chili powder and one tablespoon paprika or use Lamb Garni available in spice and herb departments. Rub mixture thoroughly into roast.

Herb Seasonings. Marjoram, thyme, rosemary may be rubbed into roast before roasting.

Garlic Seasoning. With tip of knife, make five or six gashes in meat. Insert small silvers of garlic. Or rub garlic salt liberally into surface of lamb before placing in oven. Gourmet trick highly regarded by many including this writer, is to fill gashes with combination of anchovy paste and finely chopped garlic.

Mint. Spread roasted lamb with mint jelly just before it goes to the table.

Glass. Fifteen minutes before roast is done, spread with mint or currant jelly or with this mixture: one fourth cup brown sugar, one fourth teaspoon ginger, one-fourth teaspoon cloves, one tablespoon lemon juice or vinegar. Continue roasting.

Spinach Stuffed Tomatoes

Here is a gay and colorful vegetable dish that is different. Cooked and seasoned fresh spinach is flecked with caraway seed and piled into hollowed-out tomato shells (save tomato pulp for salads or for mixing with cottage cheese). Top spinach-stuffed tomatoes with dab of mayonnaise and put under broiler until mayonnaise is puffy and brown.

Dairy Products, Vegetables Make Planning Easy

Throughout our markets, there's traditional emphasis on milk and dairy products as milk production reaches its peak in June. The plentiful array of dairy products includes cream for peak-of-the-season strawberries and for popular cereal breakfasts. Consider cottage cheese, other cheeses which are displayed in infinite variety, yogurt, buttermilk, butter, evaporated milk, nonfat dry milk and other dairy specialties.

Ice cream and surprising variety in frozen desserts are featuring seasonal fruits and berries along with vanilla, chocolate and strawberry, plain and in com-

bination. The half gallon is as usual the best buy.

Now is the season of excitement in fresh produce departments.

There's increasing abundance of sweet corn, celery, beans. Bunched vegetables, beets, carrots, chard, collards, green onions, radishes, spinach, green onions, turnips and watercress beckon. Cabbage, cauliflower, cucumbers, eggplant, onions, peppers, potatoes, zucchini, and small, make meal planning easy. Lettuce and romaine were never greener, crispier, more inviting. Fewer artichokes, broccoli, endive, mushrooms as seasons wax and wane.

Fruit displays feature handsome luscious strawberries for breakfast treats, for dessert making. It's high time you were jamming, preserving or freezing these highly seasonal beauties if you haven't already done so. Small sizes are best buys in both oranges and grapefruit. Summer varieties of avocados are here. More sweet cherries from a big Early peaches will be increasing in supply right along. Cantaloupes too are more plentiful. Papayas and pineapples are tropical treats.

Other good buys as space permits; eggs, peanut butter, vegetable fats and oils including salad oils. Canned freestone peaches are a good buy. Rice and macaroni products help balance the budget.

Meat situation remains about the same with each "super" offering its own best buys. The ads and displays are well worth scanning. Bargain priced poultry everywhere.
