Olympia, Wash. — UPI — Representatives of Aerojet Engineering Corp., are expected to visit Washington within two weeks to look over five proposed sites for a missile fuel plant, Sam Boddy, a acting Washington State commerce director, said Saturday.

Sites being recommended to the firm are near Willapa Harbor, Chehalis, Pasco, Camas and Plymouth.

Boddy said Oregon officials also have proposed that the plant be located in that state, but said he told company officials that Washington has a "better tax structure."
