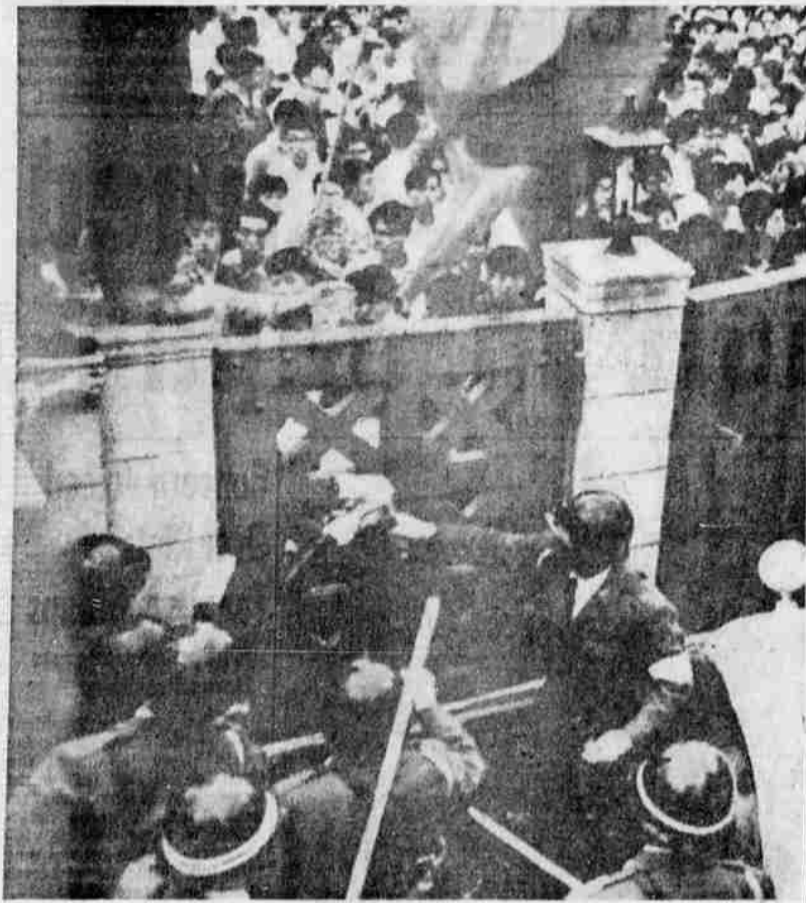


First Deaths Reported In Japan Student Riots

Fanatics Demand Cancellation of Eisenhower Trip

Tokyo - (UPI) - A seething mob of 12,000 fanatic left-wing university students demanding cancellation of President Eisenhower's trip to Japan stormed Parliament tonight, battled 5,000 police and set fire to three police trucks in the worst anti-government rioting to date.

At least one student was killed, as many as four were reported dead. Hundreds were injured and scores arrested.

Night of Horror
The renewed violence almost on the eve of President Eisenhower's arrival Sunday set off a night of horror and added a new note of anxiety for the Chief Executive's safety.

It seemed evident that police alone could not control the wild, undisciplined and seemingly illogical mob that roamed Tokyo's streets tonight unless they resorted to gunfire.

Summons Cabinet
Premier Nobusuke Kishi summoned an emergency cabinet meeting to consider the riots, which are aimed primarily against his government and the U.S.-Japan security treaty, and secondarily against the Eisenhower visit. Unconfirmed reports said the cabinet would discuss dissolution of Parliament.

Confirm One Death
Police confirmed one death, with newspapers saying there were two and the Socialist Party claiming there were four, with others likely to die of injuries.

At least 200 were known seriously injured, and estimates said more than 1,000 were less seriously hurt.

Republicans to Lose Election, Methodist Church Head Asserts

Redlands, Calif. - (UPI) - A Methodist bishop says he thinks the Republican party will lose the presidential election because of "government bungling and stupidity" in the U2 spy plane incident.

Bishop Gerald Kennedy, distiller head of 10 million

Methodists, made his remarks yesterday at a press conference preceding the 110th session of the Southern California-Arizona Methodist Conference.

The 1,200 ministers and laymen attending the conference approved resolutions calling for the admission of Red China to the United Nations, halt of nuclear testing and use of birth control where needed.

Kennedy at the press conference said, "I am a Republican and I think we're licked because of the U2 incident. We lied, we got caught and we had to admit it."

In his talk at the convention, Kennedy called for the government leadership to "go back to the austere, strict doctrine that a Christian man always speaks the truth."

Arrested by Police Eagle Point Youth

Medford police detectives Monday arrested a 19-year-old Eagle Point youth on a charge of malicious injury to personal property. Bail is set at \$1,500.

Edgar Phillip Cunningham is accused of having damaged the door of a tow truck at the Rogue Service and Supply, 609 West McAndrews rd., Sunday afternoon, while removing his car from the company's lot without permission.

Jack Ray Sides, an employee at the garage, told police he had towed Cunningham's car from a ditch at the edge of town Saturday night after an accident, and stored it on the lot.

Sides said Cunningham and a companion came to get the car Sunday but refused to pay a \$10 towing fee. He told police the two youths left without the car, but told him they would be back.

To keep them from taking the car when he wasn't there, Sides told police he parked a 2-ton towing truck in front of Cunningham's car.

However when he came back to the lot Monday, he found the car missing and his tow truck pushed some 25 feet ahead with its door lock broken.

Detectives arrested Cunningham at his place of employment at White City. He admitted to police that he took his car, but said he did not know if he had broken the tow truck's lock or not. He was confined in the county jail.

POWERS CASE STATIC
New York - (UPI) - The Russians have not yet indicated when U2 pilot Francis Powers will be brought to trial on spy charges, U. S. Ambassador to Russia Llewellyn E. Thompson said Tuesday on his arrival from London. "There is nothing new on the Powers situation," Thompson said. The ambassador plans to confer in Washington with Secretary of State Christian Herter and return to Moscow June 23.

Oregon Grange Delegates Pass Resolutions

Roseburg - (UPI) - The 87th annual convention of the Oregon State Grange passed resolutions Tuesday favoring the elimination of lamb imports and holding the line on interest rates.

The 300 delegates chose Washington county as the site of their next annual meeting. Other resolutions passed called for inclusion of funds for Green Peter and Blue river dams; supported a bill before Congress which would force money lenders to disclose all interest charges, and asked for a stiffer automobile insurance financial responsibility law.

A resolution supporting a new \$1.25 an hour minimum wage was turned down.

Grange Master Elmer McClure called for a regional corporation to build hydroelectric and irrigation projects. He told the delegates such a corporation could get the jobs done more quickly than utilities which must wait for federal licenses.

McClure said the Grange had decided to support an intertie between the Bonneville Power administration and California power systems.

"At the present time BPA has a surplus of power which could be sold in California to the great benefit of both regions," he said.

But he added that as the demand for power in the Northwest grows the area probably will need all of the Bonneville output, and the Grange's support for the intertie should be limited by making sure the Northwest has prior rights.

Josephine School Budget Passes

Grants Pass - The Josephine County Unit District school budget passed Monday with 1,211 voting yes and 852 voting no.

A previous election, May 2, defeated the budget by a vote of 1,056 to 910.

The district operates all of the public schools in Josephine county except those in the Grants Pass city district. The county-unit schools include Illinois Valley High school at Cave Junction and 14 elementary schools throughout Josephine county.

The total of estimate expenditures approved Monday was \$1,616,035. This is \$740,865.64 over the 6 per cent limitation.

Provo, Utah - (UPI) - A pickle packer inadvertently picked Provo Monday to plow about 10 tons of pickles on U. S. highway 19. The highway became packed with pecks of pickles when the end gate of the pickle packer's truck opened while going up a hill.

Driver James Christiansen picked the pickles off the pavement to please the police patrol.

Torpedo Room of Nuclear Sub Hit By Blast; Sailor Dead, One Missing

Pearl Harbor, Hawaii - (UPI) - The Navy today recovered the body of a man killed when fire and explosion ripped the after torpedo room of the nuclear submarine Sargo.

A second man was unaccounted for but officials said he may not have been aboard the Sargo at the time of Tuesday's accident.

The Navy tried to extinguish the blaze by opening a hatch to the burning room and submerging the stern at an angle of about 30 degrees. Several hours later Navy frogmen girdled the sub with cables and a huge crane raised it to an even keel while fire trucks pumped out the flooded area.

Torpedoes Strawn About
A Navy demolition expert entered the torpedo room early today and reported it was nearly demolished. Broken torpedoes were strawn about the room. Explosive materials from war heads were still smoking along with mattresses and other combustible materials.

Navy officials said this presented the danger of another explosion and the Sargo's skipper, Lt. Cmdr. John H. Nicholson, 35, who stood by tensely during the operation, recommended that the compartment be flooded for another 12 hours.

Work crews began preparations to submerge the Sargo's stern a second time, the Navy said.

It also said the vessel's atomic reactors were sealed off and there was "absolutely no danger of an explosion from the reactor compartment."

The fire started at a leaking high pressure line in the after torpedo room, as the submarine was taking on oxygen at a pier.

Witnesses said flames shot 25 feet into the air, and six minutes later the Sargo was jolted by a large explosion. Fire boats and trucks were rushed to the scene, while two non-atomic subs and a submarine tender were moved to other docks for safety.

Submerison Decided
After fire control units had battled the blaze for nearly 45 minutes without success, ships officers decided to take the Sargo a short distance from the dock, and submerge her.

The vessel was taken down with the hatch to the torpedo room open, so the burning compartment could be flooded. When the blaze was extinguished, the Sargo was surfaced and pumping equipment began emptying the flooded areas.
