Tacoma Nabs Pair To Cut Indian Gap

It was a long, cold, wet,

dreary night at Tacoma Wednesday night and as far as the Spokane Indians were concerned, they would just as soon have been lounging in front of a warm cozy fireplace.

The Tacoma Giants rose up and clobbered the visitors, 3-2 and 5-4, in a double header to close the first place second place Pacific Coast league gap to one game. The first contest was an extra-inning affair and the finale lasted until close to curfew time.

Sacramento ran its winning streak to three by dumping Seattle, 3-0 and 6-2, in a double header to trail the Indians by only one game. In other action, Vancouver belted San Diego, 5-3, at Salt Lake City defeated Portland, 8-5.

Tacoma got its first-game win in extra innings when Bob Perry singled home Bob Prescott, who had doubled, in the last of the eighth. Matty Alou and Jose Pagan drove in the first two Giant markers while the Spokane tallies came on solo homers by Tony Roig and Roy Smalley.

The Indians led, 3-0, in the first three frames of the second game and then Tacoma struck for solo markers in the third and sixth. Three more scores in the seventh pushed Spokane under.

Pitching and timely hitting was the story in Sacramento's sweep over Seattle. Terry Fox hurled three fine relief frames in the extra inning opener, and Jack Caffrey threw a seven hitter at the Rainiers in the nightcap.

Salt Lake got by Portland on the strength of Hank Mitchell's heavy hitting.

Mitchell hit a three-run homer in the first inning and doubled in two more tallies in the sixth. Tom Parsons went the distance for the Bees, coasting to his second straight win.

Hard Smash In Jaw Needed By Boxing, Senator Says

Washington - UPI - An outraged member of a Senate sub-committee investigating boxing said today Congress should land a kayo punch on underworld elements by passing tough new laws to get rid of hoodlums who have infested the fight game.

As the committee recessed further hearings until August, Sen. Alexander Wiley (R-Wis.) asserted that "a hard sock in the jaw" at the boxing profession is needed.

Wiley, who as a member of a Senate subcommittee that heard former middleweight champion Jake LaMotta admit throwing a fight to get a crack at the title in the late 1940s, told United Press International he would introduce crack-down federal legislation next week. It would be aimed at managers, promoters and matchmakers allied with racketeers.

Wednesday, a convict, flat-

ly refused to answer questions on the ground that he feared for his life. The day before, LaMotta testified with a reported death threat hanging over his head.

Sen. Philip A. Hart (D Mich.) chairman of the inquiry, said the underworld had gone too far when it tried to reach into a congressional hearing room and wield power.

Subcommittee counsel Rand Dixon said the threats helped prove one salient point: "Boxing is rotten from top to bot-

tom" and should be cleaned up.

The nervous convict, who swore he was threatened in his jail cell last month was Irving Mishel. Mishel, serving from 10 to 20 years for grand larceny, refused to tell Senate investigators anything about Frankie Carbo, the alleged "underworld czar" of boxing. The penitentiary inmate, identified as a former "fight game banker" in the underworld, cited the Fifth Amendment to avoid answering questions.

Ortiz Successfully Defends Ring Toga

San Francisco - UPI - Carlos Ortiz, who successfully defended his world junior welterweight championship Wednesday night, hopes challenger Duilio Loi did him a favor by making him look bad in taking a 15-round decision.

"Loi made me look bad. So maybe Joe Brown, the lightweight champion, will fight me now," Ortiz said after the fight.

"When you look too good, they won't give you a shot," Ortiz solved a bobbing defense of the Italian Loi, holder of the European welterweight title, in his first journey past the 10-round distance.

Referee Vern Bybee saw the nationally televised Cox Palace fight in favor of Ortiz, 145-143, judge Fred Battaro had the champion ahead, 148-146, and Judge Matt Zidich favored Loi, 145-143. United Press International gave it to Ortiz, 144-143.

"I knew the fight was close. My trainer told me at the end of the 12th I would have to go all out to win," the 23-year-old champion said.

"So I poured on the steam then."

The extra distance was supposed to favor the challenger, the 31-year-old Loi, who had gone 15 rounds 12

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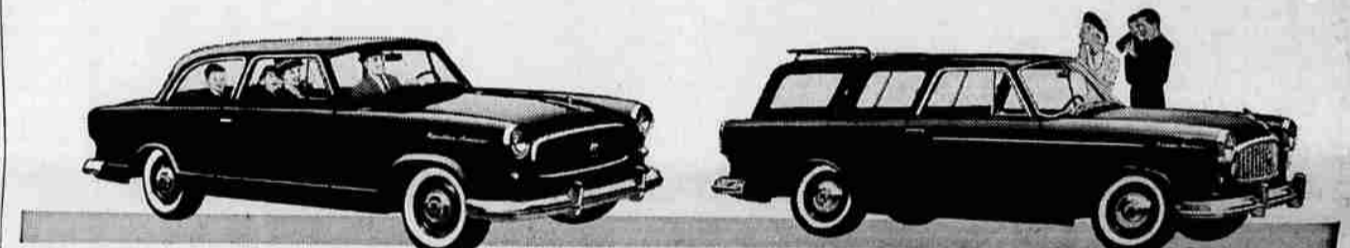
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
