"That ninth inning gave us a ray of sunshine," said Rigney. "Maybe the boys can start putting some hits together now."

The Giants got at least one hit in every inning Thursday—but it wasn't until the game was nearly over that they could route Pirate hurler Wilmer (Vinegar Bend) Mizell from the mound.

With one in, Orlando Cepeda greeted Face with a single to send across another. Then Willie Kirkland hit a homer with two aboard.

It was the same type rally that won the game for the Pirates. They poured six runs across the plate in the fifth inning off Jack Sanford. With two runs in and the bases loaded and none down, Bob Skinner clouted a grand slam homer.

THE ANGLER'S LOG

Over 13,000 salmon over the counting board and still a big slug of them on the way! Total run estimates are being revised upwards by the experts and their expectations are at least 26,000 salmon for this year. Let's hope this is the beginning of a general upward trend in the run.

Rogue River - The salmon seem to have come out of their slunk and are hitting lures and bait. Biggest one reported was 41 pounds, taken between Casey's and Elk creek on Wednesday. There seems to be a higher percentage of jacks this year and the catches are mainly of jacks. These are sexually precocious fish that make their run on their third year instead of the fourth, fifth, or sixth.

Diamond Lake - Has slowed down for some. Water is still clear with fly hatches daily. Stillfishing has tapered off and trolling is doing the business. When the big ones finish their spawning there should be some 8 to 10-pounders available.

Fish Lake - Is staying hot. Anything is catching fish and a limit is commonplace.

Four Mile - The road has been improved and is free from snow. The kokanee are biting good on FF&W.

Howard Prairie - Things are a bit slow with an occasional 4-pounder being taken. A drifted flatfish fished just so will eventually start a fighting show.

Klamath Lake - Nearly every boat coming in with a five fish limit. FF&W seems to bring in the lunkers right now. Biggest this season is a 12-pounder and the rest run a meager 4 to 5 pounds.

Squaw Lakes - Fair to good, with trolling FF&W flatfish. Bank fishing with cluster eggs is paying off. Swimming is fine and the float now sports a new diving board.

Willow Creek - Is still picking up. It must be hard to hold on to because it's been picking up for the past three weeks.
