Rat Heart Cells Believed Useful
Washington—(Science Service)—Single beating cells from rat hearts are expected to be useful in studying the food and other requirements of human hearts.

The microscopic cells could be used to tell how certain foods, or a lack of them, affect the beating of the single cells. The cells of the rat heart were separated and grown in a test tube by Drs. Isaac Hary and Barbara Farley of the University of California at Los Angeles. How various heart drugs and energy-releasing compounds affect the beating rhythm of the cells is reported here in the current issue of Science.
