Increase in Goal Of United Crusade Drive This Fall

The United Medford Crusade fall goal of \$147,850, a substantial increase over the 1959 aim of \$138,782, was announced by UMC President Richard H. Travis Friday.

In announcing the individual agency allocations and new agencies to receive UMC funds, Travis pointed out that the 10 budget committee members recently held six meetings on agency budget reviews, and in two-member teams, visited each local agency to discuss the budgets for the next fiscal year. With six national agencies being refused membership, the UMC brought in the School of Hope and the Jackson county chapter of the Mental Health association.

Increases ranging from \$200 to \$1,000 were granted to five member agencies, making the member agency budget requests total \$155,574.73 and the actual allocations totaling \$129,850.

Agency allocations made include the American Red Cross, \$21,400; Arthritis and Rheumatism foundation, \$1,200; Boy Scouts, \$18,800; Campfire Girls, \$4,100; Child Guidance clinic, \$5,000; Girl Scouts, \$11,500; Oregon Medical Research, \$3,000; Rogue Valley Council on Aging, \$400; Salvation Army, \$21,000; YMCA, \$22,250; Mental Health association, \$1,000; School of Hope, \$1,200; and Oregon United Appeal, \$19,000.

The Oregon United Appeal represents 16 agencies rendering state-wide service. These agencies include 10 child care agencies which receive 88 per cent of the money allocated to the Oregon United Appeal.

Hal Gardner, the campaign chairman, stated that the goal, although much higher than last year's, could be achieved if a greater emphasis is put on acquainting every potential giver with the facts about community needs, and the work of UMC agencies to meet them.

There is still a large group of people in the community who have not been in the habit of giving because this message has never reached them, he added.

The increase in the goal will not change the employee Fair-Share Giving standard of one hour's pay per month for 12 months, Gardner pointed out.

Gardner said that he and his committee hoped for a lower goal, but he believed the present goal was a realistic one, and represented community needs.

The board of directors elected Robert A. Johnson, manager of the local General Electric company office, as first vice president.

The Rev. Escil Hiser has been appointed a director on the UMC board representing the Mental Health association. Brian Mullen, lawyer, is now a member of the board representing the School of Hope. Herb Partridge accepted appointment as one of the five members appointed by the UMC president each year.

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Estimated timber volume on the tracts is 32,187,000 board feet. The average bid price per thousand board feet was \$35.41, he said.

The highest bid prices were \$51 per thousand board feet for the Douglas-fir and \$45.50 for the Douglas-fir on the Sourgrass creek sale west of Galice. It was purchased by Bate Lumber company of Merlin in competition with Spaulding and Son. Total consideration bid was \$158,956.20 for an estimated 3,639,000 board feet.

Bate Lumber company also was high bidder for 4,693,000 board feet of timber in the Peavine sale, Youngblood said. Sunny Valley Lumber company was Bate's competitor. Bidding concentrated on the Douglas-fir which was raised from \$28.05 to \$44 per thousand board feet, with the total consideration \$192,069.80.

Other bidders included Steve Wilson who submitted an offer of \$54,709 for 2,515,000 board feet in the Sugarpine creek tract in Jackson county; Mt. Fir Lumber company which bid \$323,988.95 for a tract which will be reached by the Central bridge now under construction across the Applegate river; Superior Lumber company which offered the high bid of \$96,129.80 for 2,500,000 board feet in the Tennessee gulch tract in Josephine county; and Southern Oregon

plywood which bid \$278,697.40 for 8,407,000 board feet in another Josephine county tract located on the west fork of Williams creek.

Cabax Mills was the successful bidder for 1,351,000 board feet of timber adjacent to Sucker creek. Sale of this tract had been postponed from the June 9 auction.

Two small tracts of salvage timber in northern Jackson county received no bids and will remain available for purchase for 90 days.

Seven Tracts Offered
At the June 9 auction, seven tracts estimated to contain 30,637,000 board feet received bids totaling \$859,757.50, or an average price per thousand of \$28.06.

Total bid price of advertised tracts offered at the two June auctions was \$1,999,636.70. Fourteen negotiated sales of right of way and other miscellaneous small tracts of timber thus far in June total 117,000 board feet valued at \$2,220.80. This brings the total value of BLM timber sold thus far in June to \$2,001,857.50, according to Youngblood.

The next regular auction will be July 14. Details concerning timber offered for sale are available from the Medford district office, post office box 1108, 1133 South Riverside ave., Medford.

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
