## Night's Low Ties With Date's Coldest

This morning's minimum temperature of 39 degrees tied the record low reading for June 20 at the Medford station of the U. S. weather bureau.

Previous 39-degree minimum on this date was in 1916.

The weather bureau reported that the drop in temperature yesterday and this morning resulted from a cold air mass which moved in and spread over the entire Pacific Northwest. Freezing level for this area was at 5,000 feet elevation. A 34-degree temperature was reported this morning at Sexton mountain summit, which is around 3,800 feet above sea level.

The 73 degree high for Sunday, as well as the cooler week end, cut attendance at the city's swimming pools in half, city officials reported today.
