Malta's Independence Demand Increases Headache for Britain

London - UPI - Britain's outside burden of colonial headaches is being stepped up by new independence demands from tiny but strategic Malta.

The fortress island colony, which until the nuclear rocket age held the defense key to the Central Mediterranean, is clamoring again to join the swelling ranks of former British possessions which have become independent nations.

But Britain, which has ruled the island for 146 years and which decorated it with the coveted George Cross for standing up to Hitler's dive bombers throughout World War II, thinks differently.

Sees No Future

The British government sees no future as an independent nation for Malta's 350,000 population crammed into an area of less than 100 square miles.

Eighteen months ago Britain suspended Malta's constitution and withdrew limited internal self-government because the island's politicians refused to cooperate with her.

Since then the island has been run by the British Governor.

Next month Lord Perth, minister of state in the British Colonial office, is scheduled to visit Malta to seek agreement with Maltese political leaders that would make internal self-government possible again.

But Dom Mintoff, fiery, 44-year-old, Oxford-educated leader of the Maltese Labor Party and the island's most prominent politician, has replied that he will be satisfied with nothing short of total independence.

Stems From Argument

Mintoff had quit as premier in April, 1958, and from then onwards no Maltese politician was willing to form an alternate government, leading to the constitution suspension in January, 1959.

The rumpus stemmed from an argument over the amount of financial subsidy paid by Britain to the impoverished island which lives largely from British handouts.

Curiously, the row followed a vote by the Maltese in February, 1956, for complete political integration with Britain.

But Mintoff demanded an increased British financial subsidy as the price. New fuel was added to the dispute in the spring of 1958 when Britain decided to close down Malta's huge naval dockyard, which provided a livelihood for about one-eighth of the population.

Blow Softened

When Britain suspended the constitution last year she softened the blow by announcing an \$81,200,000 (M) financial subsidy to help out a five-year economic development program for the island. The dockyard was turned over to a British commercial company for repair work for merchant shipping.

But the dispute has embittered relations between Britain and the island and, in particular, with Mintoff himself.

Mintoff said that the only proposal from the British government in which he is interested is complete independence. But there is nothing to indicate Britain is preparing to offer it.

Girl Loses Fingers In Dynamite Blast

Portland - UPI - A nine-year-old Salem girl, Susan Comstock, was in the University of Oregon Medical School hospital here today after a dynamite cap exploded in her hand Saturday in Salem.

Hospital attendants said the child lost all the fingers on her left hand and suffered chest and face injuries.

The accident occurred in an old construction shack in the Liberty area of Salem.

She was taken to the Portland hospital Saturday night in critical condition.

Portland Collision Takes Three Lives

Portland - UPI - A car smashed into a tank truck here Monday, killing the three persons in the car.

Police identified the victims as Gary Delyria, 25; Robert E. Byrd, 29, and Edwin A. McDonald, 28, all of Portland.

The truck driver, Richard E. Cone, Dexter, Ore., was not hurt.

Cone told police the late model car suddenly swerved into his lane and struck the left side of the truck, which was described as a total loss. The truck belonged to Freightliners, Inc.

All three bodies were thrown clear of the car and police were not able to determine immediately who was driving.

Police said that the victims might have lived through the impact if they had been wearing safety belts.

Navy Sounds Taps For Lost Balloon

Point Arguello, Calif. - UPI - The Navy has sounded taps for its delinquent research balloon - wherever it is.

The 40-story sphere, about half as tall as the Empire State Building and as big around as a football field, was launched June 5 from Brunswick, Ga.

It was supposed to come down in the vicinity of Houston, Tex., after a two-day flight recording high altitude cosmic ray information. The data may have been recorded but the balloon didn't come down.

Spokesmen said the two-ton gondola it carried may have fallen into the ocean but the Navy had no idea where the balloon might be.
