SO Pin Tournament Will End on Sunday

Southern Oregon Handicap tournament action at Medford Bowling lanes, which has been underway since May 14, will wrap up this Saturday and Sunday with the biggest week end of the event.

Joe Louis Offers To Coach Ingo

Motion pictures of the heavyweight title fight between Floyd Patterson and Ingemar Johansson will be shown at the Craterian theatre here beginning Sunday. The knockout round will be shown in slow motion.

New York **UPI**—Joe Louis is so confident that a "new" Ingemar Johansson could beat heavyweight Floyd Patterson in a third fight that he has offered to instruct Ingo on a \$50,000-or-nothing basis, it was learned today.

Ex-champion Louis, who coached Patterson during his recent training to recapture the crown from Swedish Ingo last Monday night at the Polo Grounds, believes that certain improvements, particularly in the left jab and left hook, would fit Johansson to conquer Floyd in their "rubber match."

Bomber Joe wants \$50,000 for his advice to Ingemar if he wins back the title but he will accept nothing if Ingo loses.

Johansson To Vacation
The proposition has not yet been put to Johansson, who was flying today to Florida to spend a week's vacation at Hillsboro—near Ft. Lauderdale—with Detroit industrialist Gustav Von Reis. After the Florida rest, Johansson plans to fly to his new at Geneva, Switzerland.

Their return-bout contract calls for a fight within 120 days from last Monday night's battle in which 25-year-old Floyd shattered precedent by recapturing the heavyweight crown. He knocked out the brawn Swede in the fifth round before a crowd of more than 45,000, which included only 31,892 paid and the rest largely gate-crashers.

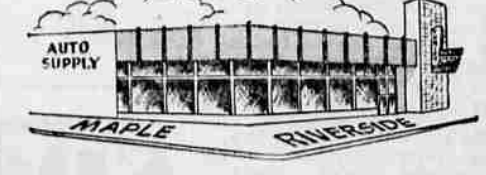
