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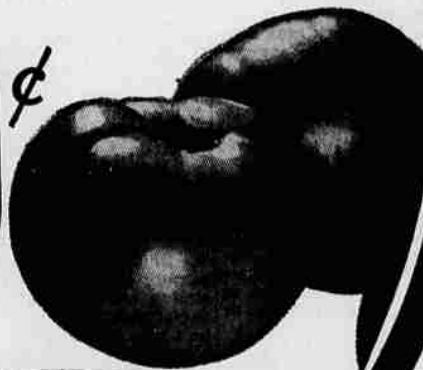

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Nixon Challenged To Help Salvage School Aid Bill

Washington—UPI—Perturbed Democratic school aid supporters challenged Vice President Richard M. Nixon today to help them salvage the federal school aid legislation which was wrecked by the House Rules Committee.

The conservative-dominated committee refused Wednesday to permit a conference to iron out differences between bills passed separately by the Senate and House. The surprise action stunned backers of the legislation.

The committee's 7-5 vote saw all four Republicans join three Southern Democrats in opposing the conference.

Challenges Nixon
Rep. Frank Thompson Jr. (D-N.J.), author of the House bill, challenged Nixon to persuade Republicans on the rules committee to seek re-consideration and to switch votes.

Thompson called the solid GOP vote against the conference a "repudiation of Nixon in no uncertain terms."

The vice president's press secretary told newsmen last week that Nixon was working with House GOP leaders to clear the way for a conference on the school legislation.

Thompson and other Democratic backers had counted on Rep. B. Carroll Reece (R-Tenn.) to vote for the conference because he had voted to clear the House bill when it was stalled in the rules committee earlier this year.

No Immediate Comment
Nixon had no immediate comment on the situation. So far, it was learned, he had not intervened in an effort to win a committee reversal.

The Senate-House dispute over school legislation centers on aid for teachers' salaries and an anti-segregation amendment.

Rules Committee Chairman Howard W. Smith (D-Va.) pressed school aid supporters Wednesday for assurances that the anti-segregation amendment would be dropped if the conference was permitted.

Four likely members of the House conference contingent said they would favor eliminating it, but could give no ironclad assurances this would be done.

Algeria to Send Peace Emissary

Paris—UPI—The Algerian rebel leadership will send their advance peace emissary to Paris probably before the end of the week, informed Tunisian sources said today.

The sources said Tunisian officials were putting heavy pressure on the rebels not to let protocol problems interfere with the first promising chance in five and a half years to end the Algerian war.

The Algerian rebel leadership — which calls itself a "provisional government" — is headquartered in Tunis.

The French government sent one of its planes to Tunis Tuesday to pick up the emissary the rebels said they would send to Paris but the rebels turned down the plane.

Tax Increase Seen In Aged Conference

Portland—UPI—The director of the economic security program for the United States Chamber of Commerce said Wednesday that the upcoming White House conference on the problem of the aged could add more to the taxes of the nation.

Karl T. Schlotterbeck said plans are under way to increase social security benefits and said that people would find increasing tax costs on business and on themselves.

Priscilla Hammer Struck With Hammer

Erie, Pa.—UPI—Mrs. Priscilla Hammer, 19, Erie, was released from the hospital Wednesday, with no apparent injuries after an argument with a neighbor woman. Mrs. Hammer was struck with a hammer.

Code Violation Brings Court Suit

Donald M. Claypool and Elizabeth Anne Claypool have filed a suit against Thomas E. Whittle, contractor, asking that the contract for purchase of a home Whittle built be rescinded and that \$1,900 plus 6 per cent interest from June 5, 1960, be paid.

The Claypools allege in their complaint in Jackson county circuit court that the agreement of Jan. 20, 1960, provided that the Claypools should be furnished a title insurance policy by Whittle which he has refused to do.

The house the Claypools bought was in violation of the Medford building code and zoning ordinances at the time of the purchase and the house is not marketable as a result of the zoning violation. The Claypools allowed Whittle four months to correct the violation, but Whittle failed to do so, the Claypools charge further.

College Student 'Miss Tall of 1960'

Atlanta—UPI—A 5-foot, 10-inch college student from Atlanta was named "Miss Tall America of 1960" Wednesday in competition with 15 other long-stemmed beauties from over the nation.

The winner was Connie Adams, 22, who plans to become a school teacher this fall.

Runnerup was Elizabeth Schaefer of Los Angeles, and third place went to Patricia Anderson of Dallas. The contest was held in connection with the annual Tall Club National Convention attended by the long and lanky from over the United States.

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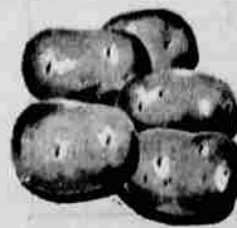
