

Body Hormone Most Powerful Heart Stimulant

Kingston, R. I. - (By Science Service) - A body hormone, aldosterone, has been found to be 250 times as powerful a heart stimulant as the most effective drugs known.

Drs. Ralph D. Tanz and George Sayers of Western Reserve University in Cleveland, Ohio, reported at the American Chemical Society's medicinal Chemistry Symposium here today (June 21) that the chemical structure of this hormone could serve as a model for more efficient drugs to treat heart disease.

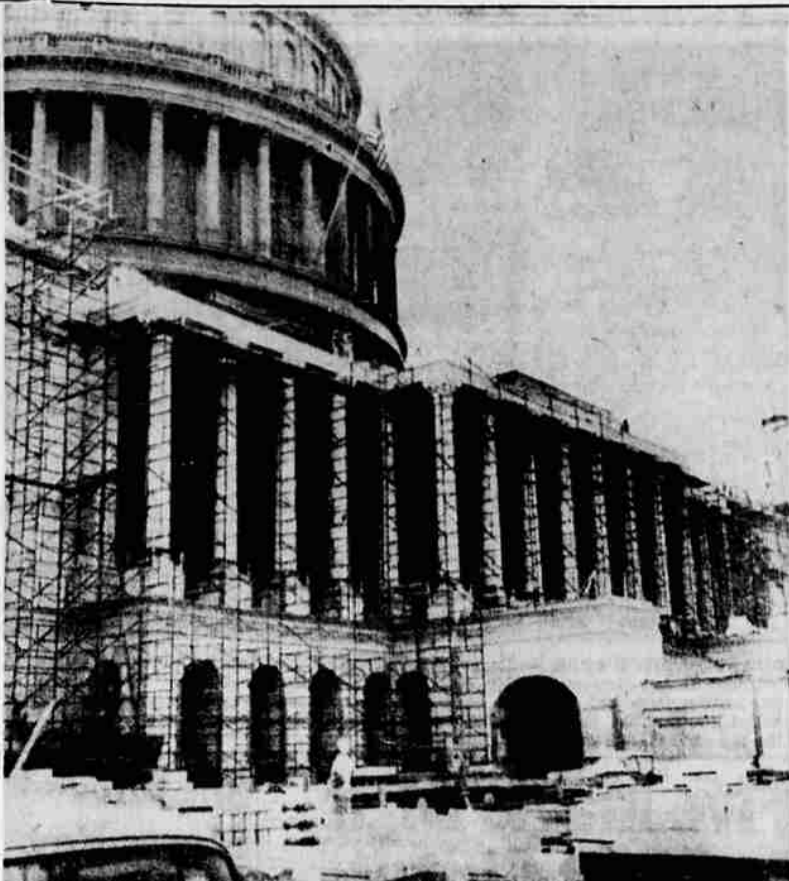
In the treatment of heart disease, the most important drugs available are the cardiac glycosides. Unfortunately they are rather toxic when administered in large doses.

The Cleveland doctors found that aldosterone caused muscle contraction in the same way that digitalis and other heart drugs do, but that the amount needed was only 1/250th as much as ouabain, one of the most powerful heart stimulants.

In experiments with isolated heart tissue, the doctors found that aldosterone has "apparently provided us with a cardiac glycoside (heart-stimulating drug) of our own."

Ordinarily, the adrenal glands produce small quantities of aldosterone but in victims of heart attacks, the level is markedly elevated.

The doctors said this indicates a protective mechanism to improve the function of the failing heart.

Former Leader of Darby's Rangers Sees Future Use

Washington (AP) - Is Guerrilla warfare a thing of the past? A former company commander in Darby's Rangers, famous guerrilla fighters of World War II, thinks not.

James Altieri, who rose from corporal to major in the Rangers, predicts that Ranger-type troops operating from nuclear submarines will play an important part in any future war.

He cited their self-sufficiency, mobility, ease of penetration into the enemy's heartland and their ability to operate in small numbers.

Not Susceptible

Large armies, large surface ships and intercontinental missiles, Altieri said, are especially vulnerable to modern counter-attacks. But guerrilla bands, operating from nuclear submarines which can land them undetected at remote beaches, are not susceptible to atomic retaliation and, as the Communist Chinese most recently demonstrated in Korea, they can damage an enemy far out by proportion to their numbers.

Altieri, a free-lance writer who recently published a history of Darby's Rangers, said these small groups of highly-trained, highly-motivated troops could be armed with atomic weapons.

Operating at night, they could "wreak havoc on the enemy far out by proportion to their numbers, destroy his communications and his supply lines and terrorize the population," he said.

In the Days News

From London as this is written: Reports seeping in here from a CLOSED COMMUNIST SUMMIT MEETING in Bucharest (capital of communist satellite Romania) indicated today that Nikita Khrushchev had won a major victory over RED CHINA for his policy of peaceful co-existence and had proclaimed another dramatic break with the past.

WHAT happened?
What did he do?
What did he say?

MOSCOW radio quotes him as saying at this closed meeting of communist big shots:

"We live in a time when we have neither Marx nor Engels nor Lenin with us. If we act like children who, studying the alphabet, compile words from letters, we shall not go far."

As written, that sounds vague and foggy. But we must remember that Nikita K spoke in Russian. Perhaps the translation was bad. Anyway, he seems to be saying that communism can no longer survive and grow by PARROT-LIKE repetition of the teachings of Marx and Engels and Lenin... who lived quite a while ago.

THE K speech in Bucharest was carried not only by Moscow radio but also by Tass, the communist news agency. The Tass version is less foggy. It quotes K as saying:

"NO WORLD WAR IS NEEDED for the triumph of socialist ideas throughout the world. THESE IDEAS WILL GET THE UPPER HAND IN PEACEFUL COMPETITION BETWEEN THE COUNTRIES OF SOCIALISM AND CAPITALISM."

Why is that important, if true?
Here is why:

KARL MARX, who lived and wrote and taught about a century ago, propounded unceasingly the doctrine of an INEVITABLE WAR that would be the final funeral pyre of capitalism. It would be a war between the capitalists and the proletariat. Because the proletarians would be infinitely more numerous than the capitalists, he held, victory of the proletariat would be inevitable.

Engels, who was a contemporary of Marx, supported this theory. Lenin, who came along nearly a half century later than Marx and Engels, also upheld it.

What is NOW important - RED CHINA STILL believes in the Marxist doctrine of inevitable war as the funeral pyre of capitalism. China's communist leaders think China (because of her vastness and her masses of population) could SURVIVE a nuclear war that would bring down the capitalist world in ruin and desolation.

The Chinese view is that with the capitalists wiped out the communists would take over and build a new world after their own pattern.

NOTE the K statement in Bucharest that no world war is needed for the triumph of socialist ideas throughout the world - that these ideas will get the upper hand in PEACEFUL competition between the countries of socialism and capitalism.

That - if he actually said it - could be very important.
