

Cars Match Speeds In Drag Contention

Competition in today's drag races at White City will be gunning their sleek acceleration machines toward the strip gasoline record of 145.63 per hour.

Should any contestant exceed this mark he will walk off with the \$100 bond posted on this mark. Otherwise, the award will be increased to \$125 for the first meet next month.

The above record speed belongs to Warren Welsh, Reno, Nev. He set the mark last September behind the wheel of his rear-engine dragster.

Southern Oregon Timing officials said yesterday that interest always increases when the bond builds up to over the \$100 mark. Last season, the late Jay Cheatham in 1958 wasn't bettered until late in the summer when Welsh and his crew established the new standard.

160.87 mph Fastest

The fastest speed ever recorded on the Medford strip is 160.87 mph set last September by the Glass Slipper from Sacramento, Calif. Inasmuch as this speed was recorded by a dragster burning special 'fuel' it did not qualify for the strip gasoline mark.

Several all-out acceleration machines are expected to be trying every angle today in their attempt to set a new mark.

Although there will only be a few entries shooting for the strip mark there will be many contestants gunning for

new marks in their classes. Some 100 entries are expected to provide keen competition for those getting into the winners circle.

Time trials are slated to open this morning at 9:30 with the eliminations billed after lunch.

Trophies will be awarded to all class winners, to all eliminators and for top time of the day.

Rule Change

Contestants who participate in the 'stock' classes are reminded that stock vehicles with floor shift controls will be allowed to participate in those classes. This is a rule change.

Of special interest today will be a duel between Larry Sands of Central Point and the 'Zombie' owned by the Wheelers club of Medford. The Wheelers 'Zombie' which is an 'A' class competition coupe has been a consistent winner at the Medford strip for 15 consecutive meets. This year Sands built a car to run in the same class and last week at Redding defeated the favored Zombie.

SOTA officials emphasized that no car will be allowed to compete without a thorough safety check.

The SOTA drag strip is located seven miles north of Medford off the Crater Lake highway.

Flowers Free Of Giant Hold

Oxford, Miss. — (UPI) — All American fullback Charlie Flowers, free of a legal hold imposed by the New York Giants, will report for practice in two weeks with the Los Angeles Chargers of the new American Football league.

Federal Judge Claude Clayton Thursday threw out a lawsuit brought by the Giants of the National Football league to stop the former Ole Miss star from playing with the Chargers.

It was the second victory of the young AFL over the older, established NFL this week.

A Los Angeles judge ruled Monday that former Louisiana State great Billy Cannon was free to play for the Houston Oilers of the AFL rather than the NFL Los Angeles Rams in a similar suit.

Winnipeg, Man. — (UPI) — The New York Giants lost another player dispute Friday when linebacker Jack Delveaux was ruled the property of the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian football league. Delveaux was signed by the Bombers two weeks ago after the Giants announced that the 225-pound former Illinois star was under contract to them.

John Thomas Ups Leap Mark to 7-2

Bakersfield, Calif. (UPI) — If the rest of the field can keep up to high jumper John Thomas, Uncle Sam's boys won't have any trouble in the 1960 Olympic Games in Rome.

The towering Boston University athlete cleared the bar at 7 feet, 2 inches Friday night to set a world record. And he did it in the face of adversity in the form of a wind that once knocked off the cross-bar.

Wind was strong enough in the 85 degree heat in the stadium basin at 11 p.m. to make Ray Norton a winner in the 100 meter dash in 10.5 seconds. That would be equal to about a slow 9.8 in the 100 yard dash.

But the wind didn't bother Thomas.

He cleared 7-2 on his second leap. But before he could leave the pit, the wind knocked off the cross-bar.

"I was disappointed and it took a lot out of me when the jump was disallowed," said Thomas later. "But I made up for it with that next jump. This time the cross-bar stayed on. But I was so

tired from the efforts that I didn't want to try 7-3."

Officials at the pit said that each time Thomas went over he cleared the bar without touching it. In fact, the high jump judge wanted to allow Thomas' first successful effort.

But Pincus Sober, the meet referee, refused to allow the performance.

Two other AAU records were set Friday night when Parry O'Brien heaved the shot 62 feet, 6 1/4 inches; and Marine Al Cantillo tossed the javelin 271 feet, 9 inches.
