

Baltimore Closes On League Lead With 11-2 Win Over KC

The Baltimore Orioles climbed to within three percentage points of the American league lead Saturday when they crushed the Kansas City Athletics, 11-2, with a 16-hit attack that included home runs by Gus Triandos, Brooks Robinson and rookie Dave Nicholson.

The Orioles did most of their damage against knuckleballer Bud Daley, who gave up six runs before departing after three innings. The loss for Daley was only his third against 10 victories.

Baltimore clinched the outcome with a five-run outburst in the third inning, during which Ron Hansen, Walt Dropp and Triandos hit successive doubles and Robinson smacked his fifth homer of the season.

Triandos collected four of the Orioles' hits and drove in three runs. Robinson also drove in three. Right-hander Bill Pappas, who won his sixth game, struck out six and allowed six hits. Andy Carey homered for the A's. Kuenn, Power Homer.

Dick Stigman's four-hit pitching plus homers by Vic Power and Harvey Kuenn led the Cleveland Indians to a 4-1 victory over the New York Yankees.

Stigman struck out 10 and walked only two while recording his third victory against four losses. Both Cleveland homers came off Ralph Terry, who was tagged with his third defeat. Power hit his homer with the bases empty in the first inning and Kuenn hit his with one on in the sixth.

The Chicago White Sox came from behind twice and then beat the Boston Red Sox, 7-6, in the 12th inning when Joe Ginsberg scored from third base on Tom Sturdivant's wild pitch.

Ginsberg opened the 12th with a double, moved up on Jim Landis' sacrifice and

came home when Sturdivant committed a wild pitch with Luis Aparicio at bat. Bob Shaw, Chicago's seventh pitcher, was the winner.

Boston jumped to a 4-0 lead but Chicago scored three runs in the sixth off Tom Brewer and then tied the score in the seventh. Russ Nixon put the Red Sox ahead again when he singled home two runs in the 10th but the White Sox tied the score again on four singles and a sacrifice fly.

Billy Conso's pinch double in the 14th inning broke up a tie and paced the Washington Senators to a 6-4 win over the Detroit Tigers.

Jose Valdivielso opened the 14th with a single off loser Pete Burnside and was sacrificed to second. Conso batted for Harmon Killebrew and doubled to score Valdivielso. Conso advanced to third on a fly ball and scored an insurance run on Bob Allison's bunt single.

Hal Woodeshick of the Senators and rookie Bob Bruce of the Tigers both pitched scoreless ball until the seventh when Julio Becquer hit a two-run homer for Washington. Charlie Maxwell hit his 12th homer for Detroit in the 11th. Reliever Chuck Stobbs was the winning pitcher.
