However, Janet Hopps of Seattle, Wash., the U.S. Wightman Cup team captain, and veteran Mrs. Dorothy Head Knode of Forest Hills, N.Y., failed in similar bids.

Portmarnock, Ireland—UPI—Slammin' Sammy Snead blazed around Portmarnock's Seaside Acres with a rive-under-par 67 Saturday for a three-shot lead in the International Trophy and Canada Cup Golf championships.

Snead's brilliant third round (33-4) picked up struggling Arnold Palmer and gave the United States a three stroke edge on 29 rival nations.

The 48-year-old Snead, playing like a boy in the winds which whipped in off the Irish Sea, posted his third sub-par round for a ten-under-par 54-hole total of 206 which put him three strokes ahead of Belgium's Flori Van Donck with only today's 18 hole final round remaining.

THRIFTWAY Posts Win In Detroit Detroit—UPI—Miss Thriftway, the invader from Seattle, blazed home far in front of the rest of the field on the final heat Saturday to win the 14th annual Detroit Memorial power boat race by 300 points, with a 1,200 total.

Miss Thriftway, driven by Bill Muncey, finished with a time of 98.013 on the final heat for its third victory of the day.

The neck-and-neck battle between Miss Thriftway and Miss U.S. 1, the leading Detroit candidate that deadlocked with Miss Thriftway going into the final heat, never materialized. The Detroit boat, driven by Don Wilson, collapsed right after the starting gun on the final heat when the front end of its blower blew off.

Once Miss U.S. 1 was out of the race, Miss Thriftway breezed in with no trouble for its second big powerboat championship of the year.

The Seattle craft won the Apple cup at Lake Chelan, Wash., last month. Miss Thriftway also set a new world's mile straightway record of 192,000 miles per hour earlier in the year.

By United Press International The Pittsburgh Pirates preserved their 3½ game lead in the National league race Saturday when they hammered the Chicago Cubs their ninth straight setback, 7-6.

Pittsburgh's payoff run came in the seventh on a triple by Rocky Nelson and Smoky Burgess' sacrifice fly. Ernie Banks kept the Cubs' hopes alive when he singled in the ninth to put Chicago within one run of a tie but Elroy Face ended the game by striking out Ed Bouchee. Paul Giel, second of four Pirate pitchers, gained his first victory of the season while Bob Anderson suffered his fourth loss.

Bob Buhl, an old Dodger-killer from way back, was credited with Milwaukee's 4-2 triumph over Los Angeles even though he wasn't around at the finish. Rookie Ron Piehe relieved Buhl in the seventh and Warren Spahn locked up the victory in the ninth.

23 Wins Over Dodgers The victory was Buhl's eighth of the season and 23rd over the Dodgers during his career compared with only nine losses against them.

Red Schoendienst homered off loser Don Drysdale in the second inning, the Braves added their second run on three singles in the fourth and pushed across the deciding

run in the fifth. The loss brought Drysdale's record to 4-10.

Billy O'Dell, supported by a 13-hit attack, pitched the San Francisco Giants to a 5-2 victory over the Cincinnati Reds. The Giants bunched four hits for three runs in the third inning and chased loser Cal McLish with two more in the fourth.

O'Dell, now 3-7, yielded 10 hits, including a homer by Wally Post. McLish's record now is 3-5.

Ninth Inning Homer Southpaw Curt Simmons won his first game for the St. Louis Cardinals when Ken Boyer hit a ninth inning homer to beat the Philadelphia Phillies, 1-0. Pitching against his former teammates, Simmons struck out six and allowed six hits over 8 2/3 innings. Lindy McDaniel relieved Simmons with one on in the ninth and got Pancho Herrera to fly out, ending the game. Boyer's homer, his 19th of the season, came on loser Jim Owens' first pitch in the ninth.

Freak Accident Ruins Chances Of Oregon Ace Bakersfield, Calif.—UPI—A freak accident kept Ted Abram, Portland, from a chance to qualify for the U.S. Olympic finals at Friday night's National AAU meet here.

Abram, running in the 800 meters, was third with 10 yards to go when the pack bunched up as he and Navy's George Ketterman were pushed to the track. Neither finished in the top four to qualify for the semi-finals. Abram suffered an injured knee, and he was scratched from the semi-finals heat.

An Emerald Empire AA entry, high hurdler Jerry Tarr, a Bakersfield athlete, finished fourth in his event.

Amos Marsh of Oregon State battled to the 100 meters finish, and finished seventh. Since two more 100 meter men were to be named for the Stanford finals, he might have been one of them. Jim Grelle of the Emerald Empire AA finished fourth to advance to the finals.

Otis Davis of the Emerald Empire AA ran second in his 400 meters heat to qualify for last night's finals. Those failing to qualify for last night's finals included Bob Lawson, Broad jump, and Ron Bach, 400 meters, both OSC.
