Those attending are to take their own table service and a covered dish. Those needing transportation are to meet in Library city park at 12:45 p.m.

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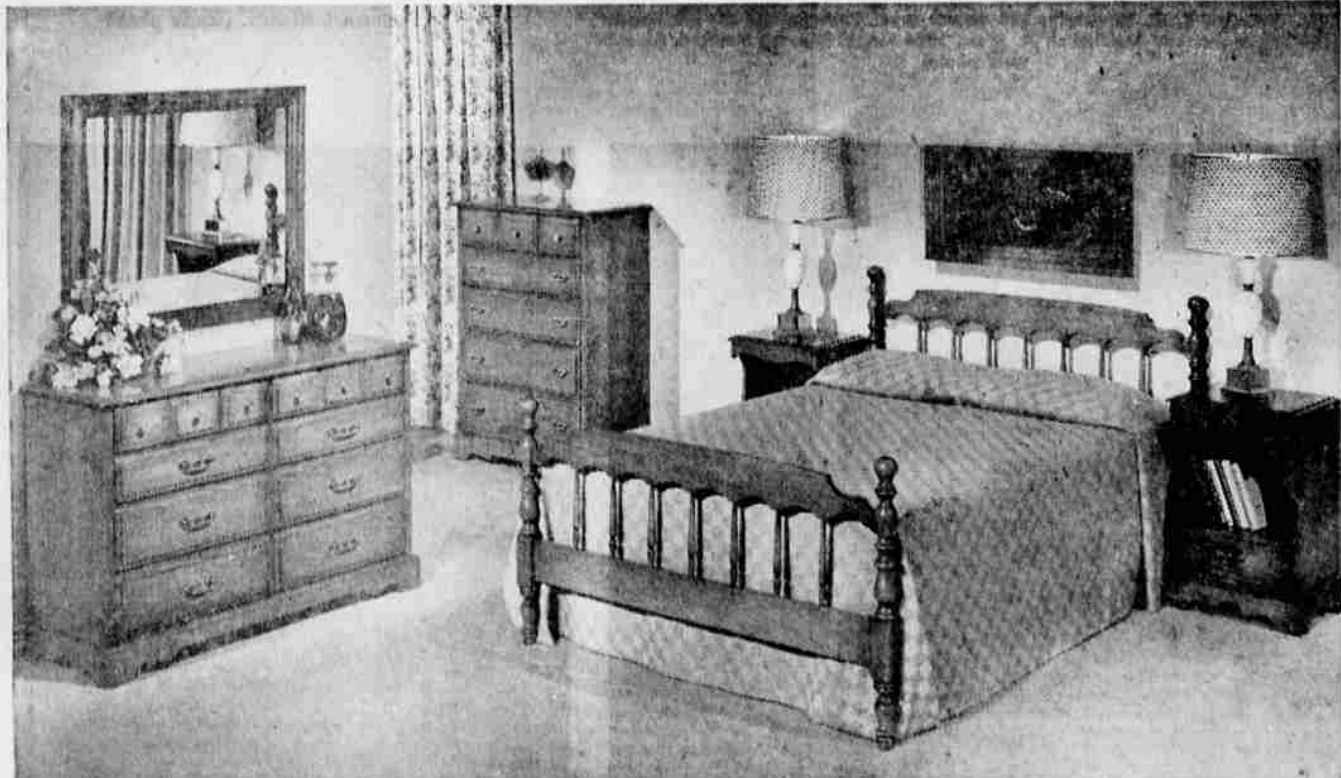
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
