Maria Callas Slated To Sing 'Norma' In Centuries-Old Theater

Renowned Greek soprano Maria Callas is scheduled to sing the leading role of Bellini's "Norma" in three performances of the opera to be given August 21-24-28 at the ancient open-air theater of Epidauros, near Nauplia, Greece.

The Greek National Opera company has arranged the performances, which will be conducted by the well known Italian maestro, Tullio Serafin. Seating 17,000 persons, the centuries-old outdoor theater has been hailed as being near-perfect acoustically.

Nauplia is readily accessible by rail and road from Athens, which is served through the port of Piraeus by regular sailings of the Greek Line flagship Olympia from New York.
