Home Economics Course Basis of Many Careers

Corvallis-Oregon girls who are thinking about going to college this fall may find the combination of travel, good salaries, and preparation for their roles as tomorrow's homemakers—in home economics.

Miss Miriam Scholl, dean of home economics at Oregon State college, offers this report on the 1960 class of 89 graduates from OSC's School of Home Economics.

All but five of the 89 graduating seniors are either planning on some type of employment, are full-time homemakers, or are continuing school. Seven girls will continue their studies either in certification programs or in graduate school. One of these girls, Lynne Schaper, California, will attend the University of Chicago Graduate School of Social Work with the aid of two scholarships amounting to \$2500. Kathy Ingle, Ashland, has accepted a teaching fellowship at the Ohio State university, Columbus, Ohio.

Of the 46 girls prepared to teach, 23 already have teaching positions. Patricia Snowden Roppel, Ellensburg, Wash., finished school last fall and traveled to Alaska to teach. Kathryn Wright, Junction City, wanted to see another part of the U.S. accepted a teaching position in New Haven, Conn. Other OSC home economics grads will be teaching up and down the West Coast from Astoria to Bakersfield, Calif. Two students plan to teach in nursery schools.

Two of the class of 1960 will be teachers in the informal adult and youth education program-cooperative extension service. Judy Steele, Astoria, has joined the Washington County extension staff, and Charlotte Kofford, Baker, will also work as an extension agent.

Twenty graduates chose business as a profession. They will take jobs in retailing and merchandising clothing, and help consumers in buying household equipment and food.

Two graduates already have positions as airline hostesses. One senior will be a secretary while her husband continues school, and five girls received "dietetic internships" which offer advanced training in foods. Young dieticians include three Portland girls—Barbara Anders, Rachelle Dawson, and Patricia Thomas. Others are Ingrid Bakken, Honolulu and Rita Zukers, Springfield. Two OSC home

economists plan to work in welfare or youth agencies.

Of course, marriage continues to be the number one career of many of the graduates, notes Dean Scholl. Twenty-two seniors were married before graduation and six of them have one or more children. Twenty more will be married some time this summer. Teacher Placement Bureau have been most helpful to couples planning marriage in finding positions in the same school district.

Some of these young home economists will delay their careers until their husbands or fiances are located with the Armed Forces in graduate school or in business.

Slides of Thailand To Include Areas Far From Usual Routes

Members of the Arm Chair Travel group will see colored slides of Thailand Monday at 1 p.m. at the Senior Activity Center. They will be shown by Col. H. J. Meiring who returned May 10 from a six months visit in Thailand.

Among the pictures Colonel Meiring will show are those taken on a trip to New Delhi, India, and Cambodia. The Medford man was a guest of his stepson and family, Major and Mrs. Robert B. Harpader, who were living in Bangkok, Thailand. Major Harpader, an advisor to the Thai army, and Colonel Meiring traveled by jeep to Chiang Mai, 1200 miles north of Bangkok, which was the capital of the country during the 13th Century when it was Siam. En route north the men visited the construction site of the Yan Hee dam on the Ping river which is being built 400 miles north of Bangkok. The dam will be one of the seven largest in the world when completed. Construction is being done by 6,000 Thai workers under the supervision of 93 engineers.
