

# Gentile Drives in Seven Tallies To Propel Baltimore Into Lead

Rookie Jim Gentile is the American league's new batting leader and that makes it tough for Tokyo but bully for first-place Baltimore.

Gentile, purchased conditionally from St. Paul for \$20,000 during the off season, was all set to go to Japan and play if he failed to make good with the Orioles.

He looked futile with Baltimore this spring and began to think more and more about his trip to the Far East.

"I wasn't fooling," says the slugging, 26-year-old first baseman. "Rather than go back to the minors, I would have gone to Japan."

Paul Richards stuck with Gentile, however, and the Orioles paid St. Paul the money for him only a few weeks ago. The transaction could easily develop into the baseball steal of the year.

**His Two Homers**

Gentile slammed his ninth and 10th homers of the season against Kansas City Sunday one with two on in the sixth inning and another with the bases full in the seventh - to drive in seven runs in a 9-2 victory that powered the Orioles into first place. Along with it, he vaulted to the top of the league in hitting with a .347 average and jumped to second place in the runs-batted-in department with 49.

Rookie Chuck Estrada, supported by Gentile's two homers plus another by Gene Woodling, breezed to his eighth victory with a two-hitter under the eight when Bill Tuttle singled and Andy Carey homered.

The Indians knocked the Yankees out of first place by winning the second game of a double-header, 7-6, in 11 innings after losing the opener, 6-2. The White Sox swept a pair from the Red Sox, 4-3 and 21-7 (that's no misprint), and the Senators took two from the Tigers, 4-2 and 7-4.

**Win Two**

In the National league, the last-place Cubs snapped a nine-game losing streak with 7-6 and 7-5 victories over the first-place Pirates. Despite the two losses, the Pirates lost only a half game of their lead and they still are three games

up on the second-place Braves, who lost to the Dodgers, 6-3. The Reds beat the Giants, 10-4, while the Phillies won a 3-2 decision over the Cardinals in a 12-inning opener and then lost the nightcap, 4-3.

Southpaw Whitey Ford stopped the Indians on four hits in winning the opener for the Yankees, who knocked out Ted Bowsfield with a three-run burst in the sixth.

Roger Maris was the key man in the nightcap. He kept the Yankees in the game with his 21st and 22nd homers of the season and then committed an 11th inning error on pinch hitter Bob Hale's double that allowed Hank Foiles to score the winning run, Jim Perry was the winner and Johnny James the loser.

Billy Pierce and Early Wynn hurled the White Sox to their two wins over the Red Sox. Pierce pitched a five-hitter and drove in two runs in the opener and Wynn coasted in the nightcap as the White Sox turned the game into a shambles with 11 runs in the fourth inning. Sherm Lollar led Chicago's 22-hit attack in the nightcap with four hits.

Pedro Ramos and Don Lee teamed up for Washington's opening game triumph over Detroit with Ramos registering his fourth victory. The Senators scored all of their runs and eight of their hits off Frank Lary. In the nightcap, Washington chased loser Paul Foytack with a four-run burst in the first inning and after Lew Burberet's three-run homer drew the Tigers within one run in the seventh, Reno Bertoia hit a two-run homer for the Senators in the eighth. Bill Fischer gained his third victory.

The Cubs beat Pirates ace Bob Friend and Vern Law in their sweep. Friend, trying for his 10th win in the opener, was rapped for 10 hits and six runs in 4 2/3 innings. Mark Freeman was the winner although requiring Don Egan's help in the ninth when the Pirates rallied for four runs. Law, shooting for his 12th victory in the nightcap, gave up all seven Chicago runs during the eight innings he worked. Errors by Don

Hoak and Bob Skinner helped Chicago score four runs in the sixth. Seth Morehead was the winning pitcher.

Rookie Frank Howard drove in four runs with two homers as the Dodgers downed the Braves, Johnny Podres held Milwaukee to seven hits for his seventh victory against six losses. Lew Burdette was tagged with his third loss compared with eight victories.

**Purkey Wins Seventh**

Bob Purkey scored his seventh victory for the Reds although the Giants got to him for 11 hits. The Reds scored two runs in the first inning on Andre Rodgers' error and doubles by Vada Pinson and Gus Bell, then drove Jack Sanford to the showers with a four-run rally in the third. Wally Post and Orlando Cepeda hit homers.

Tony Gonzalez' 12th inning homer off Ernie Broglio gave the Phils their opening game victory but Broglio came back in relief in the nightcap to win and bring his record to 6-4. The Cards erased a two-

run deficit in the nightcap when Hal Smith hit a three-run homer in the ninth inning.

## Cincinnati Victor 10-4 Over Giants

Pittsburgh —(UPI)—The San Francisco Giants enjoy a welcome rest today after succumbing to the ways of defeat again Sunday, 10-4, at Cincinnati.

The Giants, who bagged their second straight triumph over the Reds, 5-2, Saturday, couldn't do anything right Sunday.

And life doesn't figure to get much better for San Francisco starting Tuesday night when it opens a three-game series with Pittsburgh. The league-leading Pirates swept three straight over the Giants just two weeks ago in Candlestick Park.

San Francisco, now six games behind Pittsburgh and three back of runnerup Milwaukee, blew a first-inning two-run lead and had four pitchers shelled for 12 hits and nine earned runs.

**Bressoud Shelled**

Possibly even more damaging than the game loss, however, was the sick bay report of shortstop Ed Bressoud, who injured an ankle sliding into third base Saturday. He'll probably miss the entire Pittsburgh series.

The Giants started off big in the first inning when they tallied twice on doubles by Don Blasingame and Willie Mays and a single by Orlando Cepeda.

But shortstop Andre Rodgers' error and doubles by Vada Pinson and Gus Bell tied the score in the Reds' half. Cincinnati came back with four more in the third to send starter Jack Sanford to the showers.

Johnny Antonelli took the long walk in the fourth as the Reds peppered a cross two more. Joe Shipley gave up another run in the fifth, and Wally Post homered off Bud Byerly in the eighth for the final Cincinnati marker.

**Too Little - Too Late**

Cepeda blasted his 15th homer of the season in the eighth for San Francisco and Willie Kirkland doubled home the third and final Giant run in the ninth.

Blasingame went 4-for-5 at the plate to help cause the mind of manager Tom Sheehan. And Mays extended his hitting streak to 12 consecutive games. Despite striking out three times Sunday, the centerfielder leads all National league batsmen with a .348 percentage.
