

### Dairy Maids Play Lind Florists Tonight; Nudge Port Angeles in Twinbill

Rogue Valley Dairy Maids, fired by their best week end so far in the Northwest Women's Major Softball league, go against potentially tougher opposition tonight and Tuesday.

They entertain the loop-pacing Evr Lind Florists of Portland at Memorial stadium, White City. An 8 p.m. game time is planned for each occasion.

In the Florists, the Dairy Maids are going up against the league leader, The Evr Lind aggregation, defending league and regional champion and runner-up for the national crown in 1959, heads the current campaign in the NW circuit with an undefeated status.

Rogue Valley ranks third or fourth in the loop. Up to the moment standings in the league are not available.

**Fast Company**

The Florists have a long history of top notch softball. But, the Dairy Maids, a much newer organization, are not strangers to strong company.

The Portlanders will come here on the way back from an extended non-league tour. In Utah, the Florists won three of five from Salt Lake City Shamrocks. At Phoenix, Ariz., they dropped three to the Ramblers. They come here after meeting Huntington Park, Calif., in a four game series.

Mazzuca and Rice are the main pitchers.

Memorial Stadium, White City - Doris Hickson dashed home for the winning run in one conflict and doubled in the winning and tying tallies in the other here Saturday night as the Rogue Valley Dairy Maids recorded their first series sweep of the 1960 Northwest Women's Major Softball league season.

Rogue Valley lagged 2 to 4 when it came up for its seventh inning batting turn in the nightcap. Shirley Hanson and Toni Owens opened the rally with singles and Hanson ran to third base when Owens hit was muffed in the outfield. On a double steal Hanson scored.

Diane Wall drew a base on balls and the runners advanced when Bernice Bigham grounded out. Owens was out at the plate on a fielder's choice when Helen Wolgamott knocked the ball to shortstop Janet Pfaff walked. Then Hickson doubled to send home Wall and Wolgamott. Actually the victory blow was good for at least three bases, but the game was over the instant Wolgamott, running from second, crossed with the knot-busting run.

The Maids didn't score, and, in fact, went hitless, until the fifth inning of the second game. At that point Callaghan started things off with a home run. Both entries had recorded almost identical times during time trials and it was not until the two came to the starting line together that all realized the chips were down both of the sleek competition machines streaked off toward the finish line one-fourth mile away. The fast-starting Sands and Gagner machine pulled Zombie off the line by about a car length and maintained a lead for several hundred yards.

Near the end Zombie pilot Bub Hewitt shifted into high gear and the powerful super-charged Chrysler started passing the Sands-driven coupe. Just before the finish line

was reached the more powerful Wheelers entry sponsored by Jack's drive-up and the 21 club of Medford pulled ahead to edge the Herm's Body shop entry by less than a length.

**Unable To Pass**

The Wheelers coupe had won the class trophy and now had won the right to run for top eliminator honors of the meet.

The victories gave them the right to compete in the U.S. Olympic tryouts next week end in Stanford, Calif.
