

Hatfield Reviews Air National Guard

Portland - (UPI) - More than 1,200 airmen were present Saturday as Gov. Mark Hatfield reviewed units of the Oregon Air National Guard at the Portland air base.

Hatfield made the review from a jeep and was accompanied by Maj. Gen. Alfred E. Hintz, Oregon adjutant general, and Col. Waldo E. Timm, commander of the airmen.

The governor presented service medals to one officer—Maj. William H. Ardrey Jr., for 32 years service—and eight enlisted men.

The governor left Sunday for the Governor's conference at Glacier, Mont.



Political Side in Possible Missile Firm Site in State

Washington - There is a political side to all the anticipation now being expressed

for the prospect that a California missile-manufacturing firm, Aerojet, may build an industrial plant on the old Boardman bombing range along the Columbia river near John Day dam.

The political figure who can lure a major industrial payroll to his state is a hero. Right now everyone is taking a flier at landing Aerojet somewhere in the Pacific Northwest. And the president of that firm, Dan Kimball, knows a thing or two about politics and is being most cooperative with everyone.

Gov. Mark Hatfield and his industrial relations experts at Salem were first to put out the line to Aerojet. They worked out the deal with the Navy, after it dragged its feet for a long time, to have the Boardman range swapped to the state for some land down in Lake county that no industry is now interested in.

But the big question was whether Aerojet - or anyone else - was ready to announce plans for building a plant on what everyone agrees will be prime industrial property in Oregon's future. The governor had no assurances, only hopes that something would connect to make his forecast of a missile-age industrial park come true within the near future.

In Portland, Mrs. Maurice Neuberger got into the matter by announcing she had communicated with Kimball and been assured that his firm was very much interested but wouldn't decide before fall.

Mrs. Neuberger is a close friend of both Kimball and his wife, who is Doris Fleeson, the syndicated political columnist.

Now the Washington state politicians are climbing into the affair. Gov. Albert Rosellini, who is up for reelection, has put out a lure for Aerojet. He has suggested a group of sites in the Evergreen state which would make likely alternates to Boardman.

Aerojet will need 5,000 acres of land, a deep water frontage two miles long and major rail and highway connections.

Sens. Warren G. Magnuson and Henry M. Jackson got into the act and got Kimball on the telephone to see what was going on. Kimball assured them he was sending his assistant to evaluate these various Washington state sites - one as Pasco, others at Camas and Washougal, another in the Grays Harbor area, and a fourth in Benton county.

Prominent Democrat Kimball, of course, is a prominent Democrat, former Navy Secretary during the Truman administration, and a friend of the Washington state senators. He told Magnuson he wouldn't have a decision probably until the end of the year.

Magnuson says he feels Kimball is ready to shift some operations to the northwest just because it affords more attractive living conditions for the engineers and scientists who are at such a premium today.

Others say Aerojet's decision rests on whether the firm gets a Defense department contract for manufacture of solid fuel used in some of the new missiles. This, in turn, may rest upon which party or which candidate wins the presidential election, and whether the defense budget will remain at current levels or is raised as several Democratic hopefuls are demanding.

That is the political side of defense-connected industrialization.

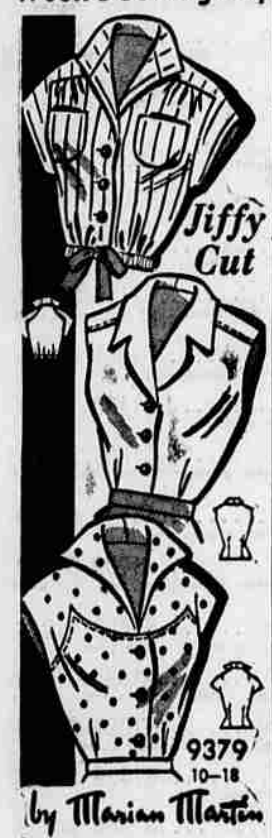
Portlander Killed In Terrebone Crash

Italian Immigrant Says America Still Land of Opportunity

New York - (UPI) - Bernard Castro, who came to this country from Italy as a boy of 14 and made a fortune, thinks America still is the land of opportunity for anyone who isn't afraid to dream and work hard.

At 55, Castro has built a highly successful business because he believed furniture ought to serve more than one function. His name is now a synonym for convertible furniture.

His Castro Convertible corporation grosses more than \$20 million a year. His eight factories turn out a wide variety of convertible sofa beds, ottomans, cocktail tables and other items. Forty-four stores bear his name and the number is growing rapidly.

It is a far cry from the day Castro came to this country in 1919 and got a job with an Italian bank at a weekly salary of \$8.

Another Way "Watching the deposits that others were making, I quickly realized that there must be another way of making money," he recalled. "I went to night school and learned English and typing."

"Very early in my career I adopted the principle that a good way to be successful was to provide people with what they wanted and what they needed. This is a principle that I have kept in mind ever since. It is the cornerstone of my business today: offering people what they need."

In 1920, Castro quit the bank and apprenticed himself to an upholsterer to learn the business. He spent his evenings at night school. Finally, in 1931, in the depths of the depression, he launched his own business with a loan of \$300, opening a small interior decorating shop on New York's lower Fifth ave.

He married, and he and his wife, Theresa, worked long hours side by side. The business prospered, despite the bad times.

The real turning point in Castro's fortunes came in 1948 when he discovered his four-year-old daughter, Bernadette, could easily open the convertible sofa in their living room by herself. Castro decided that if he could show people the ease of using and the practical value of dual purpose furniture, he could sell his product in large quantities.

Keeps in Touch Every dollar he could raise went into advertising campaigns. The rest is history. The picture of a little girl - Bernadette - opening a convertible sofa has become one of America's best known trademarks.

At this point, Castro could retire, but he still keeps personally in touch with his far-flung operations from his home and office in Florida.

Why does he keep going at top speed? "No matter what stage of business a man is in," he said, "when he stops worrying, he loses his business. You either go ahead or backward. You just can't stand still."

"And when you are running a large company, you have a moral responsibility to the people working for you who helped you get ahead."

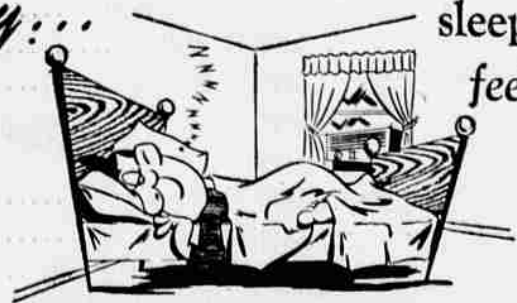
