

Fullmer, Basilio In Titular Battle

Salt Lake City, Utah—Carmen Basilio, grand little battler of the 1950's, tries to recapture the National Boxing association's version of the world middleweight crown tonight from bull-shouldered Gene Fullmer, the only man who ever stopped him.

Anti-Trust Bill Seems To Be Dead

Washington—Sen. Estes Kefauver's bill to bring organized baseball under the anti-trust laws today appeared dead for this session of Congress.

The Senate, striking a heavy blow at the proposed new Continental League, voted 73-12 Tuesday night to send the measure back to the judiciary committee where it is expected to remain until Congress adjourns.

Sen. John A. Carroll (D-Colo.), a leading supporter of the measure, threw in the towel and proposed recommitting the bill when the Senate approved an amendment by Sen. Alexander Wiley (R-Wis.).

Wiley's provision, adopted 45-41, was aimed at cutting the heart from Kefauver's bill. Its effect would have been to eliminate player draft provision and other sections opposed by organized baseball.

William Shea, a guiding force behind the projected Continental League, said in New York the Senate action was a severe blow but "it still doesn't knock us out of the box."

Fullmer is favored at 13-5 to beat Carmen again.

Had Stopped Basilio
The West Jordan mauler is favored because he stopped Basilio, former welterweight and middle-weight champion, in the 14th round of their fight for the vacant NBA crown at San Francisco, last Aug. 28. The NBA had vacated Sugar Ray Robinson's title for his failure to defend.

In that San Francisco fight, which reached a thrilling competitive peak in the sixth round, left-hooker Basilio was so exhausted in the 14th that his handlers asked the referee to stop the bout. In the dressing room, victorious Fullmer's face showed bruises and cuts in several places.

Basilio hasn't fought since. He took a long rest and then went into serious training. He wound up his conditioning for tonight's fight at the Industrial School in Ogden.

'Burly' Tries To Shake Cold

Eugene—The status of Dyrrol Burleson, Oregon's sub-four minute miler, for this week end's Olympic qualifying trials at Stanford was in doubt today as the distance ace still nursed a cold.

Oregon track coach Bill Bowerman said Burleson was running a slight fever.

"If he breaks the fever, he could compete favorably but would not be in top shape for the Palo Alto trials," Bowerman said. "However, if he still has a temperature by Friday, it would be folly for him to run and stupid on my part to let him."

Green Pitches Phillis' Victory

Philadelphia—Don Drysdale and Sandy Koufax, enduring perhaps their most dismal year as major leaguers, pitched for the Dodgers tonight against the Philadelphia Phillies—The "Fizz Kids" turned Whiz Kids" of 1960.

While the current Phillis hardly compare at this stage with the pennant-winning 1950 aggregation, they showed considerable class Tuesday night in a 2-0 victory over the puzzling Dodgers.

The current Whiz Kids edition added a new member Tuesday night in Dallas Green, who posted his first win with a three-hitter over the Dodgers.

Frank (Pancho) Herrera's solo homer in the seventh inning was the big blow for the Phillis.

Philadelphia got its lead in the first on back-to-back doubles by Tony Gonzalez, a young recruit from Cincinnati and Tony Taylor, a former Cub.

Stan Williams, the Dodger starter, suffered his second loss in the contest against six wins. He was very much in the game, however, until the seventh when Herrera kept alive his 20-game hitting streak with his homer to right field.

Green, 25, permitted but one extra base hit—a double by Charlie Neal.

Pittsburgh Awaiting Tilt Ruling

Pittsburgh—The Pittsburgh Pirates today waited for a ruling from National League President Warren Giles on whether they would have to play the second game of a doubleheader in Philadelphia July 10.

Pirate pitcher Bob Friend, the club's player representative, said Tuesday night that the team decided against playing the contest because it would be "too strenuous."

Friend pointed out that the team is slated to play a night game July 9. The contest in question was re-scheduled because of rain—out games earlier this season.

"We feel that this doubleheader is coming at an important time of the season when we are making a run for the pennant," Friend stated.

"Even the owners and the ball players had agreed that a doubleheader should not be played after a night game," he said. "We feel the game can be played at another date."

The July 10th game originally was scheduled as a single contest. But the Pirates were rained out in Philadelphia April 24 and June 4 and the twin bill was scheduled as one of the make-up games.

Cerv Starts Off Yank Rally In Red Letter Win Over KC

Casey Stengel almost talked himself blue in the face but finally got that red-letter performance he was after from his first-place New York Yankees.

"If I told my players once, I told 'em a thousand times not to try to kill those knuckleball pitchers," Stengel said. "It simply can't be done. You gotta just meet the ball, that's all."

Coming up as a pinch-hitter in the eighth inning, Bob Cerv remembered Stengel's advice and merely slapped at one of knuckleballer Bud Daley's offerings. The half-swing did the trick. Cerv was credited with a 2-2 tie, touched off a three-run rally and led the Yankees to a 5-2 victory over the Athletics.

Mantle Hits 17th Homer
Mickey Mantle, who swings from his heels no matter what Stengel says, caught hold of one of Daley's third inning pitches and rammed it into the seats for his 17th homer.

Cerv's double, which came in a pinch-hitting role for winning pitcher Bob Turley, paced the Yankees to their ninth victory in the last 12 games and enabled them to solidify their lead over the second-place Baltimore Orioles.

Cleveland beat Baltimore, 3-2, in 11 innings. Washington edged Chicago, 2-1, in 14 innings and Detroit defeated Boston, 10-1.

Milwaukee climbed to within 2 1/2 games of the National league lead with a 5-3 victory over Chicago, Pittsburgh and San Francisco battled to a 7-7 tie in a game called at the end of nine innings because of curfew. Philadelphia blanked Los Angeles, 2-0, and Cincinnati beat St. Louis, 10-4.
