

Lind Nine Victor Over Dairy Maids

Memorial Stadium, White City - Erv Lind Florists of Portland, with Louise Mazzuca chucking one-hit, 16-strikeout ball, nipped the Rogue Valley Dairy Maids 2 to 0 here last night to sweep a two-game series in the Northwest Women's Major Softball circuit.

The Florists, unbeaten in the league, were victors on Monday evening 5 to 1. In addition to her stellar pitching, All-American Mazzuca had a hand in the offensive part of the Tuesday decision. She led off the third inning with a two-base hit, moved to third on a sacrifice by Elsa Werrenon and scored on a triple by Roma Menold. An error on a run-down enabled Menold also to tally.

Some good fielding, particularly on long runs for catches in the outfield, helped the Maids restrain the hard-swatting Flower team, which collected seven hits off Rogue Valley pitcher Ellen Callaghan.

It was Callaghan who socked the lone Dairy Maids safe blow. The blast was not hot for first sacker Bev Wadsworth to field cleanly and Ellen beat out the throw to first base.

Mazzuca whiffed the first seven batters she faced and had fanned 10 before the first non-strikeout putout in the fourth inning on a fly to second base by Doris Hickson. The Lind thrower walked two and hit one. Rogue Valley got six runners on base and threatened in the sixth inning when a hit batter, error and fielder's option got a runner to third base.

No Florist got more than one hit off Callaghan who allowed two bases on balls. The Lind team had runners as far as third, without scoring, in the second, fourth and seventh innings.

RV shortstop Helen Wolgamott had all three Maid putouts in the first inning on catches of Florists blows.

Newton, Mass. - (UPI) - Jimmy Piersall has resigned himself to an unwanted and indefinite period of rest, still protesting that he is no more tired than any other ball player.

The 30-year-old Cleveland Indian outfielder made no effort to join the club in Baltimore Tuesday, even though he felt he was ready to play.

"I'll go back when they want me," he said Monday night. He added that he had not heard during the day from either Indians Manager Joe Gordon or Frank Lane, the club's general manager. "I'll just wait here until they call me."

Piersall was ordered to take a rest because, according to Gordon and team doctors, he had lost a lot of weight and appeared to be ill. Jimmy said he had lost six pounds, dropping to 174 a few weeks ago, but has regained the weight.

Walkout Seen Bid For Red China Seat

Washington - (UPI) - American officials speculated today that Russia may follow up its disarmament walkout with a demand that the United Nations seat Red China on any new disarmament groups.

They said the sudden Soviet decision to break off the 10-nation Geneva talks may have been a concession to the Communist Chinese negotiated at a meeting of Red nations in Romania last week.

The Peiping regime has bitterly fought Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's policy of "peaceful coexistence" with the West.
