

Economists Split On Possibility of Another Recession

Washington (AP) — Leading business economists are split sharply over whether the nation's fourth postwar recession will begin in the closing months of this year.

One forecaster warned there are signs of a major economic slump just around the corner. Others predicted modest improvement in the second half of this year. None expected a boom within the next 12 months.

The views were expressed at the midyear business outlook conference sponsored by the U. S. Chamber of Commerce. There was general agreement that:

Lower Mortgage Costs — Interest rates would continue to decline, resulting in lower home mortgage costs this fall and early next year.

A pickup in lagging steel production will occur within 40 days to keep pace with stepped-up demand from auto and appliance manufacturers.

Spending on construction in 1961 will fall below the total spent in the preceding year (nearly \$56.5 billion) for the first time since the end of World War II.

Frank E. Morris, research director of the Investment Bankers association, was the most pessimistic.

"The signs of an imminent recession are growing stronger all the time," he warned. "I don't think they should be ignored."

Morris said on the basis of leading economic indicators that a recession may be underway later this year and continue until mid-1962. Interest rates will drop and the federal reserve board is likely to loosen credit fast if a downturn develops, he claimed.

Dr. Emerson P. Schmidt, chief economist for the chamber, took issue with this forecast. He predicted further "modest" economic improvement to record-high levels despite a few weak spots in the economy.

No Maladjustments — "The consensus is that the expanding factors will exceed the contractive factors," Schmidt said. "There are no major economic maladjustments emerging in the economy."

On the plus side, Schmidt said government spending, exports, steel production investment in new plants and equipment and home building all will rise in the last half of the year.

Speaking for the steel industry, L. S. Hamaker forecast a near-record year with production of 115 million tons of ingots. He said an "inventory adjustment" has caused sharp layoffs in recent months but predicted the industry would rebound in the closing quarters.

"We can't buy the idea that any serious downturn in general business will develop in the last half of 1961," said Hamaker, assistant vice president for sales of third-ranking Republic Steel company. Another "fair to good" year is in prospect for 1961, he added.

Miles L. Colean, a consulting economist representing the construction industry, said the outlook for easier money would benefit builders and home-buyers.

Construction to Drop — But construction spending this year will drop about 2 per cent below the 1959 total, mainly because of a slowdown in private home-building, Colean said.

School construction shows a faint indication of a pickup after declining 5 per cent from last year but there is no sign of improvement in the slumping military building field, he added.

On the overall outlook, Colean said he saw no reason for taking a pessimistic view and said he was "mildly optimistic" about the coming year.

In another report, Gen. Orval Cook of the Aerospace Industries Association of America, said he anticipated a continuation of high government spending on missiles and space vehicles.
