### Russian Banner Flies at Roseburg

Roseburg—(UPI)—Residents of Roseburg woke up this morning to find themselves "occupied." Someone during the night had lowered the American flag on a prominently displayed flagpole and replaced it with a home-made Russian flag, a 4-by-8-foot red emblem complete with hammer and sickle. Residents reported it to state police, who retrieved it this morning and put back the American flag. Police were looking for the person who ran up the Russian emblem to half-mast position.

### Portland Enforces Ban on Fireworks

Portland—(UPI)—Police, enforcing a ban on sale or use of fireworks here, picked up a 19-year-old youth and three younger companions Wednesday night. Robert Raney, Pendleton, was booked for illegal possession of fireworks under \$500 bail. He and three others were taken into custody at Laurelhurst park after police were told fireworks were being sold to youngsters. Police Chief William Hilbruner Wednesday issued orders to all police to use "extraordinary" measures to prevent use of fireworks here during the Fourth of July holiday period.

### Ticket Requests Flooding Oregon Democrat Leaders

Portland—(UPI)—Democratic National Committeeman C. Girard Davidson said today Oregon party leaders have received a flood of requests for tickets to the upcoming Democratic convention in Los Angeles. Davidson said he has received pleas for nearly 300 convention tickets and that Mrs. Virginia Grant, national committeewoman, also received scores of ticket requests. Chances Slim Davidson said 500 seats for Oregon had been obtained for the final Friday, July 15, session of the convention in the Los Angeles Coliseum. But he said a person's chances of getting into the Sports Arena for any of the convention's main business sessions were "very slim."

### Talks Resume in Lockheed Strike; Little Hope Held

San Francisco—(UPI)—Negotiators for Lockheed Missile and Space Division and striking machinists today resumed efforts to end the 17-day-old walkout at Vandenberg Air Force Base, Sunnyvale, Van Nuys and six other California plants. Representatives of both sides met with a team of three federal mediators after a "48-hour cooling off period," during which 93 per cent of the union members voted against Lockheed's latest offer. Little Hope Seen Negotiators indicated there appeared to be little hope for an early settlement. The major roadblock was the union's demand for an agency shop, in which non-members pay a service charge to the union.

### Violent Storms Batter Midwest

By United Press International Violent summer storms ripped the Midwest today for the third day in a row and forecasts warned heavy flooding may hit portions of Missouri. At least 14 persons were injured in southwestern Illinois, which bore the brunt of the new onslaught. High winds wrecked homes, tore down communications lines and caused major power failures. Torrential rains and violent winds hit northern Missouri Wednesday night, uprooting trees, knocking out power lines and demolishing buildings, and forecasters warned heavy flooding was in prospect. Up to 5 1/2 inches of rain in the North Grand watershed swelled streams. A new 380,000 building was badly damaged by wind storms at Chillicothe, Mo.

### Defense Money Bill Gets OK in House

Washington—(UPI)—The House passed earlier by both houses. It would provide \$39.99 billion for the armed forces in the fiscal year starting tonight at midnight. Chairman George H. Mahon (D-Tex.) of the House military appropriations subcommittee, rejected by implication the idea that more defense spending was needed because of the summit collapse and anti-American rioting in Japan. "Had we been twice as strong militarily, these difficulties would probably still have arisen in Paris and Japan," Mahon said.

The bill, among its many items, carried \$293 million to build another conventionally powered aircraft carrier. The House at first refused to grant this administration request but agreed finally to do so. Also in the measure were extra funds added by Congress to put the Air Force's B70 supersonic bomber program on a full development status. The budget called for \$75 million to build two prototype B70s. The bill upped this to \$265 million. Two small cars to be imported next year will have cross-mounted engines, front-wheel drive and no rear axles.

### NEA Plans Debate On Integration Of Public Schools

Los Angeles—(UPI)—The integration of public schools was expected to be debated today on the floor of the 98th annual National Education Association convention. No changes were expected to be made in the organization's mildly phrased resolution on integration. The NEA's stand on integration for the past several years has been to resolve the matter on state and local levels through "fair play." Stronger Language Urged California and New York members have been at the forefront of a movement to inject stronger language into the resolution.

### Soviet Foreign Office Calls Western Envoys

Moscow—(UPI)—The Soviet Foreign Office called in the American, French and British ambassadors and handed over notes to them today. There was no immediate indication what the notes concerned. PERMISSION GRANTED Hollywood—(UPI)—Paramount studios has received permission from the Spanish government to use the famous 14th Century Towers of Seville for scenes in "The Boy Who Stole a Million." The film is being made on location at Valencia, Spain. It stars Virgilio Texeira, Marianna Benet, Maurice Reyna and Harold Kasket.

### Pershing Missile Gets Rugged Test

Cape Canaveral, Fla.—(UPI)—The Army sent its Pershing intermediate range missile through tortuous flying conditions today. The missile is reported to be under consideration as a NATO weapon. The 400-mile solid fuel missile which replaced the famed Redstone, was fired successfully from fast mobile equipment that transports, erects and launches the bird. This was the sixth straight successful firing for the Pershing which takes off in a puff of smoke and zooms swiftly out of sight. The Martin-built Pershing is designed to carry a conventional or nuclear warhead to selective targets and will be used by field forces.
