

# Stuart Cuts Loose As Pirates Divide With San Francisco

Dick Stuart has three good reasons to believe he has finally silenced the "wolves" at least until tonight's game with the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Beneath by Manager Danny Murtaugh last week and for weak hitting and boozed by Pittsburgh fans all season, the husky Californian turned those jeers to cheers Thursday night when he hit three consecutive home runs in the second game of a doubleheader against the San Francisco Giants.

Stuart's "hat trick" propelled the Pirates to an 11-6 victory after the Giants had won the opener, 11-0, with a 17-hit attack.

In the first game, Stuart was booed loudly when he struck out as a pinch-hitter. But Murtaugh injected the husky first baseman into his second game lineup and Stuart reacted quickly—tagging starter Mike McCormick for a three-run blast in the first inning. It was his ninth homer of the season but his first at Forbes Field this year.

**Bells Two More**

Stuart, though, didn't stop there. He hit a solo homer off Billy Lee in his next at-bat in the third inning and then made it 3-for-3 with another bases-empty clout off loser Stu Miller in the fifth frame.

It was Stuart's best performance since he joined the Pirates two years ago after a sensational career in the minors.

Willie Mays also enjoyed a big night at the expense of the Pittsburgh pitchers. The Giants' center-fielder collected six hits in seven at-bats, including his 15th and 16th homers, drove in five runs and regained the Na-

Ernie Banks smashed the 250th home run of his major league career and Richie Ashburn collected his 2,300th major league hit as the Cubs chased Lew Burdette with a five-run rally in the sixth inning. The Cubs collected 18 hits, including four by pitcher Don Cardwell.

Ed Roebuck's sturdy relief pitching carried the Dodgers to victory at Philadelphia. Roebuck took over three hits and one run the rest of the way to pick up his sixth victory and his first since being traded to the Dodgers last season. Charlie Neal hit a two-run homer and Mary Wills unloaded a three-run triple to pace the Dodgers' 14-hit attack.

**Genille Smacks Two**

Jim Genille drove in five runs with his 11th and 12th homers of the season and Skinny Brown pitched a six-hitter to help the Orioles snap a three-game losing streak. Mary Breeding also homered off loser Ted Bowsfield.

The Yankees wrecked Kansas City with five homers, including two by Moose Skowron, permitting Ralph Terry to coast to his fourth victory against three defeats. Roger Maris hit his 25th circuit homer of the season to pull five games ahead of Babe Ruth's record 1927 pace. Mickey Mantle and Tony Kubek also homered for the Yankees.

Al Smith, who homered in the third inning with a mate aboard, scored the White Sox' decisive run at Washington when he doubled and rode home on another two-bagger by Joe Ginsberg. The loss snapped Washington's five-

## Command Appearance By Dodgers

Pittsburgh—UPI—The Los Angeles Dodgers, who seem to lose most of their inhibitions once the Coliseum screen is out of sight, take on the league-leading Pittsburgh Pirates tonight in search of their fourth straight victory.

The Angels turned a game into a "command" appearance Thursday night, blasting the Phillies, 10-6, as Vice President Richard M. Nixon and his wife looked on.

The victory put Los Angeles into a tie for fourth place with St. Louis.

Johnny Podres, 7-6, gets the pitching assignment tonight against Deacon Vernon Law, 11-3, a mild-mannered young man who ranks as one of the easiest hurlers currently doing business. He beat Stan Williams 2-1 in a brilliant duel the last time he faced Los Angeles.

**6-4 On Swing**

While the Dodgers haven't been able to reach the .500 mark at home in the often-maligned Coliseum, their road record is one of the best in the league. On the current swing, they have a 6-4 mark, including three in a row over the Phillies.

The Dodgers got a big boost from the bottom half of the batting order in Thursday night's game, with Charlie Neal and Maury Wills batting in air of the 10 runs scored.

Neal, well behind last year's pace, started catching up with four hits, including his sixth home run in the second inning, and a double.

# U.S. Olympic Trials Open Today on Stanford Track

Stanford, Calif.—UPI—This is "R-Day" — R for Rome — for the cream of America's track and field athletes.

A field of 221 amateurs is entered in the 1960 Olympic trials that begin today at 5:30 p.m. (PDT) in Stanford University's 90,000 seat stadium and continues Saturday afternoon.

But there are only 53 places on the U.S. track and field squad that will make the jaunt to Rome in August to carry the hopes of the nation's new 50-star flag into competition that climaxes the XVII Olympiad.

This means that three-fourths of the field from the trials, embracing top scorers in the collegiate, amateur athletic and service events, must be left home.

Net result: Tension so high that anything could happen to the form charts during these two all-important days.

As Dallas Long, USC's highly-rated shot putter, put it, "we're not here simply hoping to win another trophy for the shelf; we're here because we have to get the job done if we're going to Rome."

A tremendous battle shapes up in the high jump between John Thomas, the Boston University sensation who has passed the 7-foot level 30 times, and Charley Dumas of Southern California, the first man to crack the barrier.

Stanford, Calif.—UPI—A large contingent of Oregon track and field aces, headed by ailing Dyrrol Burleson, was on hand today for the Olympic Games trials here.
