## Hearing Asked in Post Office Move

Portland—(UPI)—The battle to keep regional postoffice headquarters from being moved to Seattle continued today as Rep. Edith Green (D-Ore.) asked for a congressional hearing.

The plans to move the headquarters from Portland have drawn a storm of protest from Oregon leaders since they were announced earlier this week.

Mrs. Green said she has asked Congressman Tom Murray of Tennessee, chairman of the postoffice and civil service committee, to get the transfer held up until hearings can be held. She said if he didn't get satisfaction there she was prepared to ask the government operations committee for a hearing.

Rep. Walter Norblad (R-Ore.) also criticized the move and said he hoped the order would be rescinded.

He also planned to present to Sen. Hugh Scott (R-Pa.) a 50-star flag that will fly over Independence Hall in Philadelphia July 4 and then be sent to Hawaii.
