The ceremony took place in the Park Wedding chapel.

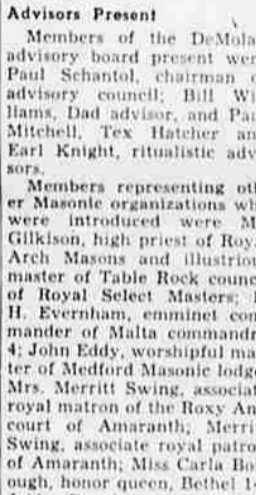
Mrs. Stone is a secretary with Rogue Valley creditors and Mr. Stone is assistant engineer at Timber Products.
