Americans died on the highway at a rate of five an hour today in the July 4 week end of picnics, swimming and boating, and experts feared a record death toll unless motorists slow down.

10 Persons Meet Accidental Death In Oregon Mishaps

At least 10 persons had met accidental death in Oregon with one day still to go in the long Fourth of July week end.

Seven were dead in traffic, including four in one accident; two drowned and another man was killed when a propeller-up car fell on him.

Four members of a Redondo Beach, Calif., family were killed Sunday morning in a two-car accident one mile north of Roseburg.

The victims were Harold K. Peterson Sr., 47, driver of one of the cars; Harold Peterson Jr., 18; Ann Ruth Peterson, 12; and Sharon D. Peterson, 5. The wife and mother, Mrs. Ruth Peterson, 41, was injured critically along with William L. Cottrell, 24, Roseburg, driver of the other car, and Jack W. Thompson, 24, Roseburg, a passenger in Cottrell's car.

College Girl Killed
Mary Chamberlain, 18, a student at Lewis and Clark college in Portland from Roseburg, Calif., was dead on arrival at a hospital early today after the car in which she was a passenger was involved in a collision with another. Dean Van Leuven, 19, Oswego, driver of the car, was injured critically. Alexander G. Gellman, about 60, and his wife, of Portland, who were in the other car, were reported in satisfactory condition.

Powers Man Killed
Kenneth G. Goedel, Powers, was killed Saturday when the car in which he was riding failed to negotiate a curve 14 miles east of Roseburg. The other Oregon traffic death occurred Friday night when Mrs. Hazel Snook, 60, Oregon City, was struck by a car. Steven D. Groves, 17, Eugene, drowned in Odell lake in about 125 feet of water while skin diving Saturday.

Rockefeller Urges Course Against Cuba

Congress Recesses Until Next Month

Khrushchev Almost Drives American Car At Austrian Plant

Linz, Austria - (UPI) - Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev went on a surprise shopping tour today and almost ended up driving an automobile produced by an American company.

The incident occurred when Khrushchev, who joked his way through most of the tour, began to crawl into the vehicle during an impromptu visit to a car dealer.

As he climbed into the front seat and asked to be told about the car, he was told it was produced by an American company. The Soviet Premier quickly withdrew, grinning and turned away with a shrug.

Khrushchev was accompanied on his tour by Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko. Khrushchev is making a nine-day official visit to Austria where his reception thus far has been polite but not too enthusiastic.

The Premier's tour included a clothing store where he said he thought blue jeans were "extremely practical."

Later, in a visit to the Austrian steel plant, Khrushchev renewed his attacks on the United States which he said torpedoed the Paris summit conference last May. Sunday night he told newsmen the Soviet Union was still open for negotiation with the United States.

"New negotiations are unlikely before the end of the American elections," he said. He added, however, that Russia would be willing to negotiate with any future U.S. government, no matter who is elected.

"We are not looking for any individual personality but for an American government which would be willing to sign an agreement on disarmament," he said.

Johnson Announces Press Conference
Washington - (UPI) - Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson announced today he will hold "a major press conference" Tuesday which will center on the Democratic presidential nominating convention.

A spokesman said Johnson will discuss statements made Saturday by former President Harry S. Truman who charged the convention had been rigged to favor the candidacy of Sen. John F. Kennedy.

The Texas Senate leader has never formally declared his candidacy for the nomination although he is recognized as strongly in the running.

INVESTIGATE SMOKE
City firemen were sent to Sacred Heart hospital about 8:30 a.m. today when a resident of the vicinity saw what appeared to be smoke rising from the roof. The "smoke" was found to be spray from a sprinkler cooling system, firemen said.

Oceanside, Calif. - (UPI) - Pvt. Dennis Virgil Parker, 21, of Portland, Ore., a Marine on reserve training duty at Camp Pendleton, was stabbed to death Sunday night when he and a companion were attacked by six juveniles, police reported.

Work Expected To Be Finished In Early September

Key Items Await Lawmakers' Return

Washington - (UPI) - Members of Congress headed today for the political conventions, leaving behind a half dozen major bills to be acted upon when they return to Washington next month.

The House and Senate recessed early yesterday morning for the presidential nominating conventions. The Democratic convention opens in Los Angeles next Monday and the Republicans meet in Chicago on July 25.

House Recess Longer
The Senate voted to reconvene on Aug. 8. The House, with less of a backlog of legislation, decided to stay in recess until Aug. 15. Congress is expected to finish its work by early September.

Awaiting the lawmakers upon their return will be such key election-year items as minimum wage legislation, medical care for the aged, and bills affecting school construction, housing, agriculture and payola.

The resumed session appeared certain to place on display both the Democratic and Republican presidential nominees. Vice President Richard M. Nixon, who presides over the Senate, is unopposed for the GOP nomination.

Constructive Session
The leading Democratic candidates for the nomination are Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson (Tex.) and Sens. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) and Stuart Symington (D-Mo.).

Johnson said yesterday that the session so far has been "responsible and constructive." But he said no one had believed Congress could clean up its record before the conventions.

He belittled suggestions that he and other leaders decided to call the unusual recess so that he could use his influence with Congress to advance his candidacy at the Democratic convention.

The recess followed an all-night session prompted by a Senate-House battle over terms of a bill to authorize President Eisenhower to curtail or halt sugar imports from Premier Fidel Castro's Cuba.

Agree on Principle
Both the House and Senate agreed on the principle of the need for the anti-Castro legislation. At issue was the question of who should benefit from any cutback in Cuban sugar imports.

Adding to the congressional confusion was a White House threat, relayed through a presidential aide, that Eisenhower would call back Congress Tuesday unless the sugar question was resolved.

Compromise Bill
Finally, shortly before 4 a.m., bleary-eyed Senate House conferees, meeting for an hour in the office of Speaker Sam Rayburn (D-Tex.), hammered out a compromise that amounted to a defeat for domestic beet sugar growers and a victory for refiners of imported raw sugar and sugar growers in 15 foreign countries outside of Cuba.

The compromise bill was approved by the House at about 8 a.m. and the Senate followed suit two hours later on a roll call vote of 72 to 24. With this obstacle removed, the Senate recessed at 8:33 a.m. and the House quit at 8:51 a.m.

Brother of Ashland Woman Dies In Fresno
Fresno, Calif. - (UPI) - John W. Anderson, 62, a 20-year member of the Fresno Bee news staff, died today in a Fresno hospital after suffering a heart attack Sunday night.

Survivors include a sister, Mrs. Paul Byers, Ashland, Ore.

President Given Authority To Cut Cuba Sugar Quota

Quick Use of Power Predicted

Washington - (UPI) - President Eisenhower held a powerful new economic weapon today to retaliate against Cuba's Castro regime for its seizure of U.S.-owned properties and other anti-American actions.

Congress approved legislation yesterday giving the President the authority he sought to halt or curtail marketing of Cuban sugar in the United States.

Key lawmakers predicted that Eisenhower would use the new power quickly but some diplomatic officials said they hoped a way could be found to avoid such measures.

Might Boomerang
These officials were fearful that cracking down on the Cuban sugar quota might boomerang against this country elsewhere in Latin America and bring fresh cries of "Yankee imperialism" from nationalists.

But the chances of avoiding use of the economic weapon appeared slight. The administration itself insisted upon the new authority and there was strong pressure in Congress for action against Castro.

With Castro threatening to seize more American-owned property for every cut in the sugar quota, the two countries appeared to stand on the brink of an economic war that could have far-reaching repercussions.

Could Mean Big Loss
Cuts in the sugar quota could mean a loss of \$12 million in the already shaky Cuban economy.

No member of Congress fought against granting the President the new authority until next March 31. But the Senate and House argued over who should benefit from any reduction in the Cuban quota.

Basically it was a pocket-book struggle between American beet sugar growers, and east and gulf coast refiners of imported raw sugar and sugar growers in 15 other countries.

The final measure added up to a defeat for the Senate and the beet sugar growers. That accounted for the opposition on the Senate's 32-24 roll call vote for passage. The House approved the bill by voice vote.

To Make Up Deficit
In seeking new sources for sugar to replace any reduction in Cuba's 1960 shipments, the President would be authorized to permit domestic growers to provide no more than Cuba's share of the anticipated deficit in shipments from Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

This amounts to about 156,000 tons. The President is believed certain to allot domestic growers the maximum amount authorized.

Any cuts in Cuba's basic quota of 3.2 million tons would have to be offset by purchase of sugar from 15 other foreign countries which have marketing quotas.

Bang-Up Fourth Observance Set
Midvale, Utah - (UPI) - Midvale really planned to blow its stack for the Fourth of July today.

In fact it planned to blow up three stacks—smokestacks left over at an old plant of United States Smelting and Refining Co. from the days when Midvale was an important smelter center.

Utah law doesn't allow individuals to set off fireworks but a demolition expert placed dynamite charges to put on a show for the public and bring down the stacks at 15-minute intervals this afternoon. The tallest stack, and last to be leveled, is 460 feet high.

The rest of the old smelter was torn down some time ago.

New 50-Star Flag Officially Flies on Nation's Flagpoles

The 50th star officially was added to Old Glory today on the 184th anniversary of the day representatives of 13 British colonies signed a Declaration of Independence from the mother country.

The first 50-star flag, for the 50th state of Hawaii, was raised over Independence Hall in Philadelphia. To Be Encased

The Philadelphia 50-star flag—with five rows of six stars—will be encased in a container made from wood of an elm that stood on the site of Independence Hall in 1776.

Sen. Hiram L. Fong of Hawaii will take the new Old Glory back home where it will be proudly enshrined in the archives of the new state which pushed the country's borders far into the Pacific.

Thousands of new 50-star flags were also flown over the Capitol at Washington, zipped up and down on many special flag poles constructed for the occasion. They will later be given to congressmen and state officials.

Flies at Ft. McNairy
One of the first places to fly the new flag was Ft. McNairy at Baltimore, besieged by the British in the War of 1812, birthplace of the Star Spangled Banner and one of the few historic sites where Old Glory can fly day or night.

Farm House Burns In Sunday Blaze
Talent - A farm house in Yankee Gulch is the Wagner creek area burned to the ground Sunday morning, destroying clothing and other possessions of a family with four children, according to Talent Police Chief Bill Young.

The James Huff family was in the field having when flames burst out in the wood frame house, the police chief said. Neighbors called in the alarm, but the Talent rural fire department was unable to do anything as a mass of flames engulfed the home.

Observers believe that the fire started in the attic but could not tell the cause. Young said he thought the family was renting the farm and did not know if their possessions were insured.

Anyone wanting to donate clothing and household articles may leave them at the Talent city hall, Young said. Clothing is especially needed for the four children, ages five through nine.

Minneapolis - (UPI) - Max Conrad took off in a single-engine plane today for another crack at the closed-course distance flight record.
