Chemise Appears in Fall Fashion Collections

New York - Shhh, The sack is creeping back.

Or, if you prefer, call it the chemise. But by any name it shows throughout fall fashion collections.

The latest designer to endorse it wholeheartedly is James Galanos, the young Californian who was the last big name designer to show his fall collection to press and buyers in New York.

Galanos took over the ballroom of a hotel to stage a record-long three hour show in which the models paraded the long runway in dress after dress with unfitted waists.

Done by an expert at construction, the chemises looked great on slim-hipped, small-chested models. And costly as the clothes are, certainly any woman who buys a Galanos wardrobe ought also be able to afford a reducing salon if she lacks a model figure.

Whether the Galanos endorsement will carry on down to the apparel the rest of us can afford remains to be seen. The chemise had good support two years ago, too - Paris started it. But the U.S. copies were joked to a quick death.

Cocktail Chemises

The first applause at the Galanos show came for cocktail chemises done in dramatic, floral-patterned velvets. This caused one observer to compose the worst pun of the season - "oh, an old flower sack," she said.

Galanos also revived the blouse - a bloused top dress with slim skirt; showed an intense interest in things ancient with a jerkin effect created by setting plain or patterned velvet bodices onto plain wool; and created several hats to make milady look like a 20th century queen of the Nile.

The day-in hemline remained the same - just skimming the model's kneecaps.

And there was black, black, black throughout the collection, in sharp (or should it be dull?) contrast to the bold purples and reds featured by other designers.

Galanos liked sleeveless wool dresses under bulky coats or jackets, and the collarless look. In most cases, if there was a collar, it was a wide scarf tied on the side.

He introduced a handsome top treatment - the yoke shoulder which featured drop sleeves usually gathered slightly where they joined the yoke.

He repeated several Galanos favorites - the loose, long torso spilling out to fullness in the skirt; the long tunic, and softly full street length chiffons with tailored silk tops.

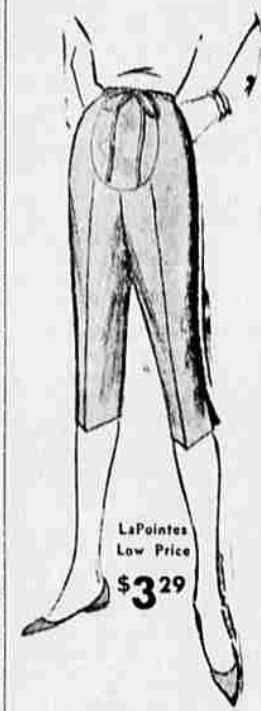
