Consideration of Sen. Jackson Urged

Washington - (UPI) - Seven congressmen have urged each other for the Democratic presidential nomination to consider Henry M. Jackson (D-Wash.) as his vice presidential running mate.

Rep. Lee Metcalf (D-Mont.), spokesman for the seven, said the country needed a vice president who was a "solid and reliable man whose judgment and counsel carry weight."

Metcalf added that Jackson's service in both the House and Senate would make him an invaluable assistant to the President in congressional relations.

The letters were signed by Metcalf and Reps. Thomas Ludlow Ashley (Ohio), Don Magnuson (Wash.), Don McGinley (Neb.), George Miller (Calif.), Ralph Rivers (Alaska) and Sam Stratton (N.Y.).

SHAKES WITH A REASON - Louisville, Ky. - (UPI) - An industrial resonance test that causes a steel pipe to crack itself is going one better than tensors who can shatter crystal glass by pure sustained tone. Researchers at Tube Turns Division of Chemetron Corp. use rapidly spinning weights to induce test lengths of pipe to vibrate sympathetically in a way that, in minutes, simulates years of industrial stresses and strains, until fatigue occurs and the pipe cracks.

Histoplasmosis is acquired by inhaling dust containing spores of the fungus Histoplasma capsulatum. It is not transmitted from person to person. Widely distributed in the U.S., the disease is mainly concentrated in the Middle West.

Clearing skies brought chilly weather to much of the northeastern United States today and elsewhere thousands of Americans spent the last day of the holiday mopping up after heavy rains and high winds.

A cold air mass moving south from Canada dropped July 4 readings to record lows at some parts of the Midwest. Dubuque, Iowa, had 48 degrees below the record set in 1917. Milwaukeeans could chill their beer by setting it outdoors. The temperature dropped to 46, also a record.

Persons of Any Age Can Correct Teeth - Chicago - (Science Service) Adults' crooked teeth can be straightened by a special headgear appliance worn only at night.

Dr. Sanford N. Kingsley, a Brooklyn, N.Y., orthodontist, reports in the Journal of the American Dental Association (July 1) published here, that age is no longer the determining factor in teeth-straightening treatment. He has treated adults from 25 to 48 years of age successfully.

Dr. Kingsley says in treating adults special headgear for use at night is often recommended so that the patient will not have to wear noticeable bands during daytime activities.

Appearance is especially important, he emphasizes, in the case of careerists such as television performers. He tells of an actress who had been trying to hide her teeth. After 20 months, the headgear treatment of 12 hours out of the 24 proved successful.

New Food Process Predicted for 1970 - Denver - (Science Service) - The head of the department of home and family life of Teachers college, Columbia university, predicted today that irradiated foods will be common in the supermarkets of 1970.

Dr. Florida Moore told the closing session of the American Home Economics association meeting here today that those who attend the 1970 AHEA convention will casually discuss the quality of irradiated foods picked up at market. She said the care of ultrasonic dishwashers may be another topic of conversation.

Dr. Moore predicted physicians would learn to treat cardio-vascular diseases, cancer and mental illness as well as they have learned to control polio. She said that by 1970 they will also have "gained new understandings of the aging process, and significant advances will have been made in the field of geriatrics."

Heavy Winds, Rains Spoil Holiday for Thousands in East

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One Accident Reported in Three-Day Period

Only one accident has been reported so far during the three-day period, state police said today.

A motorcyclist, Gene Carol Flickinger, 25, of 400 Savage Creek rd., Grants Pass, was taken to the Josephine General hospital following an accident Sunday. He was treated for cuts and bruises and reported in fair condition today.

Flickinger's motorcycle collided with the rear of a pickup truck driven by Alfonso Sawyer, 58, of route 1, box 34, Eagle Point, just after Sawyer's truck pulled out onto the North Pacific highway near Savage Rapids dam.

The Grants Pass state police office, which covered the accident, said no damage resulted to the pickup and extensive damage to the motorcycle. Flickinger will be charged with following too close, an officer said.

Highway patrols have been revised lately so that the Grants Pass state police office now covers the northern edge of Jackson county. Josephine county has had only two minor accidents so far, one on Friday and one on Saturday, state police reported.

Graham Addresses Throng in Brazil - Rio de Janeiro, Brazil - (UPI) - American evangelist Billy Graham preached to an estimated 200,000 persons at the closing session of the 10th World Baptist Alliance Congress here Sunday.

Graham flew in from Switzerland to attend the session Theodore Adams, Richmond, Va., outgoing alliance president, said it was the largest crowd ever assembled for a religious ceremony in Rio.

At the conclusion of the sermon, about 10 per cent of the audience responded to Graham's appeal and "returned to Christ."

New Alloy Permits More Alumina Use - Schenectady, N.Y. - (Science Service) - A new alloy with similar heat expansion properties as alumina, a ceramic of great potential in the electronics industry, has been developed.

The advent of the inexpensive and easily fabricated alloy, called Fernico-5, will make alumina more useful in such things as electron tubes, thermionic energy converters and high temperature circuits, all of which require metal-ceramic seals.

Fernico-5 is an alloy of iron, nickel and cobalt in undisclosed proportions. It was developed by the General Electric Research Laboratory here.

Ceramics made of alumina, the oxide of aluminum, have excellent properties as insulators in the electronics industry. However, they have much lower heat expansions than most metals. This has made it very difficult to form metal-alumina seals which will not come apart when subjected to temperature changes.

Readers Spend Billions - New York - (UPI) - More than \$1,600,000,000 was spent last year by people in the United States and Canada to read daily and Sunday newspapers, according to the Bureau of Advertising. The bureau said such spending amounted to nearly \$32 million a week and \$132.5 million a month. In the U.S. alone, \$1.5 billion was spent last year to read daily and Sunday newspapers, which is more than half as much as the advertising investment in newspapers in 1959 by local advertisers.
