

Pilot Establishes Curfew for Giants

Chicago (AP) — The San Francisco Giants could either become a serious pennant threat once again or fall into the also-ran category today when they battled the Chicago Cubs in a holiday doubleheader.

The Giants bombarded the Philadelphia Phillies for 14 hits and a one-sided 11-5 win Sunday following a pre-game dressing down by manager Tom Sheehan.

And if the skipper's charges retained enough momentum to bag a clean-sweep today, they would be a cinch to gain ground on either league-leading Pittsburgh or runner-up Milwaukee. The two pacesetters tangle in a twin-bill of their own at Milwaukee.

But a Giant double loss could prove disastrous.

San Francisco moved up on the Pirates Sunday and trailed the league-leaders by 5½ games. The Braves still are two in front of the Giants.

San Francisco jumped off to a 1-0 lead in the first inning and added four more in the third before Philadelphia narrowed it to 5-3 in the fourth aided by Tony Taylor's homer.

Mays and Felipe Alou each smacked roundtrippers in the Giant fifth and Mays tripped across two more in the sixth. Ken Walters followed with another Phil homer in the home half.

Bob Schmidt also slammed a circuit clout for San Francisco.

Willie McCovey was benched again by Sheehan, who installed Orlando Cepeda at first and Alou in left.

Don Blaasingame ran his consecutive hitting string to nine.

RECORD ENTRIES LISTED

Rome — (AP) — The Italian Olympic organizing committee has announced an all-time record of 83 nations entered for the 1960 summer games. The number may be raised to 83, with Somalia, which became independent Friday, likely to be admitted as soon as its national Olympic committee is recognized.

Even Don Drysdale looks like he's ready to mow 'em down with his old gusto again.

At least he did Sunday when he helped trim his Pirates, 6-2.

In snapping a personal six-game losing streak, Drysdale limited the heavy-swinging Pirates to only seven hits, fanned eight and walked only one.

Drysdale, backed by a 13-hit attack, made it five out of the past six for manager Walt Alston's crew — just one jump away from the 500 mark.

Gil Hodges led the hitting parade, getting two runs and a homer — the 350th round tripper of his career. The blow put him in 11th place on the all-time hit parade and just one homer behind Ralph Kiner in his drive to become the all-time National league home run champion.

But can the Dodgers really win it again? Well, they'll start finding out today if their good fortunes are to continue.

Sheehan blasted the players Sunday for late hours, "card games which last until 10 o'clock in the morning" and mental lapses on the field.

No fines were levied but the Giant chief laid down the club's first curfew.

Sheehan, who took over the reins of the Giants after Bill Rigney was fired, laid his cards on the table in demanding that all players be in bed within two hours after a night game.

Willie Mays — enjoying one of the hottest streaks of his career — responded by going 4-for-4, including a homerun, a triple and two singles for four runs added in and three scored. The center fielder also stole a base, rapped his 100th hit of the season, increased his consecutive batting string to 17 games, and hiked his league-leading average to .369.

French Lick, Ind. — (AP) — Three of the top four money winners in women's pro golf, all of them former ladies PGA champions, headed into a pressure final round today, each aiming to become the first to win the prized national crown for a second time.

They were Mickey Wright, San Diego, Calif., holding a one stroke lead at 221, Louise Suggs, Atlanta, Ga., even par at 222, and defending champion Betsy Rawls, Spartanburg, N. C., another stroke behind at 223.

San Jose started and collected his 10th win against seven defeats. But he needed help from Mike McCormick, who came on during the sixth and hurled two-hit ball remainder of the way.

Things Look Better for LA Dodgers

St. Louis (AP) — That old baseball axiom has it that today's the day to make your bets on who is going to be in the World Series.

A year ago, Los Angeles was in third place, 1½ games off the pace set by Milwaukee. And the Dodgers made it to and through — the series.

Why not again this year?

The way they've been playing lately, it wouldn't be too surprising. They walloped the Phils — as they should have — and took two of three games from the front-running Pirates of Pittsburgh.

The hitters have come around now, the team spirit is up, and things look as good as possible for a defending champion club that finds itself in the second division, 8½ games off the pace.

Trackmen Yet Have Long Way To Rome

Stanford, Calif. (AP) — It was still a long way to Rome today for the men who have been chosen on the track and field team that will carry America's hopes into the 1960 Olympic games.

Four years of competing against each other for the coveted berths of the squad were over with completion Saturday of the two-day Olympic trials in Stanford stadium — trials hailed as one of the nation's greatest track meets in history.

But the cinder acres will have only a comparatively short rest before they regroup to get ready to meet the cream of the world's athletes when the Olympic games open in Rome in late August.

The trials, watched by a record 105,000 fans, netted the U.S. Olympic committee somewhere around \$175,000 to help finance the expedition to Italy.

Money's Worth

The spectators more than got their money's worth. They saw three world records fall, with meet marks equaled or shattered in all but three events — the 100, 400 and 800 meters.

How will the '60 squad stack up against the world? And will this year's team win more — or less — than the 15 gold medals the 1956 team earned at Melbourne?

Form charts on track and field rarely run true. But team manager Pincus Sober "had to say" that times, distances and heights in the trials show "this team is far and away better than anything we have ever taken to the Olympics."

Sober warned the "other teams will be improved too." However, the Yanks are bound to win several first places that will more than make up for the overall Olympic point total the arch-rival Russians will score in the other sports.

Take John Thomas and Don Bragg. Thomas' 7 foot, 3¼ inch high jump in winning the trials at an all-time record height should make him a cinch. And Bragg's equally unprecedented 15 foot 9¼ inch pole vault makes him the global standout.

Three members for each of the 19 basic track and field events, plus alternates and the decathlon, winners selected later this week at Eugene, Ore., report to head coach Larry Snyder of Ohio State at Eugene July 25.

That's when they'll start workouts as a team. They'll have a chance to show their progress in three intra-squad meets — Eugene July 30, Long Beach, Calif., Aug. 5 and Pomona, Calif., Aug. 12 — before enplaning for Europe.

Snaps Streak

Rhens, France — (AP) — Jack Brabham of Australia and two other leading international auto racers drove so fast in the Grand Prix of France that a technical point was raised today as to whether their points should count toward the world championship standings.

Brabham won the 415.17-kilometer (257.98 miles) Grand Prix yesterday in the record time of one hour, 57 minutes and 24.9 seconds in a Cooper. Oliver Gendebien of Belgium was second in a Cooper. Climax, clocking 1:58:13.2, and Bruce McLaren of New Zealand was third in another Cooper in 1:58:16.8.

The victory enabled Brabham to move into a first-place tie with McLaren in the 1960 world championship standings, each with 24 points.

Stirling Moss of Britain, who did not compete, is third with 11 points and Gendebien is fourth with 10 points.

However, Brabham, Gendebien and McLaren faced the possibility of being deprived of the points they gained in the French Grand Prix, just because they clocked the distance in less than two hours.

Technical Question

Their pace raised a technical question as to whether or not they should be penalized. The International Racing federation rule, as amended last year under British pressure, stipulates that only races of at least 300 kilometers (approximately 184 miles) and two hours duration should count towards the world driving title.

Thus, under the rule Brabham, Gendebien and McLaren should not be credited with any points for the Grand Prix of France.

Officials said it was not likely that the British cars and their drivers would be penalized by invoking such a technicality. The possibility remained, though, that Ferrari and other competitors in the Grand Prix of France might raise the point with the I.R.F.
