# Pennsylvania, California Delegate Votes Hold Appeal

Los Angeles (UPI) — Campaign managers for the Democratic presidential contenders viewed the Pennsylvania and California 81-vote delegations with a hungry look today. With the opening of the national convention only five days away, these two pivotal states have begun to look more and more like the key-keepers to the outcome of the contest for the presidential nomination. Gov. Edmund G. Brown, favorite son candidate from California, is expected to endorse Sen. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts by next week end. No one yet on the convention scene pretends to know which way Gov. David L. Lawrence of Pennsylvania will go. Could Be Damaging Realists in the still-confident camp of the front-running Kennedy concede the opposition from the powerful Lawrence could be damaging, but not fatal. Rep. Charles H. # Neutrality Is No Guarantee Against War, 'K' Declares

Klagenfurt, Austria — (UPI) — Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev said today that neutrality is not a guarantee against war. He expressed this view during a speech at a lunch given for him here by the Carinthian provincial government. It came after Austrian officials announced in Villach that Khrushchev had decided to cut short his tour of the provinces and return to Vienna a day early because he is "too tired." In his speech, Khrushchev said that in talking to Austrians, the view had been presented to him that Austria is a neutral country should not care about world politics. "I believe such views are erroneous," he said. "Neutrality is not a mountain chain separating Austria from the other world. The fight for peace is a common cause for all nations. If one country stays neutral in the fight for peace, world war may be the consequence. Austria as a neutral country can contribute considerably to preserve peace in Europe." He also warned that the presence of U.S. missile bases in northern Italy are a potential threat to Austria.

# Committed Votes In Democrat Race

Washington — (UPI) — Here is how the Democratic presidential race stacks up on the basis of committed delegates and known first ballot preferences compiled by United Press International: Sen. John F. Kennedy—57.5. Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson—20.9. Sen. Stuart Symington—31.5. Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey—54.5. Adlai E. Stevenson—22.5. Another 20 1/2 votes were pledged to favorite sons and 377 were uncommitted. It takes 761 votes to win the nomination.

# Mrs. Neuberger Raps Vote Record Of Elmo Smith

Monmouth — (UPI) — Mrs. Maurine Neuberger said today that as a legislator Elmo Smith "has a record of reaction unexcelled in modern Oregon history." Mrs. Neuberger and Smith are the Democratic and Republican nominees, respectively for the U.S. Senate in November. It was one of the first times in her campaign she has criticized Smith. She told an Oregon College of Education alumni group that differences in legislative records between herself and Smith would give voters "an unusual opportunity" to choose between two candidates at opposite ends of the political spectrum. Record Defended She defended her legislative record when a member of the Oregon House. She said she consistently supported legislation "to protect consumers, to improve education, to conserve and develop our natural resources, to save taxpayers' dollars by school reorganization, to establish Portland State college, to support the United Nations and to provide equal rights to all Americans regardless of race, color or creed."

# Portland Schools Get County Help

Portland — (UPI) — The Multnomah County Commission is going to take up some of the slack of school district No. 1 and the city of Portland government. County commissioners Tuesday approved a plan for Portland district schools which are outside the city limits, financing of the educational program for inmates of the juvenile home who reside outside the city limits and additional financing of the summer band concert program. The commission approved hiring of three additional public school nurses at an estimated cost of \$15,000 to take over duties in 13 Portland schools. Financial plight resulted in the city cutting some of its school services for the upcoming school year.

# Stock Prices Move On Both Sides of Tuesday's Close

New York — (UPI) — Stocks spent today on a treadmill with prices moving narrowly on both sides of the previous close. Electronics, chemicals and cameras were weak, auto and steel mixed and metals firm. Texas Instruments topped more than 13 points in the electronics where Collins Radio fell more than 5, Beckman around 3 and Varian more than 4. Lukens added around 2 1/2. U.S. Steel picked up over a point, Republic a small fraction, and Youngstown was steady.

# Court Follows Regular Agenda

The Jackson county court conducted its first regular agenda day today. County Judge Earl Miller said a regular agenda would be announced in advance of the Wednesday and Friday sessions. This will enable the county court to inspect county roads more often and other county responsibilities in the field. This morning the county court opened bids from 10 insurance companies on a group life insurance and 24-hour accidental death and dismemberment policy for county employees. These will be studied and the contract awarded to the lowest acceptable bidder in a day or two, Miller said. The county court this morning also received a check for \$806.82 in full payment for publication of the booklet "Know Your County Government." Mrs. Dunbar Carpenter, Medford, and Mrs. Ogden Kellogg, Gold Hill, represented the local chapter of the League of Women Voters which published the booklet. Over 1,800 copies have been sold, it was reported. The league thanked the county court for financing the publication. The court was scheduled to consider a number of miscellaneous matters this afternoon.

# Jackson Pool Is Being Repainted

Two coats of white pool paint are being applied to the bottom and sides of Jackson park swimming pool, City Parks and Recreation Director Robert Haworth said today. He said that the paint should give a smoother finish to the pool bottom. The department has been receiving complaints of children's feet being cut while swimming. Haworth said the pool was drained Tuesday evening and the painting will be completed Thursday. A drying period of between three and five days will be necessary, and the pool is expected to be reopened no later than Wednesday, July 13. All swim sessions at the Jackson pool have been cancelled, Haworth said, except for the Gold Hill class. He said that two sessions for that group may be held when the pool reopens. Registration for the second session of swimming class started today at Hawthorne pool at 1 o'clock. No registration will be held at Jackson pool, Haworth said.

# Gunnar Officially Seeks Reelection

Salem — (UPI) — Oregon Republican Party Chairman Peter Gunnar, Salem, announced officially today that he is a candidate for reelection. Last spring he said he would not run for a second term as state GOP chairman but lately there were indications he would. Gunnar informed all GOP county chairmen and vice chairmen of his candidacy. The State GOP Central committee will meet here Saturday to elect new officers. The other major party officers are expected to stand for reelection. They are Vice Chairman Helen Daughtrey, Portland; Secretary Don Stathos, Medford, and Treasurer Otto Wilson, Salem. The committee, to meet in the Marlon hotel here, also will select chairmen for each of Oregon's four congressional districts.

# Congo Mutineers March Toward Leopoldville

Leopoldville, Congo — (UPI) — A group of well-armed mutineers from the native Congolese army was marching toward this capital today in a move that threatened the security of the 6-day-old republic. The mutineers rose up at their station at Hardy Camp, Thysville, about 124 miles south of here. They overpowered and arrested their white Belgian officers, commandeered trucks and cars and headed for Leopoldville. Troops Join March Latest reports said the mutineers had passed through the town of Madimba, about 43 miles from the capital, after persuading loyal troops sent out to head them off to join in the march on this city. Premier and Defense Minister Patrice Lumumba ordered an armored column of loyal troops to head off the mutineers. The rebels apparently want more pay, better living conditions and their Belgian officers fired and replaced by native Africans. Grade Advanced Lumumba left in a helicopter to meet the mutineers after proclaiming that all Africans in the army had been automatically advanced one grade retroactive to Independence Day, July 1. He apparently also had quieted a smaller mutiny of about 100 troops in Camp Leopold outside the capital before he left. A third mutiny was reported at Kalina, but no details were available.

# Idaho Airplane Crash Claims Four

Stanley, Idaho — (UPI) — An apparent miscalculation on take-off caused the crash of a light plane near here that killed four men, Idaho Aeronautics Director Chet Moulton said today. Moulton said the green and white Piper Comanche veered too far to the east on its take-off from the valley Tuesday and crashed into a mountain. He said that if the plane had climbed 10 feet higher it would have been safe. Killed in the crash were B. H. Curtis, 46, Alturas Lake, Idaho; Bob Bishop, 40, and Leonard Pickins, 53, the pilot, both of Reno, Nev., and Dan McKenna, 28, Hermosa Beach, Calif. The four were on a flight to Reno.

# Policewoman Starts With City

Miss JoAnn Robertson, 1028 West Ninth st., started work today as assistant records officer for the Medford police department. Miss Robertson, a graduate of Medford High school, has lived in Medford for the past 13 years. She was formerly employed at the Rogue River cannery. She will replace Miss Hilda Prom, 273 Lozier lane, who has been assistant records officer for 2 1/2 years. Miss Prom has started her training as policewoman, according to Chief of Police Charles P. Champlin. She will be the first uniformed policewoman for Medford. Miss Prom will be at the communications desk in the department. Her duties will include answering the telephone, operating the teletype and radio and receiving complaints. The addition of the policewoman to the department will release a patrolman for other duties, Champlin said. Miss Prom is currently assisting in the training of Miss Robertson. She will also train a woman to be hired by municipal court as court clerk. This is a new position in the city and was included in the 1960-61 budget.

# Weather in Valley Hits 100 Degrees

Medford and vicinity experienced its first 100-degree temperature of the year yesterday. The weather bureau station at the airport reported an even 100 degrees, highest since June 2 when a 97-degree reading was recorded. A maximum temperature a few degrees hotter than yesterday was forecast for this afternoon. There was a chance that the maximum today could equal or exceed the all-time high for July 6. The mercury climbed to 104 degrees on this date in 1922. The five-day forecast for western Oregon calls for weather not quite so warm but with temperatures averaging above normal through Monday.

# Russian Rocket Travels Far

Moscow — (UPI) — The Soviet rocket fired into the Pacific missed the United States' distance mark, but Russian scientists nevertheless were pleased today with the missile's performance. The rocket, launched Tuesday from a missile pad in Russia, soared 8,078 miles to a target in the Pacific Ocean about 1,000 miles southwest of Hawaii. It was the longest Russian shot to date, breaking a mark set last January when a rocket was fired 7,000 miles into the Pacific. But Tuesday's firing still fell nearly 1,000 miles short of a super Atlas rocket which traveled 9,000 miles from Cape Canaveral, Fla., to a target area just south of the Indian Ocean earlier this year. Soviet scientists had emphasized however, that the rocket tests scheduled for this month would not attempt to break distance records, but instead would be designed to collect scientific information. The rocket was the first one to be fired during the announced rocket testing period from July 8 through July 31.
