

# Pittsburgh Pirates Increase Lead on Rocky Nelson Homers

Pittsburgh's pennant-bound Pirates would love to know all those experts who agreed Rocky Nelson would never hit major league pitching.

The tobacco-chewing, 35-year-old Nelson was stamped "strictly a minor league hitter" for the past 18 years, most of which he spent kicking around the bushes.

Nelson had been given brief trials with five different major league clubs but the Pirates still felt he could help them when they drafted him from Toronto of the International league in December of 1958.

Rocky batted a respectable .291 for the Pirates last year but he started perhaps his finest performance for them Tuesday night when he socked successive homers in the ninth and 10th innings to produce a 5-4 victory over the Braves and increase Pittsburgh's lead to 4 1/2 games in the National league race.

**Homers Wreck Willey**  
Milwaukee starter Carlton Willey took a 2-0 lead into the ninth when he suddenly was tagged for Nelson's first homer plus a two-run homer by Don Hoak. The Braves battled back to tie the score again in the last of the ninth.

But Bob Skinner singled in the 10th and trotted around the bases when Nelson deposited his fifth homer of the year into the right field bleachers off loser Jay Jay Paul Giel, the winner, yielded the Braves' final run in the 10th before Bob Friend came on to nail down the final out.

The Dodgers blanked the Giants, 8-0, the Phillies beat the Reds, 2-0, and the Cardinals defeated the Cubs, 3-2, in other NL games.

In the American league, the Senators came from behind to top the first-place Yankees, 5-3, in 10 innings, and the Orioles ripped the Red Sox, 9-4, in the only other scheduled game.

**Podres Wins Eighth**  
Southpaw Johnny Podres held the slumping Giants to four hits in scoring his eighth victory over the Dodgers, Los Angeles collected 11 hits off four San Francisco pitchers with Mike McCormick suffering the loss.

A wild pitch by McCormick

gave the Dodgers their first run in the fourth and they added three more in the sixth on four singles and two walks. Podres, who struck out seven, also halted Willie Mays' 19-game hitting streak.

Robin Roberts hurled his first shutout of the season for the Phils while limiting the Reds to four hits. The victory brought Roberts' record to 5-7. Loner Don Newcombe was tagged for a run in the sixth on a single, a sacrifice and a double by Tony Gonzales, and then yielded another in the seventh on four singles.

**Triple Wins Game**  
Bill White tripled home the winning run with two out in the eighth inning for the Cardinals after the Cubs had tied the score at 2-2 with a pair of runs in the sixth. Lindy McDaniel, who relieved starter Curt Simmons in the seventh, was the winning pitcher and Don Cardwell the loser. Cardwell pitched a no-hitter against the Cards the last time he faced them on May 15.

Bob Allison's first home run in nearly three weeks was the blow that gave the Senators their victory over the Yankees. Allison hit his 10th homer of the season in the 10th off loser Art Ditmar following a two-out single by Reno Bertola.

Starter Ralph Terry led 3-0 until the seventh but the Senators scored single runs in the seventh, eighth and ninth. Pedro Ramos was tagged for Roger Maris' 26th homer with one on in the first inning and then gave up only one more hit before yielding to winner Chuck Stobbs in the ninth. The loss cut the Yankees' lead to one game over the idle second-place Indians.

Rookie Chuck Estrada of the Orioles fired a five-hitter at the Red Sox for his ninth victory of the year. Among the hits Estrada allowed with two-run homers by Vic Wertz and Pumpie Green. The Orioles got to loser Tom Brewer for five runs and seven hits in 3 1/3 innings and then raked Ted Will for seven more hits and four runs. Jackie Brandt drove in three runs with three hits and rookie Marv Breeding also had three hits. The victory boosted the third-place Orioles within two games of the top.

# Yankee Delegation In British Golf Cut To Just Four Men

St. Andrews, Scotland — The venerable 58-year-old Gene Sarazen and muscular, young Arnold Palmer set out today at the head of a slim four-man American delegation shooting for the British Open golf championship.

Besides Sarazen and Palmer, the only two Yanks able to qualify for the 72-hole centennial British Open were Bill Johnson of Provo, Utah, and Jack Isaacs, civilian pro at the Langley Air Force Base in Virginia.

**18 Yanks Fail**  
Eighteen other Americans failed to shoot the qualifying score of 147 or lower in the two 18-hole rounds that were played Monday and Tuesday on the old and the new courses at St. Andrews. These qualifying scores were forgotten for the four rounds of the championship proper which winds up with 36 holes on Friday.

Gary Player of South Africa, the defending champion, demonstrated he should make a strong bid to retain the title when he won the qualifying medal with 87-68-135.

But it was Sarazen, the gentleman farmer from Germantown, N.Y., who won the hearts of his American colleagues and many in the

British gallery who braved the rain and the high winds to watch Tuesday's rounds.

**Sarazen Seventh**  
Sarazen, winner of the British Open crown back in 1932, shot a par 72 Tuesday to go with Monday's 69 to tie for seventh place among the 74 qualifiers with an aggregate of 141 strokes.

"See, wouldn't Walter Hagen have loved to see this!" he said grinningly as he left the 18th green in a neavy downpour.

The 30-year-old Palmer, who was not quite three when Sarazen won his first British Open crown, scored a 36-39-75 Tuesday after shooting a 67 Monday. That 142 left him one stroke behind Sarazen and well within the qualifying range, but he was not satisfied with his game.

**Time for Bad Round**  
"If I have to have a bad round, this is the time," Palmer commented. "All I was mainly interested in was qualifying, but I can't remember a round in which I had two sixes and a seven on the card."

Johnson shot a 76 Tuesday to go with Monday's 70 for a 146 total, while Isaacs barely made the grade when he shot a 73 to go with Monday's 74 for a 147 aggregate.

# Leo Could Head SF Next Year

Los Angeles — Leo Durocher, formerly of the Brooklyn Dodgers, might become the manager of the San Francisco Giants next season, but meanwhile interim pilot Tom Sheehan will remain on the job.

Giant owner Horace Stoneham hinted at handing the helm of the club over to "Lippy" Durocher Tuesday night when he replied to questions of the club's 1961 manager with the remark: "Leo Durocher and I are still very good friends, but we'll have to see about next season."

## Rail Brotherhood Groups Propose Study of Rules

Chicago — Four big brotherhoods of operating railroad workers proposed today that the complex dispute over the industry's rules be submitted to a special study commission that would include carrier, union and public representatives.

Union leaders representing more than 200,000 railroad employees announced their proposal as they went into the first preliminary discussions at national level on the controversial and bitter dispute.

**Outline in Letter**  
The brotherhoods' proposal was outlined in a letter which was to be presented to carrier conference committees today.

The union leaders said they were ready to name their own representatives to such a study commission at once. They proposed that a "neutral" member be designated as chairman, and listed six men they would welcome as public representatives on the study commission.

**Negotiations Sidetracked**  
The railroads last Nov. 2 served demands for far-reaching revisions of work rules to save what they charged is more than \$500 million a year in "featherbedding waste." Negotiations on the demands were sidetracked for eight months while the two sides bargained on wages.

The brotherhood chiefs told the railroads that their demands would modify or eliminate "virtually every rule affecting compensation and working conditions."

**Involves Review**  
"Your proposal necessarily involves a comprehensive review of the entire wage structure, to which the ordinary processes of the Railway Labor Act are not suited," they said.

"We believe that such a review, if it is to be made, calls for the creation of a special wage structure study commission."

# Los Angeles Shuts Out SF Giants 8-0

Los Angeles — For the first time in five weeks the Los Angeles Dodgers today had a .500 record in the National league standings as they awaited their second game against the San Francisco Giants.

In an effort to make it two in a row, the Dodgers called on big Stan Williams, 7-2, to pitch tonight while the Giants went with Billy O'Dell, 3-7, the ex-Baltimore southpaw.

Johnny Podres came up with one of his top pitching performances Tuesday night when he gave up only four hits while pitching an 8-0 shutout victory. It was Podres' sixth win against one loss to San Francisco in two seasons and gave him an 8-6 record this year.

**Ace Lefty Shelled**  
The win was a highly satisfying one to the Dodgers who finally defeated Giant star Mike McCormick who had won two shutout victories over Los Angeles this season. The loss left McCormick's record at 9-5 for the year.

The Dodgers had gone scoreless for 22 innings against McCormick, but they snapped that string in the

fourth inning when Jim Gilliam scored from third on a wild pitch.

As it turned out, that run would have been enough. But the Dodgers got to McCormick for three runs in the sixth and he left the game for a pinch-hitter. They then added four more in the seventh off relief pitchers Bud Yerley and Joe Shipley before Johnny Antonelli finally came in and put out the fire.

**Mays String Halted**  
Willie Mays, hitting star of the San Francisco club, had a 19-game batting streak ended when he failed to get a hit off Podres in four times at bat.

Only two Dodgers got extra base hits, Gilliam getting a double in the fourth and pinchhitter Norm Larker driving in two runs with a double in the seventh.

With the righthander pitching for the Dodgers tonight Giant manager Tom Sheehan said he'd probably move Orlando Cepeda from first base to left field and insert Dale Long at first.

Manager Walt Alton said he would use the same righthanded hitting platoon against O'Dell tonight because it proved so successful Tuesday night.
