

Maris, Skinner Present All-Star Tussle Preview with Home Runs

Did you catch Roger Maris and Bob Skinner in that sneak preview of the All-Star game? You should have because it was a smash hit all the way around.

Maris and Skinner will be on opposite sides in the All-Star game at Kansas City next Tuesday and they still may be on opposite sides come World Series time next fall.

Maris helped the Yankees widen their American league lead to two games when he hit his 27th homer Wednesday night in a 5-2 victory over the Orioles, while Skinner put the Pirates 5½ games ahead in the National league with an inside-the-park grand slam homer that routed the Reds, 5-2.

The homer by Maris, off Ioser Skinner Brown, moved him seven games ahead of Babe Ruth's record 1927 timetable. Cletis Boyer also homered against the Orioles, who were held to seven hits by Whitey Ford, now 5-5.

In the game between the Pirates and Reds, Cincinnati led 1-0 behind Bob Purkey until the eighth inning when Pittsburgh tied the score on a single and three walks. Facing reliever Bill Henry, Skinner then sent a sinking line to left field which rolled all the way to the wall as Wally Post made a futile attempt at a shoestring catch. Rookie Tom Cheney was the winner. Gus Bell and Ed Bailey homered for the Reds.

The White Sox defeated the Indians, 7-5, the Senators downed the Red Sox, 4-0, and the Athletics beat the Tigers, 6-4, in other American league games.

In the National league, the Phillies humbled the Braves, 8-5, in 10 innings, the Dodgers walloped the Giants, 10-0, and the Cubs crushed the Cardinals, 10-1.

Roy Sievers' two-run homer in the ninth inning and Gerry Staley's neat relief chore enabled the White Sox to defeat the Indians.

Rookie left-hander Jack Kralick hurled the Senators to their victory over the Red Sox with a four-hitter. Washington won the game with a four-run rally in the first inning.

Knuckleballer Bud Daley won his 12th game for the A's by limiting the Tigers to six hits. Kansas City erased a 4-3 deficit by scoring two runs off loser Frank Lary in the eighth.

Gene Conley of the Phils completed a pitcher's dream in beating the Braves for his fifth triumph. He not only pitched two hitless innings in relief but also tagged loser Don McMahon for a three-run homer with two out in the 10th for the clincher.

Pitcher Stan Williams and Frank Howard each slammed three-run homers for the Dodgers against the Giants. Norm Sherry added to the stugging show with a two-run homer.

George Altman drove in six runs with a pair of homers for the Cubs and Ernie Banks accounted for three more with his 25th homer in the carnage against the Cards.

Williams Sparkles As LA Shuts Out SF

Los Angeles (UPI)—The Los Angeles Dodgers were in the fourth place in the National league today thanks to another superlative pitching performance by Stan Williams who threw a 10-0, shut-out over the San Francisco Giants Wednesday night.

With Johnny Podres having shut out the Giants 8-0 Tuesday night, the Dodgers tonight looked to Don Drysdale, 5-10, in the hope he can continue the streak against the Chicago Cubs who arrive for a two-game series.

For the Cubs, lanky Mark Freeman, 3-0, was named by manager Lou Boudreau to handle tonight's pitching chore.

Williams not only supplied a 3-hit pitching performance against the Giants, but came through with a 3-run homer, his first of the season, in the fourth inning to help his cause.

The Dodgers had touched the Giants for 11 hits Tuesday night and they increased that total to 13 hits Wednesday night.

Three-Run Homer
Outfielder Frank Howard, only 23 years old as is Williams, also hit a 3-run homer and rookie catcher Norm Sherry belted a 2-run homer for the only other extra base hits of the game.

"I had been throwing fast balls and sliders about equally for the first five innings," Williams recalled after the game. "Then I thought I was losing my control and threw almost all sliders the rest of the way."

Williams, once considered a wild pitcher, now has gone 23 innings without giving up a walk. And in the last 59 1-3 innings he has walked only four men. His earned run average now stands at 2.32, best in the National League. The

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Triple Play Kicks Off Big Rhubarb

Milwaukee, Wis. (UPI)—The major league's first triple play since 1958 kicked off a big rhubarb here Wednesday night over whether rookie umpire Ed Vargo failed to signal safe or out on the blow that started the play.

Manager Gene Mauch of the Philadelphia Phillies, victims of the play, was felled out of the game with the Milwaukee Braves for protesting on the play.

He argued that Vargo failed to signal whether Braves' second sacker Chuck Cottier had caught or trapped a low liner by Bobby Gene Smith.

Mauch said as a result, pitcher Dick Farrell dashed to the plate, thinking the ball had hit the ground, and Cottier had trapped it. The Braves tossed the ball to third to make Farrell the third out.

Cottier, the Braves' flashy rookie infielder, said there was no doubt he caught the ball. It was first believed Mauch was protesting that Cottier had trapped it.

Smith, coming for the second of three times with the bases loaded, sliced what looked like a one hopper to Cottier, but the youngster made a shotstop catch and doubled Tony Taylor off first for two of the outs.

The Phils swarmed Vargo when the triple play ruling was made, and despite mediation efforts of plate umpire Jocko Conlan, Mauch berated Vargo.

Finally, after trying three times to walk away from the Philly manager, Vargo wheeled and gave him the thumb.

Giants Try To Regain Batting Eye

San Francisco (UPI)—The San Francisco Giants, scoreless over the past 28 innings, hoped to find their batting eye today in the friendly though wind-blown confines of Candlestick Park.

The Giants, reeling from a two-game sweep by the Los Angeles Dodgers, opened their long home stand with a contest against St. Louis today. Sam Jones (10-7) was to duel with the Cards' Larry Jackson (9-8) in a battle between two of the loop's busiest hurlers.

The Giant scoring famine started Monday after San Francisco whipped the Chicago Cubs 4-0 in the opener of a July 4 twin bill. In the second game, the Giants scored a lone tally in the fourth and then hung on for 10 more innings when the game was called because of darkness after 14 frames with the score 1-1.

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Jersey City Might Get Havana's Team

Buffalo, N.Y. (UPI)—Havana may shift its International league franchise to Jersey City, N.J., "within the next 10 days," and set up the possibility of three major league teams in the New York metropolitan area again, according to the Buffalo Evening News.

Cy Kritzer, who covers the Buffalo Bisons for the Evening News, said Wednesday a shift of Havana's International league franchise to Roosevelt stadium was in the making and "could take place within ten days."

The move would probably be dictated by the Cincinnati Redlegs who have a heavy investment in baseball talent on the Havana roster," Kritzer said.

According to Kritzer, the move would be just a preliminary which would see a major reshuffling of International league franchises in an effort to form a third major league.

"This would mean the shift of the Miami club into New York, Richmond into Houston and one other I.L. franchise into Minneapolis. Dallas also figures in the plans," Kritzer said.

The writer quoted "an authoritative source" as saying that there would be "an immediate move from within the International league to go major league" if the Continental league does not get off the ground.

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Loss of Nail Disables Hurler

Boston (UPI)—For want of a nail, the Boston Red Sox have lost pitcher Dave Hillman.

The right-handed Hillman, used mainly in relief by the cellar-dwelling Red Sox this season, was placed on the disabled list Wednesday and fast-baller Earl Wilson was recalled from Minneapolis to replace him.

The action came after the 32-year-old Hillman lost a fingernail on his pitching hand. The entire nail was ripped off his index finger when he tried to hunt against knuckleballer Hoyt Wilhelm of the Baltimore Orioles Monday.

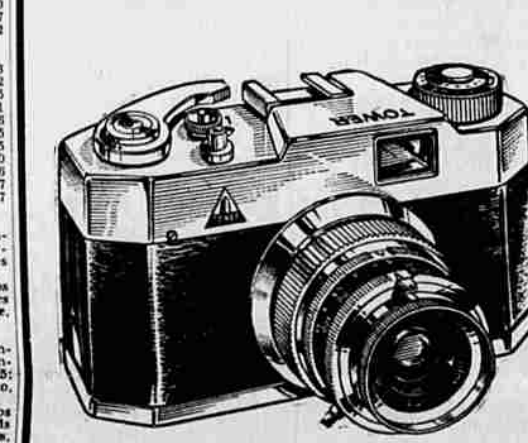
