Stevenson Bids For Nomination

Los Angeles—UPI—Adlai E. Stevenson today made his boldest bid to date for the 1960 Democratic presidential nomination. Stevenson, the party's unsuccessful 1952 and 1956 nominee, sent word to this convention city today that "of course" he would accept a draft for a third try at the White House.

Deadlock Seen Only Hope
Stevenson faced an uphill fight. His only hope appeared to be a convention deadlock between Sens. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts and Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas.

Kennedy forces continued their drive for an early ballot victory. Assured of California Gov. Edmund G. Brown's backing, they hoped to add two more favorite son governors to their camp. Rep. James Roosevelt (D-Calif.), son of the late President, formally got aboard the Kennedy bandwagon today, and a union source told United Press International that the "big 3" of organized labor were privately backing Kennedy.

Johnson came to town today to direct his drive. Stevenson declared his availability by telephone to

Crew Mops Up Fire On Kane Creek

A four-man state department of forestry crew was mopping up this morning on a 25-acre brush and slash fire in the Ike Orr logging operation on Kane creek, the southwest district headquarters reported.

The district office said that the blaze started about 1:30 p.m. yesterday, apparently from sparks from a tread tractor.

A crew of 12 state forestry patrolmen and 19 "pick-up" fire fighters was sent to the scene. Logger crewmen also fought the blaze. A six-man pick-up crew patrolled the area last night.

The state forestry office also reported a one-half acre grass fire along Highway 66 near Emigrant lake about 9:30 p.m. yesterday.

Pendleton Takes Hot Spot Honors

By United Press International Pendleton took over from Medford and The Dalles as Oregon's hot spot Thursday with a temperature of 103.

Medford had 99 compared to 103 on Wednesday and The Dalles dropped 9 degrees to 94.

The weather man said that although no rain was indicated temperatures should be cooler. Highs up to 94 in eastern Oregon and to 99 in southwest interior Oregon were expected through Saturday with cooler readings elsewhere.

Not much change in the present weather pattern is indicated for the next five days, the weather bureau said.

Stock Market Goes Into Sinking Spell With Prices Lower

New York (UPI)—The stock market suffered a late sinking spell today that found prices somewhat below their highs at the finish.

Price erosion set in after the fourth hour but centered generally in stocks used to compile the averages.

Vending machines, electronics, some rails and utilities resisted much of the selling when it occurred. Vendo and Universal Match retained most of their earlier strength, as did cameras, drugs and metals.

Utilities flirted with a new 30-year high on average most of the day.

Sugar Expected To Be Plentiful

Washington (UPI)—Americans will have no trouble getting plenty of sugar for their coffee and cake despite the government's sharp cut in imports from Cuba, the main foreign supplier.

Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson told a news conference Thursday that the slap at Fidel Castro's anti-American regime probably would have no noticeable effect on sugar supplies or prices in this country.

Robert H. Shields, president of the U.S. Beet Sugar association, said the United States could take up the slack by buying sugar from 11 foreign countries with available supplies.

Summer Band Concert Scheduled Tonight

Three summer band groups will present their annual concert in the city park next to the Public Library of Medford and Jackson County at 7:30 o'clock tonight, I. A. Mirick, instrumental music supervisor, has announced.

Scheduled are the elementary groups at 7:30 p.m., the junior high school groups at 8 p.m., and the high school and college groups at 8:30 p.m. The concert is free to the public.

Reunion of Covered Wagon Trek Slated

The first annual reunion of the 4-H Covered Wagon Trek will be held Saturday at the Francis Krouse ranch on North River rd., Applegate.

Members of 4-H clubs from Jackson, Curry and Douglas counties are expected to attend, Glenn Klein, county extension agent, said.

All of them made the covered wagon trek to Corvallis last year.

The members and their guests will hold a lamb barbecue followed by a campfire and skits Saturday night.

Sunday morning's program includes a ranch breakfast, church services and special entertainment. The reunion will conclude following lunch. The public is invited to attend the evening campfire and visit the 4-H members on Sunday when they plan to recapture some of their Covered Wagon Trek experiences, Klein said.

Terrorized Whites Flee Leopoldville

Brazzaville, Congo Republic—Thousands of white men, women and children fled in terror from Leopoldville across the Congo river today, their panic increased by a stream of refugees from the hinterlands with tales of shootings and rape by mutinous native troops.

In Washington, U.S. officials said the U.S. Embassy in Leopoldville was surrounded by a mob including many Negro soldiers who no longer have white officers. The mob also has cut off the road from Leopoldville to the airport, presumably to prevent white persons from getting away.

The officials said that members of the embassy, including Ambassador designate Clare Timberlake, could not get out of the embassy. They added that the State Department was relying on reports from the U.S. consulate general in Brazzaville.

In Paris, the French Red Cross announced it had received an urgent appeal from

its representative in Brazzaville asking for immediate help for European women and children in the Congo. The Brazzaville representative asked that the International Red Cross help free and evacuate the white women "who are prisoners of the mutineers in Leopoldville." He said there was danger their situation was serious.

Communications were cut off temporarily between Brussels and Leopoldville, and word spread that rebellious Negro troops had taken over the city.
