

Coates Gets First Loss of Season As Red Sox Bounce New York 6-5

The last-place Boston Red Sox, bounced the first-place New York Yankees their second straight defeat, 6-5, Saturday and all-star pitcher Jim Coates his first defeat of the season after nine consecutive victories.

Faced by 36-year-old Vic Wertz, who drove in four of the runs on a homer, double

and single, the Red Sox pasted five Yankee pitchers beginning with Coates for nine hits. Coates, whose winning streak actually stood at 13 carrying over to the 1959 season, blew an early 3-0 lead and finally was chased altogether in the fourth inning.

Wertz' homer was his ninth of the season. Gary Geiger hit his sixth of the season in the sixth inning off reliever Duke Maas, while Yogi Berra topped Mike Fornieles, who took over for starter and winner Ike Delock in the eighth, for his eighth.

White Sox Edge Indians
Meanwhile, the red-hot Chicago White Sox defeated the Cleveland Indians for the

fourth straight day, 8-4, and moved into third place, only a half-game back of the second-place Indians and 3½ in back of the Yankees.

The White Sox, who now have won 11 of their last 15 games, chased lefty Ted Bowsfield before he could retire a batter in the first inning and continued their attack against four relievers. Roy Sievers, stretching his hitting streak to 15 games, was the hero with three hits. Dick Dono- van, who took over for Herb Score in the second inning, was the winner.

The Washington Senators, who have been almost as hot as the White Sox, rolled to their sixth victory in the last

seven and their second straight over the sagging Baltimore Orioles, 7-2, behind the smoking bat of Harmon Killebrew.

Killebrew Beats Orioles
Killebrew, plagued by injuries most of the season, slammered two homers and a single to highlight an 11-hit attack against Hoyt Wilhelm, Chuck Estrada and Skinny Brown. The victory went to rookie Rudy Hernandez who took over for Hal Woodeshick in the seventh. Estrada, who replaced Wilhelm in the seventh and was touched for three runs, was the loser.

In the only night game, the Detroit Tigers played the Athletics at Kansas City.

Pinch-hitter Dutch Dotterer singled across the winning run in the 10th inning Saturday to take a 6-5 defeat on the Milwaukee Braves and break a five-game Cincinnati Reds' losing streak.

Dotterer's single off Warren Spahn drove across Frank Robinson, who had singled and moved to second on a base on balls to Ed Balley.

The hit gave Spahn his sixth loss against eight victories after he had entered the game in the ninth inning when the Reds tied the score, 5-5. Bob Grim picked up the victory as the pitcher of record in the ninth, but it was Bill Henry who retired the Braves in order in their half of the tenth.

Another pinch-hitter, Willie Jones, drove in the tying run in the ninth for the Reds off Ron Piche, the second Milwaukee relief pitcher. Don Nottebart, who relieved starter George Brunet, walked pinch-hitter Harry Anderson and after pitching two balls to Jones, was replaced by Piche.

Post, Robinson Homer
The Reds had jumped to a 3-0 lead with one run in the second inning and back-to-back homers by Wally Post and Frank Robinson in the fourth, but the Braves knotted it with three runs in the fifth off Reds' starter Don Newcombe.

The three-run Milwaukee inning was capped by rookie second baseman Chuck Cotler's first major league homer with Johnny Logan on base.

The Braves added one run in the sixth as Billy Bruton's single, a sacrifice and Henry Aaron's single, and then pushing

ed the score to 5-3 in the seventh on Joe Adcock's lead-off homer.

The Reds came back to make it 5-4 in the eighth when Adcock dropped a throw on Vada Pinson's grounder, and singles by Gus Bell and Post.

Ernie Banks homered in the 12th inning to break a 6-6 tie and give the Chicago Cubs 7-6 victory over the floundering San Francisco Giants. Fine relief pitching by Don Elston from the sixth inning also helped the Cubs send the Giants down to their fifth straight defeat.

Antonelli Gets Loss
The Giants built a 6-3 lead by the fourth inning after knocking out Dick Ellsworth. But the Cubs scored three times in the seventh off Stu Miller and Johnny Antonelli and then turned the game over to Elston. Antonelli was tagged with the loss, his sixth against only three victories.

Elston picked up his fifth victory in nine decisions when Banks hammered his 26th homer into the teeth of a hard wind blowing in from left field.
