

Pin Lanes Will Oppose Presidio Tuesday Night

Medford Bowling Lanes baseball team, which opposes the San Francisco Presidio at Memorial Stadium, White City, on Tuesday night, will not have the lineup actively today which had been anticipated.

Manager Pete Hale of the Medford nine said that a doubleheader which had been set for this afternoon with Klamath Falls semi-pros is off. He said that through a mix-up or misunderstanding the Klamath club has lined up another game and would not make the trip to White City.

Tuesday's conflict with the Army aggregation is set for 8 p.m. at the Veterans Administration domiciliary diamond.

The Presidio squad presents a combination of collegiate and pro experience. This club reportedly got off to a slow start this season but has seemed to improve with each outing because of speed and desire.

There's at least one player on the squad with Oregon background. He's Frank Duarte, a first baseman and outfielder, who played at Linfield college.

At last report Conrad Causey was the club's No. 1 pitcher. He's a 28-year-old righthander who has had experience with the Watsonville Packers, San Jose Red Sox and Reno Silver Sox. He had an 8-2 record for 1960 at last report. Ron Jourdenias is an Army team newcomer who has been impressive with 19 strikeouts in one game and 13 in another. The 210-pound righthander has played for University of San Francisco and for Modesto college.

Hauro Higuchi, 55, 140-pound pitcher, has been the most colorful of the Toreros this season. This player, of Hawaiian descent, has a crowd appealing manner. He has been offered, on discharge from the Army, a spot with the Hawaiian all-stars for their world wide baseball tour.

Post 15 Nips Studs In 11-Inning Tiff

Danny Miles drove the ball into center field with the bases loaded in the fourth extra inning Friday night to bring home the winning run and keep Medford Coca Cola's slim hopes alive in the chase for the Area 4 southern division American Legion junior baseball title.

Medford nipped the Central Point Cheney Studs 8 to 7 in the 11-inning fracas.

The Post 15 nine thereby wrecked the Central Point bid to gain a temporary tie, at least, with Klamath Falls for the front position in the circuit. Klamath is to play Grants Pass today and is favored, if Klamath wins, Medford is out of the title quest.

Jim Calhoun was hit by a Mike Pepper pitch to start off the Post 15 batting turn in the bottom of the 11th. Neathamer got aboard first base on a fielder's option and Jim Barry fled out. Tim White singled but Neathamer was out overrunning second base. Then Dick Deffley walked to fill the bases. That set the situation for Miles' smash.

Rhubarb on Bunt
The Medfords thought they had the contest won in the 10th inning when they filled the sacks on hits by Deffley and Miles and a walk to Dick Ragdale and Bob Quinney's bunt brought Deffley across the plate. However, umpire Kay Kelley ruled Quinney stepped on home plate when he bunted, called him out, declared the ball dead and disallowed a run.

This touched off a rhubarb which lasted 15 minutes or so. Base umpire Virg Swanson's case book, but no rule book, was available at the time. And, the game finally was continued under Medford protest.

Swanson, after checking the rule book, said Saturday that, in the foregoing situation, the runner coming from third base is out on batter's interference but the ball remains alive. Under that ruling, as last night's play went, Quinney would have been safe at first but no run would score. Craig Laurance grounded out, after the dispute play, to end the inning.

All of the Coke runs except the winning one were scored in the first two innings. Medford gained five of the counters in the first session on hits by Miles, Laurance and Calhoun, a base on balls, a sacrifice by Quinney and a fielder's choice, all off starting pitcher Brad Gettling, plus an error then a balk, which was

ruled against reliever Doug Pfaff.

Calhoun banged in two tallies with a second canto double after a hit batter, a base on balls and a wild pitch got runners in position. This gave Medford a 7 to 2 advantage since two Central Point men crossed home base in the first stanza.

The Studs of Post 129 obtained their opening tallies on a single by Jerry Hauck, a sacrifice by Louis Alvarez, a double by Mike Gilnes, a groundout and an error. They gained two more markers in the third inning on singles by Harris, Pat Papper and Ed Allen, a base on balls, a fielder's option and two miscues. Central Point tied the score in the sixth panel with three runs on hits by Gilnes and Harris, a walk and three errors.

Pitches Full Distance
Quinney went the full 11 innings on the hill for Medford. He gave up 12 hits, struck out 14 batters and walked four.

A highlight for Central Point was the six-inning no-hit pitching stint of Bill Anhorn. Taking over with two out in the second inning, he fanned six and walked four before yielding to Mike Pepper with two out in the eighth. Medford totaled nine hits, three off Gettling, one off Pfaff and five off Pepper; Miles and Calhoun each had three hits for Medford and Hauck, Alvarez, Gilnes, Harris and Pat Pepper had two apiece for Central Point.

A third Stud runner crossed the plate in the third stanza when a throw by Medford catcher Jim Barry hit Jim Doster as he was running to first base but the Cheney man, Jeff Anhorn, was sent back to third sack on a "base you are going to and one other" ruling.

Allen hit a smash in the eighth inning which CP supporters felt should have been a game winning homer. The ball cleared the outfield fence and was found yesterday by Coach Bill Askwith some 420 feet from home plate. The swat was ruled foul.

2nd Extra Inning Tiff
CP had a runner to third base in the seventh inning and Medford loaded the bags with two out in the eighth. A double play broke a Coca Cola threat when a runner got to third in the fourth canto.

Friday's tussle was the second elongated one of the season between the two clubs. Cheney took a 13-inning hassle.

Games this week will complete the Area 4 southern division Legion schedule except for a Medford-Central Point makeup and for a playoff, should a tie for first in the final standings result.

Central Point plays Grants Pass at Cheney field here Tuesday night and Klamath Falls comes for a Wednesday night game against Medford. On Friday evening Grants Pass meets Medford here and Central Point goes to Klamath.

On Saturday a Grants Pass versus Medford exhibition mix is slated for White City.

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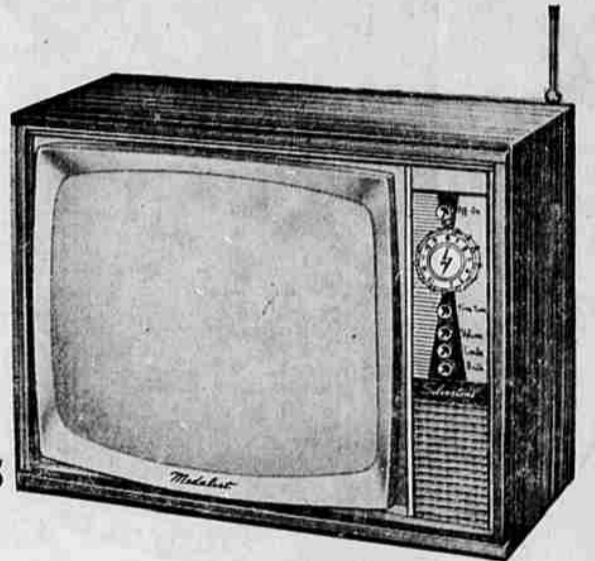
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
