

# Four from Area to Attend Juvenile Court Sessions

Four persons from Jackson county plan to attend the 1960 juvenile court summer school at the University of Oregon in Eugene from July 11 to 15, according to Mrs. Kay Crowell, director of the Jackson county juvenile department.

Representing Jackson county will be Mrs. Crowell, Lee Wells, and Larry Tweedy, from the juvenile department, and Dr. Fredrick Trost, Southern Oregon college associate professor of social science.

Dr. Trost is also a member of the Jackson county juvenile advisory council. Mr. and Mrs. Robert Swan, superintendent and matron of the Jackson county juvenile detention home, plan to attend the session Wednesday, July 13.

**Appear on Panel**  
Mrs. Crowell will appear on a panel Wednesday morning on "Issues Involved in the Mission of an Institution and Home." Thursday, Dr. Trost will be one of five speakers talking on "Presentation of Some Current Research on

Delinquency." Mrs. Crowell is a member of the training and research committee of the Oregon Juvenile Court Judges' association which established the program for the annual summer school. She is also chairman of the association's public relations committee which makes her a director of the association.

This is the third annual session of the summer school sponsored jointly by the Oregon Juvenile Court Judges' association and the University of Oregon. Mrs. Crowell said. The program this year is centered on analysis and treatment of the delinquent child.

**Featured on Panel**  
Featured on the panel discussion, "What is Making Johnny Delinquent?" a panel discussion the first day, will be the case history of a Jackson county youth, Mrs. Crowell said. Identity of the boy will not be revealed. The case history of a Kelso, Wash., boy also will be included in the panel discussion, Mrs. Crowell added.

"The JCSS was created to meet the pressing need for increased communication among all those persons in Oregon who are responsible for juvenile corrections programs," according to Roy E. Buehler, director of the summer school.

"Each of us must meet increasing demands for intelligent action with reference to juvenile delinquency. We need a meeting ground, a place and a time to think, to criticize, to share our common experiences, and to gain a new perspective in our demanding task: the reduction and correction of delinquent behavior. The summer school has been meeting this need."

**National Consultants**  
Some prominent national consultants and speakers will be featured on the program. Starke Hathaway, who speaks on the Monday morning panel, is a professor and director of the division of clinical psychology, University of Minnesota medical school. Among his honors, he won the distinguished scientific contribution award, American Psychology association, 1959; is author of "Analyzing and Predicting Juvenile Delinquency with the MMPI" with Prof. E. D. Monahan, is a Phi Beta Kappa, and was a member of the governor's committee for study of Minnesota prison system in 1941.

Dr. Hathaway will speak Tuesday on "The Nature of Corrective Experience." His wife, Virginia Hathaway, chief of school psychology, Minneapolis board of education member, and a member of the state board of examiners in psychology, will also appear on the program.

**Noted Authority**  
Another noted authority on the program is Dr. Garrett Heys, director of the department of institutions, state of Washington; advisor to federal agencies on prison matters, National Probation and Parole association trustee; and a trustee of the American Correctional association.

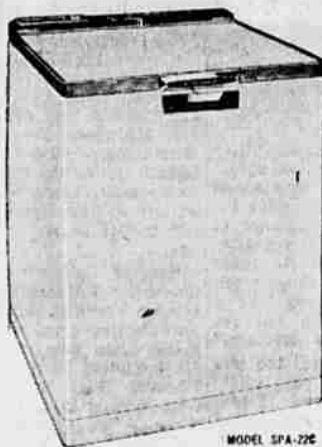
