War Bride Now Expert On Flower Arranging

New York - Auni Adams came to America as a war bride who knew little of the language of this country and nothing of the language of flowers.

Today, she is an expert on floral arranging, lectures to women's club groups on the care and handling of cut flowers, and is president of the American Women's Florist association, an organization of women florists or women married to florists.

"I began as my husband's delivery boy," said the 32-year-old Mrs. Adams, a stunning brunette. Actually, she said she started helping at the shop to cure homesickness - she longed for her family left in Luxembourg.

She also helped with the bookkeeping and eventually started filling some of the orders which came into husband Charles' shop in Queens Village, N. Y.

Now she is so adept that other florists in the metropolitan area hire her when they get an order for a big wedding or party.

Handsome Wreath
"One of the handsomest wreaths we ever made was for a funeral," she said in an interview.

"The deceased was a race horse. The grief-stricken owner ordered roses and carnations."

The Adams shop is a member of Florists Telegraph Delivery, wires flowers to all parts of the country, and through Interflora, to all parts of the world.

Mrs. Adams said that a domestic problem is solved when a husband uses the language of flowers; and many a courtship ends in an engagement.

But she would suggest that any swain sending a bouquet sign his last as well as first name. Last Easter, she received a call of desperation from a young woman who got an orchid from the Adams shop and a card signed "Love, Joe."

Exotic Rice
For rice that will draw praise from lovers of good food, heat 2 tablespoons salad oil in an aluminum skillet. Add 1 1/2 cups uncooked rice, 2 1/2 cups boiling water, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 3 tablespoons lemon juice and 1 1/2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce. Cover the skillet tightly and cook at 212 degrees. Cook 15 minutes, without lifting the lid. Turn off the heat and let the rice set for 15 minutes. Then add 1/2 cup chopped ripe olives, 2 tablespoons chopped parsley and toss well with a fork. Serve with chicken a la king or curried lamb.

New York - UPD - Stuffed tomatoes with watercress mayonnaise make a summer luncheon treat. Hollow out the tomatoes, reserving pulp. Mix the chopped pulp with chopped cucumber and shrimp. Bind with mayonnaise. Fill the tomato cups and serve with additional mayonnaise mixed with chopped watercress. Garnish with watercress sprigs.
