Four Appear in Circuit Court

Parole was granted providing he refrain from drinking intoxicating liquor and make restitution and pay costs. Smith was sentenced Oct. 13.

Dennis W. Smith, 717 West Jackson st., Medford, was paroled Friday for the balance of his six months sentence on bad check charges. Smith was placed on parole providing he make restitution in full and remain employed. He was sentenced April 5.

Group Seeks Repeal Of School Act

Salem — (UPI) — Oregon Elections Director Jack E. Thompson said Saturday a Portland group is making a last-ditch effort to obtain enough signatures for an initiative to repeal the 1957 school district reorganization act and the proponents hope to file the petitions Sunday afternoon.

Everett E. DeMars, Portland, head of Serve Our State, Inc., informed Thompson that SOS hoped to make it under the July deadline.

Some 33,712 signatures are required and several thousand signatures were still needed.

The measure would halt consolidation of the state's many school districts and would undo district reorganization accomplished so far.
