

# Howard Keeps LA Moving With Big Afternoon at Bat

Frank Howard didn't make the National league all-stars but he just might make the Los Angeles Dodgers champions again.

It's a long shot but the 6-foot, 7-inch, 250-pound rookie's slugging has lifted the Dodgers definitely on the move and ready to challenge for the lead in the front-running Pittsburgh Pirates falter. They're three games behind the second-place Milwaukee Braves and eight behind the Pirates.

Howard enjoyed another sensational day Sunday when he drove in five runs with a homer, double and single. In his last five games he's collected 11 hits in 21 at bats for a .524 pace and knocked in 10 runs. That sprint has lifted his mark to .301 and given fresh impetus to a drive in which the Dodgers have won 11 of 14 games to climb into contention.

Howard's hitting featured a slugfest in which the Dodgers downed the St. Louis Cardinals, 11-7, despite the blasting of Stan Musial, who drove in four runs with a homer and a single. Julian Javier, Norm Sherry and Tommy Davis also hit homers before Ed Roebuck wound up with his eighth victory compared to only one defeat.

# National Leaguers All-Star Favorites

Kansas City, Mo. (UP) - The favored National league met the American league in the first of 1960's All-Star games today.

Because of the hitting power, the National league was favored at 6 1/2 to 5.

The fact that this first of the two All-Star games this year came after a full day's schedule complicated the pitching plans of both managers. None of the hurlers on their staffs had the full complement of the normal four days rest.

But both managers felt if they get over the pitching hurdle in this one they would be in good shape for starting pitchers for the second All-Star game, scheduled for Yankee Stadium in New York City Wednesday.

# SF Giants Halt Streak Of Setbacks

San Francisco (UP) - The San Francisco Giants had a winning streak going of one straight game today and four days off to gloat over it.

Dave Philley tied into a knuckle ball served up by Don Cardwell, his old fishing buddy, for a three run homer that tied the score with the Chicago Cubs Sunday and then the Giants went on to win, 5-3.

All the Giant scoring was done in the seventh inning and all runs were unearned but manager Tom Sheehan isn't beefing. The triumph broke a five game losing streak that had seen the Giants skid into the second division.

Sam Jones, who started pitching the seventh inning, picked up his 11th victory while Cardwell was charged with loss number seven.

It was a defeat that might keep the Chicago side-armed awake for a couple of nights. Going into the seventh inning, the Bruins held a 3-0 lead and Cardwell was cruising on a one-hitter. Then Willie McCovey hit a hard pop fly down the third base line which wavered in and out of foul territory and popped out of the glove of Ron Santo, the rookie guardian at that bag, for an error.

**Up Came Philley**

Felipe Alou ran for McCovey and Cardwell retired the next two batters. But then he walked Hobie Landrith. Up came Philley in a pinch-hit role for Andre Rodgers and powered the ball over the right field screen to square the count.

Jones followed with a single and Joe Amalfitano sent him in with a triple that also dispatched Cardwell to the showers. Don Elston, whose stonewall relief work helped the Cubs win 7-6 on Saturday, then was clipped for a single by Don Blasingame which iced things.

Cardwell, who hurled a no-hitter against St. Louis last May two days after arriving from Philadelphia in a deal, struck out nine and had the Giants looking mighty futile until Santo's miff in the 7th inning apparently "bugged" him.

There now will be a four-day intermission for the all-star games in Kansas City and New York. Then the Los Angeles Dodgers check in Friday night to open a three game series.

# Roebuck Shares Dodger Honors

Los Angeles (UP) - It was a toss-up today between Frank Howard and Ed Roebuck for honors as the current hero of the Los Angeles Dodgers. It took the combined talents of both along with Norm Sherry Tommy Davis and Chuck Essegian to pull out an 11-7 victory over the pesky St. Louis Cardinals.

But the win was a big one for the Dodgers. Had they lost, they would have dropped to fifth place. The win instead moved Los Angeles to third, a half-game ahead of the Cardinals and eight back of Pittsburgh.

Last year, at the time of the All-Star break in the season, the Dodgers were in third place but only a half-game behind Milwaukee and San Francisco.

Roebuck came in as the fourth Dodger pitcher and was charged with only one walk while he was setting the Cardinals down in the final three innings to gain his eighth victory of the season against one loss.
