

# Mays, Banks Pace National Stars To 5-3 Win Over American League

## Two Teams Vie Again Wednesday

Kansas City, Mo.—(AP)—Walter Alton, who feels he has Al Lopez "number," planned today to "bomb" the American league again with Ernie Banks, Willie Mays and Vern Law when they meet in 1960's second All-Star game in New York's Yankee stadium Wednesday.

Banks and Mays did the hitting—and some pretty fancy fielding, too—as the National leaguers beat the American leaguers 5-3 in the first All-Star game Monday before a sellout throng of 30,619 in 100 degree heat.

Law helped too, retiring the last two batters when the Americans threatened in the ninth.

He threw only seven pitches to retire Brooks Robinson of the Orioles and Harvey Kuenn of the Indians with two men on base.

"He'll be ready to go," the smiling Alton predicted. The Dodger manager went into Monday's game determined to start either Law or his Pittsburgh Pirates pitching mate Bob Friend.

Alton decided to go with Friend because he had had an extra day's rest. "I wasn't too concerned," Alton explained. "I figured I couldn't go wrong with either of them."

He didn't when he chose Friend, a 10-9 hurler for the Pirates. Friend yielded only one hit in his three innings stint—as long as a pitcher in All-Star team can go under the rules.

And while Friend was in there, Banks and Mays wrapped it up for him giving him his second All-Star victory against one defeat. He was the winning pitcher in 1956, the loser in 1958.

Lopez, who hasn't had much luck against Alton, wasn't sure who he would start for the American league Wednesday but admitted that southpaw Whitey Ford of the Yankees "could be a pretty good guess."

Lopez started right hander Bill Monbouquette of the Boston Red Sox Monday because he didn't want a left hander throwing against the predominantly right handed hitting power of the Nationals.

The left field fence at Kansas City's park is only 330 feet away and Lopez figured right handed pitching might stop that National league right handed hitting array. Only two of the National starters batted from the left side—left fielder Bob Skinner and third baseman Eddie Mathews.

But his strategy didn't work.

**Mays Hits Triple**  
Mays, the National league's leading hitter with a .353 average, rifled Monbouquette's second pitch down the right field line for a triple and romped home when Skinner rapped the first pitch to him into center for a single.

Monbouquette got the next two men but then grooved

one to Banks with the count of two strikes and no balls. Banks tore into it and sent it over that "short porch" in left field for a home run.

The Nationals made their lead 4-0 when Braves catcher Del Crandall also found that short porch range. Then in the third Banks led off with a double and eventually scored what turned out to be the National league's final run.

In the sixth inning, when it looked as if the Americans would get back into the game, Banks came up with an inning ending double play.

The American league broke through for its first run a few minutes earlier.

Mathews, who had two of the four errors charged to the National, booted Al Kaline's grounder with one out. That turned out to be a big one. Kuenn had lead off with a single off Mike McCormick, the Giants' left hander, but was out trying to stretch it into a double.

After that life to Kaline, Bill Skowron singled and Elton Howard, another Yankee, walked to fill the bases. Nellie Fox singled sharply, scoring Kaline and leaving the bases still loaded.

**Eloy Face To Rescue**  
Alton then called on another Pirate pitcher, relief ace Eloy Face, and did the job thanks to Banks.

Luis Aparicio hit a sharp grounder to second base. Banks scooped it up, slipped to Bill Mazeroski at second to force Howard and the Pirates second baseman relayed the ball to first for a double play.

That wasn't the American league's last chance. Kuenn was safe at first when second baseman Charlie Neal of the Dodgers threw wildly to pitcher Bob Buhl of the Milwaukee Braves, who had rushed over to cover first to start the American half of the eighth inning.

Then Kaline drove one over the left field wall and the American Leaguers were only two runs behind.

In the ninth, after Buhl had

retired Aparicio, Jim Gentile of the Orioles, given life when catcher Smokey Burgess dropped his foul pop, singled. When Jim Lemon of the Senators walked, Alton called on Law.

He got Robinson on a fly ball and then Kuenn also flied out.

So Law closed it out for his pitching pal, Friend. In between there were McCormick, Face and Buhl. In all, they allowed the American Leaguers only six hits.

**Musial, Williams Pinchhit**  
Alton's Nationals, on the other hand, racked Monbouquette in the second inning, grounded out and Musial, batting for Mazeroski in the eighth, got a scratch single to provide the winners a hit they didn't need.

"I should win the PGA if I start getting the breaks again," Palmer said Monday night when he arrived on a jet airliner from Paris with his pretty wife, Winifred.

The husky par-buster from Ligonier, Pa., was denied permission to play in the French Open Monday when officials ruled his entry was filed too late.

Although he insisted he wasn't "too angry" over the snub, Palmer said, "right now there is some question in my mind as to whether I will ever return to France to play. Of course, I could change my mind about that."

New York — (AP) — Benny (Kid) Paret of Cuba, the new welter-weight champion, is favored at 13-6 to beat Garpel (Sugar) Hart of Philadelphia tonight at Madison Square Garden in a non-title 10-rounder that has these facets of significance:

—It's the first fight staged at the Garden in exactly 10 years without television and, accordingly, is expected to indicate whether TV-conditioned fans will leave their home chairs and sandwiches to witness non-televized bouts in the big punch emporium.

—It's the first time in nearly seven years that a world champion has engaged in a non-title bout in the Garden and if the show is successful at the gate it may induce other champions to make similar appearances on a strictly percentage basis.
