

Presidio Nine Tops Bowling Lanes; Tilt Scheduled Tonight

Memorial Stadium, White City - The U.S. Army's San Francisco Presidio team, led by the pitching and batting of Jack Sergott and the swatting of Sam Meyers, drubbed Medford Bowling Lanes baseball crew 12 to 4 here last night.

Sergott hurled two-hit ball. He and Meyers each had three safe blows and each drove in two runs.

The clubs are slated to play at Memorial stadium again this evening. An 8 p.m. "play ball" time is set. It was indicated that Huro Haguchi, who pitched in the European championship all-service game in 1958, will check for the Presidio. Pin Lane pitching selection reportedly is between Tom Laurence and Jerry Anderson.

Presidio blasted out 13 hits last night, 12 off Jim Eggers who worked on the hill for six innings. Sergott had two doubles and Myers a triple. Don Denny and Marion Lundes singled twice.

Big scoring frame for the Toreros was the fifth when they obtained four markers on four hits, an error and a sacrifice flyout. They had another four-hit canto, the sixth, when two runs came in.

George Lee singled in the sixth panel and Bob Serak in the eighth for the only Medford safeties off Sergott, who struck out six, walked four and hit two batters. Serak made it all the way home on his blow. Jack Jones bobbled the ball in center field then made a wild throw-in to first base.

A walk, a ground-out and an error gained Bowling Lanes a first inning run. The Keglers took a 2 to 1 lead in the second stanza on a counter tallied on two errors and a groundout. A walk, hit batter, a wild pitch and a groundout picked up a Medford ninth-inning score.

Eggers whiffed six and walked two and Don Sanford, in three frames, fanned two and yielded two bases on balls.

Central Point's Cheney Studs whittled the gap to one game last night when they battered tail-ender Grants 10 to 2.

The Studs put the bulk of their offensive into the third inning when they put across six runs. Ed Allen, Jeff Anhorn and Jerry Hauck each doubled in the inning; Pat Pepper, Brad Gettling and Bill Anhorn singled and Mike Glines swiped two bases after drawing a base on balls.

Bill Anhorn, stellar pitcher for the Cheney's, came through with another superb performance. Taking over in relief after Grants Pass had scored both its runs in the opening canto, Anhorn chucked 6 1/3 innings of no-hit, no-run ball. He struck out 13 batters and walked four.

GP picked up all its hits in the first inning off Mike Pepper after he had fanned the first two batters he faced. Denny Walker singled, Gary Stevens doubled and Paul Blinks tripped.

Stevens, who is the regular catcher for Grants Pass, went all the way as pitcher last night. He walked three and fanned five in a nine hitter. Gary Holmes, usually the third baseman, was catcher. Pat Pepper, with two hits, was the only player with more than one safety off Stevens.

Department of Interior Establishes Frameworks For Dove Hunt Seasons

Portland - (UPI) - The Oregon State Game Commission here Friday will set upland bird regulations for the taking of grouse, pigeons and doves.

Washington - (UPI) - The Interior Department today set the basic frameworks of open seasons during which hunters in 1960-61 may take mourning doves, white-winged doves, band-tailed pigeons, snipe, gallinules, Wilson's rails, and woodcock.

Daily bag and possession limits also were determined.

Individual states will select the dates for their hunting seasons within the period Sept. 1 through Jan. 15 for all game birds except woodcock. The period during which woodcock may be hunted must be between Oct. 1 and Jan. 5.

The department said a favorable status of mourning dove populations permitted liberalization of hunting regulations in two of the three new management units established this year for this popular game bird.

In the western management unit, which includes Arizona, California, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, and Washington, the state may select seasons of 50 consecutive full days or two periods of equal or unequal length totaling 50 full days. Shooting hours are from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. The daily bag limit is 10 and the possession limit is 20 in all states except Arizona and California.

In Arizona, the daily bag and possession limits on mourning and white-winged doves are 10. In California, the daily bag and possession limits on mourning and white-winged doves are 10 singly or in the aggregate of both kinds.

Season Length Same

Since the mourning dove population index in the western management unit has remained fairly constant for several years, the length of season and bag and possession limits are the same as last year.

White-winged dove hunting is prescribed for Arizona and New Mexico and for certain counties specified by California and Texas. Consistent with last year, the season dates for hunting white-winged doves in Arizona, California and New Mexico will conform to those dates selected by these states for hunting mourning doves; Texas may select three alternate days for hunting this species. In Arizona, the daily bag and possession limit on white-winged doves is 25.

Band-tailed pigeon seasons are prescribed for Washington, Oregon, and California. Oregon and Washington may select seasons of 30 consecutive full days, and California may again select 30 consecutive full days seasons for each of two geographical areas.

Choice of Kishi Successor Delayed

Tokyo - (UPI) - The ruling Liberal-Democratic Party met in special convention today to elect a successor to Premier Nobusuke Kishi but adjourned after only 10 minutes to prevent an open split in its ranks.

The delegates put off until Thursday the crucial election of a new party president who will become the new premier of Japan. Kishi, who has been under heavy fire because of the U.S.-Japan security treaty, is stepping down from both posts after more than three years.

The Liberal Democrats have an absolute majority in the Diet (Parliament) and by tradition the premier has been the president of the party in power.
