BUSY IN ARMY BASEBALL
Baseball in the Army may not be the soft life it seems. Duane Sides, ex-Medford high, now playing for the Neureut Spartans of the Army's 516th Signal group in Germany in a Seventh Army league, has written his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Sides, that the diamond sport for him has been an eight-hour-per-day proposition.

Sergeant Sides, who hurred for Medford's 1956 state runner-up baseball nine then played for Southern Oregon college for a season, has been busy at baseball this year since his Army aggregation had its first games in April. The schedule has taken him to such European cities as Amsterdam, Paris, Berlin and Rome. He's played in the outfield and at first base, as well as pitched, for his club, which was second in the first half of its league competition.

Outside of baseball season, Sides has been a senior control tower man for the 18th Signal Battalion in airway communications service at Frankfurt, Germany. He is scheduled for discharge from the Army in early September after a three-year hitch and reportedly is undecided on whether he wants to try baseball as a career.

National League Prestige High After All-Star Sweep

New York (UPI) — National league prestige stood at an all-time peak today as a result of the blend of pitching and power that produced a sweep of both this year's All-Star games.

"The pendulum has swung all the way," said a jubilant NL President Warren Giles after Wednesday's 6-0 triumph over the American league. "The victory and the way it was achieved demonstrate the overall strength of our league."

"It's a long way from the early years of the game when the American league dominated things," he continued. "And, we think it is a very healthy thing for baseball."

The triumph, coming from Monday's 5-2 win in Kansas City, gave the National league three victories in the last four All-Star games and nine in the last 13. And, not to be overlooked, was the Dodgers' World Series victory over the Chicago White Sox last autumn that keeps

intact the string of NL successes.

"There's not that much difference between the leagues," said AL Manager Al Lopez, by way of upholding his circuit's prestige. "We just were cold and they were hot. Some of the fellows we expected to hit for us simply didn't."

Chief among those was Roger Maris, whose 27 home runs had done so much during the first half of the American league season to lift the Yankees into the league lead. Maris didn't make a hit in either game and was retired twice Wednesday with the bases filled and two out, thus killing off the Americans' best chances.

Maris popped up in front of the plate with the bases filled and two out in the third inning and fled weakly to Willie Mays in center field with the bases loaded and two out in the seventh.

"We don't know more about pitching to Mays than anybody else does," said National league Manager Walter Alton. "We just have good pitchers."

The Nationals rode to victory on the wings of home runs by Eddie Mathews, Mays, Stan Musial and Ken Boyer but Alton was proudest of his pitching which produced only the third shutout in the 29-game history of All-Star classics.

"You really accomplish something when you shut out an All-Star squad," said Alton, "because they've got so many good hitters."

Mays, who emerged as the 1960 star of stars by smashing out three hits in each game, Mathews, Musial and Boyer simply were too much for the American league's pitchers. Mathews connected first, with one aboard in the second inning, to give the Nationals a 2-0 lead against Whitey Ford and Mays followed with his homer in the third.

Musial struck his sentimental shot as a pinch-hitter in the seventh inning and Boyer connected for a two-run blow into the left field seats to ice matters in the ninth.

A disappointingly small crowd of 38,362 for the first All-Star game played at Yankee Stadium since 1939 appeared to enjoy the rival managers' strategy of using virtually every player on the squads.

New York (UPI) — Baseball commissioner Ford Frick planned to telephone a Cleveland broadcaster today to satisfy himself that Vic Power's All-Star game bet really was "all a big joke."

That's what Power told Frick and American league President Joe Cronin Wednesday when they questioned the Cleveland Indians' Puerto Rican first baseman about reports of a \$100 bet he allegedly made with broadcaster Bob Neal.

In the dressing room prior to the second All-Star game at Yankee Stadium, Power told the baseball brass that the bet involved not whether Manager Al Lopez would use him in the All-Star games but whether he would be selected for the American league team.

"Even so, it was not serious," Power told Frick. "It was just a kidding bet."
